

The National Mayan Indian Leadership Conference convened in Omaha, Nebraska this Fall 2009 with Native leaders from California, Colorado,

Florida, Iowa, Nebraska, Oregon and Washington. Ms. Cecil Motus of the USCCB (United States Conference of Bishops from Washington, DC along with invited guests from the Native Studies Department of Creighton: Fr. Ray Bucko,



SJ and Dr. Rudi Mitchell (Omaha Tribe), and Sr. Kateri Mitchell of the Tekakwitha Conference were present for the weekend.

Many members of the Mayan Community were born in the United States. The Mayan Indian Leaders made a resolution to the USCCB that they be

identified as Native Americans within the conference structures. Before this they were identified as part of the Refugees and Immigrants Group. Although the group is from what is now called Guatemala and they are far from the original homeland they confirmed that they are the original inhabitants of the



land and this is their primary identification. The group also expressed interest in the Tekakwitha Conference as an




Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha Goes to Hawaii





Official Opening of the Native Nations Embassy for the National Congress of the American Indians in Washington, DC. November 3, 2009

Alma Ransom, Mohawk Nation from Akwesasne, NY. was selected by all the Indian Chiefs from across the United states to give a four directions blessing with tobacco,

corn meal, sage, pine and sweet grass at a sunrise service. Alma Ransom, Bear Clan offered the opening prayer by giving thanks to the Creator for many things in both her Mohawk language and in English. She pointed to the smoke "piercing the sky" and invited the group to join her in giving thanks by facing each of the four directions, the east, the north, the west and the south.



Alma formerly served as Vice President of NCAI and then Treasurer on the Executive Board.

During her prayer, Alma praised the NCAI staff and said one of the benefits of having a tribal embassy is to "notify the all nations of any events that are taking place or planned in DC."


"This is an important day," Jefferson Keel of the Chickasaw Nation of Oklahoma told the gathering after the prayer ceremonies had been completed and the songs had been sung. "This is a special day. This is a new day for Indian Country."

As president of the National Congress of American Indians, Keel has an office in the new embassy building in northwest Washington that houses his organization. So it's no surprise that Keel is predicting a new era for the country's more than 4 million American Indians and Alaskan Natives.




Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha Parish in Tucson, AZ Celebrates 25th Anniversary


