Hope for the World: 500th Anniversary of Dominicans in the Americas

This is a year of jubilee! 500 years ago, in 1510, the first community of four Spanish Dominican friars responded to a call to preach the gospel in what was known as "the New World." They arrived at Espanola—today, Haiti and the Dominican Republic—just 18 years after Christopher Columbus had come upon this land. In that same year the Dominican community grew to be sixteen members. These friars were influenced by the spirit of renewal at Salamanca, Spain. On this 500th anniversary Dominicans proudly celebrate a commitment to defend the rights of the Indigenous of the Americas. From the very beginning, Dominicans stood in solidarity with the native peoples, giving witness to the truth that the dignity of each person must be respected.

At the same time of the arrival of the Dominicans, Franciscans and secular priests came from Spain as agents of the Spanish crown. Among the secular priests was Bartolome de las Casas. Though not a Dominican at the time, he was present in the "New World" 500 years ago. The bold Dominican community preached the gospel and gave witness to justice when some Spanish priests were oppressing the indigenous people. However, Bartolome de las Casas underwent a conversion like Paul of Tarsus. Las Casas, a Spanish diocesan priest who owned land and slaves in Espanola, was transformed by the courageous preaching of Anton de Montesinos, OP in Advent of 1511. Inspired by the preaching and the witness of the Dominican community, Las Casas no longer espoused the power of the Spanish crown. He became a Dominican friar and dedicated his entire life to ministering with the oppressed in the Americas.

Las Casas, his preaching, his writings, and his life made a profound impact in our world. Set on fire by truth in his conversional

Pentecost preaching in 1514, he became "a zealous and virtuous friar." Repeatedly he defended the rights of the Indigenous peoples and denounced the oppression that was endorsed by the Spanish 'conquerors.' Las Casas wrote a *History of the Indies* and a treatise entitled *De Unico Vocationis Modo, The Only Way.* His written works and his life expressed his dream, his mission: to preach a



nonviolent and peaceful evangelization in these indigenous territories, among these human beings who had been scarred by the presence of the Spanish soldiers.

Las Casas, with the other Dominicans made a significant difference in the Americas. They united in communal preaching. They engaged in, what we call theological reflection, with the Dominicans in Salamanca, Spain. These friars were visionaries. They approached their mission in the New World together through contemplation, study, and work with the native people. Their preaching was prophetic and impacted the whole Christian world.

To carry on the work of Dominicans among Native Americans in the United States the Dominican Leadership Conference affirmed a collaborative organization called "Las Casas." In this year of jubilee, the Las Casas board decided to celebrate the 500th anniversary by donating funds to all Dominicans who minister with Native Americans in the United States. The mission of Las Casas is to seek justice in the lives of Native Americans. Through generous donors Las Casas is able to provide support to our Brothers and Sisters.

United in spirit with the early Dominican community may we always have zeal for the gospel of justice and be a source of hope for the oppressed in our midst.



- 1. A Kateri Circle is a group of Women and Men and/or Youth of all cultures within a parish/mission who want to belong to a prayer circle/group for the purpose of learning and promoting the saintly life of the Tekakwitha Conference patroness Kateri Tekakwitha, a young Mohawk/Algonquin woman of the mid-seventeenth century.
- HOW can we start a Kateri Circle?
 Kateri Circles begin when two or three, and more, gather and want to form a group for spiritual support, and who want to form a small community of faith for prayer, learning and outreach to the local community.
- 3. WHO can start a Kateri Circle?

 Person(s) willing to pray, learn more about our patroness Kateri Tekakwitha, study the faith, and serve others.

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Intellectual/Educational:

Study the life of Kateri Tekakwitha, become more aware of Native American issues in the rural, urban and reservation, attend classes in your Parish for teachings in theology and scripture.

Physical/Service:

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Become involved in your local community; participate in the interests and needs of families, outreach to the sick, elderly, and special needs in your community, and your parish members.

Spiritual:

Daily prayer for the canonization of Kateri Tekakwitha, pray and work toward a deeper spiritual life, pray the Kateri Chaplet which commemorates her 24 years on mother earth.

Social/Hospitality:


Work for unity, activities to support and strengthen the Kateri Circle members, encourage the formation of other Kateri Circles both for youth and adults.




