MTL. STAR CANADA WIDE **CASTRO**

7 ENERABLE KATERI TE-KAKWITHA "protectress of Canada" make them see! The June 12, 1971, issue of Paris Match (Number 1153) offered its worldwide public a crushing document: "Castro's Concentration Camps of Death." On page 68, in boldtype capitals: "CUBA HAS ITS CONCENTRATION CAMPS OF DEATH. The disclosures of two escaped witnesses from Castro's prisons confirm the terrible accusations laid against the administration of the island." Like the Nazi concentration camps, reads the following page, "The prisoners serve as guinea-pigs for doctors recently graduated from medical schools."

For several days, I paged through the most sedate and dutiful dailies as well as through the more sensational rags. I felt that Mr. Michel Chartrand, and his bearded or beardless leftists, perhaps even a few angry young Jesuits from Montreal, might picket the Cuban consulate, as protesters occasionally

do at the United States Consulate. But, nada, nothing, absolutely nothing happened. In Paris, at least Jean-Paul Sartre and his atheistic partners have the gumption, when the circumstances so demand, to protest against the excesses of the Castro and Soviet governments. Trudeau. This letter is an apt commentary on "Iroquois Women Never Practised Abortion", which appeared in the September, 1970 issue of Kateri. Why not imitate him and write to the Prime Minister?

To the Prime Minister:

Nearly two years ago, the Canadian Parliament passed a bill authorizing the medical or surgical interruption of pregnancies, in other words, the so-called abortion therapy.

Since then, a lobby has been organized to liberalize this new law so as to permit abortion at the mother's request.

We are opposed to this liberalization for the following motives:

- 1. The liberalizing of the present law will open the door to much abuse;
- 2. It will not do away with clandestine abortions to any considerable extent;
- 3. It will not diminish the risks inherent to this procedure, nor the deaths that result from it;
- 4. It certainly will deprive the country of a good number of citizens who would be useful to its prosperity;

We would be grateful to you if you would kindly inform the other members of the Canadian Parliament about our definite opposition to the liberalizing of the "abortion therapy" bill.

Radio Station CKAC in Montreal, after eighteen years' daily broadcasting of the Rosary from Mary Queen of the World Cathedral, decided to cancel it. The public reacted immediately and Jewish-owned Station CKVL (FM) offered to carry the Rosary at 9 p.m. every evening, and also at 5:40 a.m. Kateri, whose devotion to the Rosary was probably unparalleled in the New World, would undoubtedly tune in daily for this program, were she alive today.

Mr. Gilles Constantineau, however, in Le Devoir of September 23, 1970, had the following broadside for its readers in favor of the discontinuance of the Rosary at CKAC:

"Who, indeed would be surprised? Young people under twenty years of age, who, nobody will deny, are totally indifferent with regard to matters of worship? People in their twenties who, for those among them still faithful as practising Catholics, have on the brain only ideas of reform and renewal in religious matters? Or those from twenty to thirty, who, during the years of their youth. were nauseatingly saturated with religious observances in the end devoid of any meaning so numerous, repetitious, automatic, and complusory under the pain of serious sanctions, had they become?

"Or again, folks in their forties, in their fifties? Or older still? The old fossils? The fantaics? Ah, the fanatics!...

"Is it possible the CKAC may take into account before everything else the reactions of the "fanatics" and ignore the views of the younger and more dynamic members of its listeners, who, under the circumstances, consider doing away with the Rosary as something normal and natural...?"

This article with all the ancient earmarks of the Combes period in France at the turn of the century, directly contradicts at least one elderly man whom nobody, with perhaps, the exception of a Le Devoir newspaperman, would call a fanatic or an old fossil: John XXIII.

During his five-year pontificate, thirty-five times he called upon the faithful to practise intense devotion to Our Lady. In five of his Encyclicals or Letters, he urged Catholics to pray the Rosary. He wrote in September 27, 1959: "We ourselves never miss reciting the entire Rosary each day... The Joyful Mysteries after Mass: the Sorrowful Mysteries after lunch, and the Glorious Mysteries each evening with the Pontifical Household." In 1961, in another letter, he asked that the Rosary be publicly and privately offered for peace in the world and for other intentions.

His successor, Paul VI, has already written two Encyclicals on the Rosary. Last June, when he received Archbishop Grégoire of Montreal in a private audience, he gave him a rosary, a token of his devotion to Our Lady.

Of course, Mr. Gilles Constantineau may still sneer. Let's hope he won't.





A Mini-Tercentenary

T THE MISSION OF ST. FRANCIS XAVIER on the St. Lawrence River, the Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha became a member of the Holy Family Association in 1678. It first made its influence felt at the Mission in 1671. Father Claude Chauchetière, S.J. in his Annual Narrative succinctly informs us about it:

"...Father Pierson even sowed the seeds of the Holy Family by giving some rosaries to the eldest Christian men and women. The Indians going through the woods made, by means of their exactness in prayer and their pious utterances, almost as many Christians as they found other Indians in the

regions where they hunted."

Father Pierre Joseph Marie Chaumonot helped to found the Holy Family Confraternity in 1663. In his autobiography written at his superior's command, he gave us a fascinating account of its inception:

Father Chaumonot Sent to Montreal

I was chosen by Monseigneur de Laval, Bishop of Petrea. and by our Superior to help the inhabitants of Montreal, who were very badly in need of provisions. Some were sent to them in the ship that carried me. When I arrived, Father Souart, Pastor of this city, and Father Galinier, his colleague, had the kindness to put me up at their house. We spent at least four months together and always in such perfect union that people could have taken them as members of the Society of Jesus and me as a member of the Seminary of St. Sulpice. On feasts and Sundays, we officiated and preached each one in turn. The French inhabitants also showed me great confidence and many wanted me to hear their general confessions. I was not completely useless either to the Indians who came by after my arrival in Montreal. I had the advantage of becoming acquainted with Madame d'Aillebout, who had been commended to me by Father Jerome Lalemant, our Supérieur, and her onetime director in Quebec. He wanted me to replace him in Montreal. As I immediately recognized her as a woman of virtue, of intelligence, and of good conduct, I asked her to take charge of the provisions with which I had been entrusted on leaving Quebec, and to distribute them. This work she accomplished to the satisfaction of all the needy people while I took care of their spiritual wants.

This lady, whose husband was twice the Governor of New France, had the idea, while I was in Montreal, of looking for some powerful though informal means of reforming Christian family life on the model of the Holy Family of the Word Incarnate by instituting a society or confraternity where people could learn, even in the outside world, how to imitate Jesus. Mary, and Joseph. As for myself, for fourteen years and more, I had entertained ardent and just about continual desires that Mary the Divine, would have a great quantity of spiritual and adopted children to console her for the sufferings that the loss of her Jesus had caused her. Then the first thought I had on this subject came to me as I meditated upon the infinite sorrow of Mary's compassion at the death of her Son and, since this time, I have held converse in my prayers on few other subjects than to entreat the Holy Spirit to give His most worthy Spouse as many devoted children as possible to compensate for the respect, the love, and the assistance that the Savior Himself would have rendered her, if death had not taken away for three days this much beloved Son.

Father Chaumonot's Prayer

"What!" I often said to God, "you really promised Abraham a posterity more numerous than the stars and the grains of sand of the sea because he accepted to sacrifice his dear Isaac at the first command he received from you, and even then he was not obliged to carry it out. You likewise were satisfied to see him struggle for three days only with his paternal tenderness for his son; but here we have quite another martyrdom! As thirty years outnumber three days, as Mary outshines Abraham, as Jesus outshines Isaac, and as truth prevails over its foreshadowing, so does the Virgin Mother's interior struggle prevail over this patriarch's trouble. I entreat you then, O Holy Spirit, to give more spiritual children to Mary than you gave Abraham children of his own flesh and blood!"

I experienced very great consolation in requesting for all sorts of motives Divine Love to grant my request, and so much so that I never became tired of meditating on this topic, and I then had no other desire to request anything else of God. Once, as I was taken up with these ardent desires of obtaining for the Virgin Mary this holy and numerous family, suddenly I heard distinctly in the inmost recess of my soul these intellectual locutions¹ which said to my heart: "You will be my spouse, since you wish me to be the mother of so many children." Quite abashed and embarrassed that the Mother of God should have thought of honoring me so much, I was sunk

in the consideration of my nothingness, of my sins and of my wretchedness. However she told me that she was my spouse.

A Three-Stranded Cord

After such a favor which I well would have wished to merit, I found in a book a devotion practised by a few votaries of the Holy Family, who, in honor of the thirty years that Jesus, Mary, and Joseph passed together, carry a three-stranded cord, to represent how intimately during all this time, these three adorable persons were united in thought, sentiment and affection. Thereupon I felt inspired to establish this custom in Montreal, and Father Souart, to whom, as to my confessor, I revealed everything that took place in my soul, approved of this devotion, already authorized in France, and, as Pastor, he allowed me to preach about it on the following Sunday, which I did, urging those who wished to do so, to wear this cord, after having it blessed, according to the prescribed form. But they must make ready, especially by a careful control of their thoughts, words and actions, so that none of them would contain anything criminal in matters of impurity. Everybody approved of this devotion, and many accepted the holy cord after due preparation.

The Holy Family Association

This trial stroke was followed by another project, Dies diei eructat verbum: Day discourses of it to day (Ps 19:3). It consisted in establishing an association entitled Holy Family, the aim of which is the sanctification of Christian families on the model of that of the Word Incarnate: the men were to imitate St. Joseph; the women, Holy Mary; and the children the Child Jesus. This same director of mine, to whom I disclosed the project, by his approval, encouraged me to carry it out; but as we could not succeed without the Bishop's consent and even without indulgences from Our Holy Father the Pope, I proposed to the said Father [Souart], to Madame d'Aillebout, to Mother Superior of the Hospital and to Sister Marguerite, Superior of the Congregation (because in this affair we worked together), I prepared, as I was about to say, that we commend such an important project to St. Ignatius by making a novena for its successful realization to the worthy founder of the Society of Jesus. Here is a copy of the prayer I composed in his honor. I still have the original.

"Glorious St. Ignatius! who have 'The greater glory of God' for motto and who have left this heritage to the spiritual children of your Society, we do not doubt that you have the control. and so to speak the superintendance of all the good works that your spiritual sons undertake for God's honor. So we beg of you most humbly to take great care to have our plan succeed, an undertaking, we hope, which will greatly contribute to the greater glory of the Divine Majesty, since it concerns the reform of Christian families on the model of the most Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, Joseph. Remember, illustrious patriarch, a society so useful to the Church; remember the care you took, namely in Rome, of sinners, of badly married women, of poor orphans, and of girls whose modesty was in danger. Continue from heaven above to still realize on earth, through your children, what you yourself used to do in the past. Deign then to inspire them with the means to stop the disorders that destroy families, and to bring out the virtues capable of transforming homes into as many training centers to fill the Church with Saints, and Heaven with Blessed. This responsibility, O great Saint, must belong to you, seeing that Jesus wished to choose you - both you and your sons - to communicate your spirit to so many people, even to whole communities and to entire kingdoms. Assuredly Mary and Joseph, to keep to the pattern presented by their Son, will wish to make use of you and of your spiritual children to communicate their spirit to the heads of families and their wives. So, most zealous one, for the glory of God, may you become the founder of the Holy Family Association as you were that of the Society of Jesus. And, in gratitude for this new association in which we hope to be successful under your patronage and through your intercession, we the undersigned each offer you nine communions. We shall receive them in thanksgiving for the favors which God has granted to you as well as to your holy Society. Furthermore, we promise to see that all those who are admitted into this Association of the Holy Family, shall immediately recite after their reception, Glory be to the Father nine times for the same intention."

Done at Montreal, on July 31, Feast of St. Ignatius, in the year 1663. Souart, P.; Joseph Marie Chaumonot, Jesuit; Judith de Bressole, Superior of the hospital; Marguerite Bourgeois, foundress of the Daughters of the Congregation, in Canada; Barbara de Boulogne, widow of Mr. d'Aillebout.

Moreover, the Saint did not neglect to bring the affair we had commended to him to its completion.²

^{1.} Communications through words spoken to mystics by God or by angels.

(a) Auricular locution: words perceived exteriorly, but spoken by God or the angels, either good or bad. (b) Imaginative locution: words perceived interiorly in the imagination and produced also by God or the angels. (c) Intellectual locution: words perceived interiorly in the intellect after the manner of the angels, without cooperation of the five senses or the imagination, and produced by God alone.

Caughnawaga is only a few miles from Montreal, where approximately ten thousand Spaniards

The real Xaviéradas take place on foot as you will be able to see in the clippings I am enclosing. But it would be up to the pilgrims to decide. Father Aniceto G. and the Spanish Catholic Mission could organize the itinerary from Montreal to Caughnawaga and you could help them with regards to bus service, etc. for their return to the city. Perhaps you could allow them to have a Spanish Mass with some singing in Iroquois... I trust that my idea concerning a Xaviérada to St. Francis Xavier of Caughnawaga will bear fruit; don't forget, I'm always at your disposal for anything that could be helpful to Kateri's Cause... 

UNDER ATTACK

S TRANGE IT IS how Kateri came into the picture during the American Revolution!

One of the primary causes of this Revolution, one that strongly roused the colonies to revolt against England, was the Quebec Act. By this Act the British Government guaranteed religious freedom in Canada when that country became a British colony in 1759. . .

It is unbelievable in our day, how bitter was the feeling aroused by this Act. Pulpit and press were loud in condemning it; all sorts of organizations were formed to agitate for its repeal; men who are now regarded as among the statesmen of that time considered it a menace; even the Continental Congress consented to submit it as one of the grievances against King and Parliament.

Priests and people in Canada came up for abuse and misrepresentation. As we know, the missionaries there had converted many Indians and held them steadfast in their religion. This was eighty years after the death of Tekakwitha...

The success of the missionaries in imposing "the superstitious rites and fantastic trumperies of popery" on the simple children of the forest was ascribed to flattery and to the natural fondness of the Indian for "a showy and mechanical religion." An instance of this play on vanity and catering to the genius of the Indian mind was found in "their canonizing a squaw by the name of Saint Catherine, which piece of jesuitical craft greatly endeared the Romish faith to them, who by that great means, besides the common benefit of adressing their prayers to the rest of the saints in the calendar, obtained the supernumerary advantages of a particular advocate and intercessor of their own." (Metzger, The Quebec Act.)

Father John J. Wynne, S.J., Kateri's first Vice-Postulator, who wrote the above lines, concludes:

In the study of the documents pertaining to Tekakwitha by members of the Congregation of Rites, the above citation was considered, but it was soon discarded when the Vice-Postulator made known that the author of it was a bigoted politician.






