



A BRIEF REVIEW OF OUR HISTORY



St. Mary's Cathedral in Fargo, ND

The Tekakwitha Missionary Conference began in Fargo in 1939 as a forum for the Plains States Catholic Clergy. On October 4, 1939, twenty-four (24) clergy from three (3) Religious Orders in North Dakota, South Dakota and Minnesota assembled in the crypt of the cathedral in Fargo, ND. This group was joined by Bishop Muench, Abbot Ignatius Esser of St. Meinrad Abbey, St. Meinrad, Indiana.

On October 15, 1940, the second meeting of the Conference was held in the Knights of Columbus Hall in Jamestown, ND. There were ten Benedictine Priests present, the Chancellor of the Diocese of Fargo and the Provincial of the Sacred Heart Fathers. It was at this meeting that Father Justin Snyder, OSB, proposed putting the Conference under the guidance and protection of Kateri Tekakwitha, a young Mohawk- Algonquin woman born in 1656. On January 3, 1943, she was declared Venerable by Pope Pius XII

During the war years the Conference struggled due to gasoline and tire rationing, and the number of attendees fell to a dozen or less. However, men like Fr. Paul McHarness, OSB through personal direction and correspondence kept the spirit strong.

Benedictines have a long history of Missionary activity. An American Benedictine, Abbot Martin Marty gave careful attention to the instruction of 1659 Vatican Document to Missionaries in China. It reads: "Do not regard it as your takes, and do not bring any pressure to bear on any people, to change their manners, customs and usages, unless they are evidently contrary to religion and sound morals. What could be more absurd than to transplant France, Spain, Italy or some other European Country to China [USA]." So the conversation between missionaries gathered in Fargo was centered on personal adaptation and service to local cultures.

In the 1940's and 50's the Conference moved from Reservation to Reservation, from Mission to Mission. In 1952 the recurrent themes of the Conference were gathered and kept for reference by Fr. Daniel Madlon, OSB: assimilation, language, comparison of boarding schools with day schools, dialogue between field men and school men, selection of lay coworkers, home conditions, vacation school, the native men and women societies, adult discussion groups.

There were and are today marked advances in the genesis of the Conference. At the beginning the Conference was solely for clergy. In 1967, the contributions of Benedictine Sisters in anthropology and in the new science of missiology, the Sisters from the Benedictine house were invited. Since then, Indian Sisters from Catholic Orders are prominent in the leadership.

In 1968 the Conference was hosted at St. Joseph School in Chamberlain, SD. Fr. George Pinger, SCJ, was planner and chair. He paid careful attention to assure the presence of the two South Dakota Bishops, Bishop Lamert Hoch, and Sioux Indian lay men and women. The face of the Conference was changing.

In 1977 and 1978 the Conference was hosted by the Benedictine Sisters of St. Martin Monastery in Rapid City, SD. The Conference was becoming more professional and the need was seen for a permanent Director and a permanent office with staff. A three member Advisory Board was formed. Sister Genevieve Cuny, OSF of Pine Ridge, SD, Francis Hairy Chin of Fort Yates, ND were joined with the Capuchin priest, Father Gilbert Hemauer, OFM Cap, who became the first full-time Director. With the cooperation of the new Director of the Bureau of Catholic Indian Missions, Monsignor Paul Lenz, the Conference was integrated with the Bureau. The main Office of the Conference was at the Bureau and it was almost totally funded by the Bureau.

AS THE TEKAKWITHA CONFERENCE

In 1979, the Benedictine Sisters of the Sacred Heart Monastery in Yankton, SD hosted the annual meeting. The Monastery and the Conference were joined in dramatically shaping the emergence of Native prominence in the Catholic Church. In this place Native People first spoke up with dignity to their priests and became known as the 'Circle of 66'. Bishops present at this gathering were: Bishop Paul Dudley of Sioux Falls, Bishop Harold Dimmerling of Rapid City, Bishop William Connare of Greeensburg (representing Cardinal Krol), and Bishop Thomas Murphy of Great Falls, MT. At all previous meetings Bishops had been invited, but in the early

days Bishops did not find room on their calendars to attend the gatherings. The Tekakwitha Conference was a small gathering, not very influential. For the first time, at the invitation of the Board of Directors, a large group of men and women from the reservations were present. As a result of the 1979 'Circle of 66' Native Americans expressed con-

cerns for serious consideration in Native American Ministry.

In 1980 Bishop Thomas Murphy of Great Falls, Montana offered a substantial space for the permanent offices of the Conference. This space includes three units still being used as the Tekakwitha Conference National Center on 9th Avenue South.

Those who have served in leadership roles from 1939 to the present time:

1939 Fr. Sylvester Eisenman, OSB, Chairman Fargo, ND First gathering consisted of 24 clergy

1940 Fr. Sylvester Eisenman, OSB, Chairman, Jamestown, ND At this meeting Fr. Justin Snyder, OSB suggested that the conference gathering be placed under the guidance and protection of Kateri Tekakwitha, young Mohawk-Algonquin woman.... And was accepted by the clergy - from that time the annual gath erring was called the Tekakwitha Conference.

1942 - 1977 The annual Tekakwitha Conference was held in various locations: ND, SD, MT with a number of missionary priests: OSB; OFM. Cap; SJ; and Diocesan clergy who chaired the annual gatherings

1977 An executive Committee was formed comprising: Fr. Gilbert Hemauer, OFM Cap as President, Francis Hairy Chin (Lakota) and Sister Genevieve Cunv. OSF as secretary

1978 Fr. Gilbert Hemauer, OFM Cap was named President and Executive Director

The Tekakwitha Conference was incorporated in the State of Montana and a National Center was established in Great Falls, MT

1978 - 1985 Fr.Gilbert Hemauer, OFM Cap served as President and Executive Director

1986 - 1989 Fr. John Hascall, OFM. Cap was President and Fr. Gilbet Hemauer, OFM.Cap. served as **Executive Director**

Fr. Michael Galvan - Chairman of the Board of Directors

1990 - 1991 Mr. Fred Buckles - Executive Director

1992 Fr. Michael Galvan - Board Chair and some board members administered the office

1993 Mr. Wilson Boni – Acting Executive Director

1994 - 1996 Mr. Richard King - Executive Director

1997 - 1998 Mr. Mike Valdo - Board Chair monitored the office

1998 - Present Sr. Kateri Mitchell, SSA - Executive Director
