CTOBER, which is just around the corner, draws our attention to Our Lady. The Rosary comes to mind and the meditation of the Joyful, Sorrowful, and Glorious Mysteries. For Blessed Kateri, not only October but also the other months were dedicated to Mary.

Orphaned at four, what joy was hers when she discovered at the age of seventeen as she prepared for Baptism that she had a mother in heaven, the Mother of all Mothers. The qualities, the power, and the glory of the Blessed Virgin threw the young Iroquois Maiden into her arms.

She made haste to learn by heart the Hail Mary as well as the Angelus. Later on she memorized the Litanies of Our Lady of Loreto and recited them out loud every night in her

longhouse.

It has been said that Mother Theresa of Calcutta is never seen without her beads in her hands. So it was with Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha. On her way to or from work, she told her rosary, meditating on the mysteries. One day, after hearing about the penances St. Benedict and St. Aloysius Gonzaga performed, she thought it would be well to imitate them. And behold, there she was barefooted in the snow saying her rosary! Fr. Cholenec, her spiritual director, though he interiorly admired her, gave her a good dressing down.

On Easter Sunday 1678, she became a member of the Confraternity of the Holy Family, recently approved by her Bishop, Blessed Francis de Laval. The spirituality of this

association developed even more her love for Mary.

During the following year, on the Feast of the Annunciation, March 25, 1679, about eight o'clock in the morning, Kateri showed her great love for her Queen. A few minutes after having received Communion, she gave herself up entirely to Our Lord who had given Himself up for her, by promising perpetual virginity. "She prayed Our Lady," wrote Fr. Cholenec. "for whom she had a tender devotion, to present her to her Divine Son; then, wishing to make a double consecration in one single act, she offered herself entirely to Mary at the same time that she dedicated herself to Jesus Christ, earnestly begging her to be her mother and to accept her as her daughter." Twelve months later, on Holy Thursday, 1680, at three o'clock in the afternoon, Kateri Tekakwitha expired as she pronounced two words which admirably resumed her life, "lesos, Wari: Jesus, Mary." APRIL 17 AT KAHNAWAKE



Although the liturgical feast of Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha has been transferred from April 17 to July 12 in the United States, this year at least,

it has been maintained in Canada on the day of her saintly death. As during the previous years, she was honored at the Mission of St. Francis Xavier with a Concelebrated Mass, which Bishop Bernard Hubert presided over. At the end of his homily, in which he praised the virtues of the saintly Indian, His Excellency designated the Mission Church as one of the four in the Diocese of St. John of Quebec where the Holy Year indulgence may be gained.

APRIL 17 AT BARCELONA

On Sunday, April 17, for the second year, the Catalonian friends of Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha in Barcelona gathered together at 11 o'clock a.m. in the Jesuit Chapel of Our Lady of Fatima (13, Roger de Lluria St.). The Barcelonians have a special right to celebrate the Lily of the Mohawks, for it's in their cathedral that the first four Indian converts were baptized in 1493.

Fr. Sebastian Bartíma, S.I., blessed a new terra cotta statue of Kateri, the work of Miss Alícia Tello, who offered flowers for the altar with part of the fee she had received for the drawing of the Resurrection that appeared in the last Spring issue of Kateri. Fr. Bartíma, who had prayed at Kateri's tomb in Kahnawake four months after her beatification, gave the homily and concluded by asking Kateri's protection on the environment, as well as her protection against the abuse of technology; he also requested that she help one and all to understand the real meaning of life. During the liturgy, the assistance sang goigs, Catalonian hymns written for the occasion. At the end of the Eucharistic Celebration, Fr. Bartíma took the statue of Kateri in his arms and everyone approached to venerate it.

APRIL 24 AT ST. REGIS



The St. Regis Iroquois graciously decided to honor Kateri on April 24 instead of April 17 so as to avoid confusion with

the Kahnawake festivities. The pro-

gram scheduled a Concelebration at the Mission church, which was filled to capacity. The Vice-Postulator, in his homily, spoke of Blessed Kateri's prudence, proper to the strong of heart. After the liturgy, a banquet prepared by the women of St. Regis was served at the parish hall in Hogansburg, N.Y., which is part of the Mission. A well-known Indian, Mr. Iron Eyes Cody attended Mass and was the guest of honor at the Kateri Hall. After the excellent meal for which the St. Regis women are renowned, Mr. Cody autographed his picture for the youngsters and their parents. The next day he went to Kahnawake to pray at Blessed Kateri's tomb, before visiting the schools of the village. Special thanks are due to Mr. Thomas Constantino of Amsterdam, N.Y., for having brought Mr. Iron Eyes Cody to the two Missions in order to show his love for the Lily of the Mohawks.

OUR LADY OF **FATIMA HONORED**

At the cathedral of Mary Queen of the World in Montreal, thanks to the efforts of Miss Odette Beaudoin, as many as 19 ethnic groups rendered homage to Our Lady of Fatima on May 13, anniversary of her first apparition in 1917. At the Offertory, members of each party vested in their national costumes offered an appropriate gift to Archbishop Grégoire, who was presiding over the Concelebration. Sr. Marie Laura Simon, C.N.D., a Mohawk herself, representing the Amerindians, presented him with a jewel of a beaded turtle, symbol of Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha's clan.

OUR LADY OF FATIMA AT THE SHRINE OF OUR LADY OF MARTYRS

On May 13, 1983, in the Vatican gardens, the Holy Father unveiled and blessed a statue of Our Lady of Fatima, the work of Sculptor Frederick Shrady. His Holiness wanted it as a token of his gratitude to Our Lady for having saved him from death on May 13, 1981, anniversary of the first apparition of the Mother of God at Fatima in 1917.

On May 29, at the Shrine of Our Lady of Martyrs at Auriesville, N.Y., His Excellency Bishop Edward J. Maginn, former Auxiliary of Albany, unveiled and blessed an identical statue of Our Lady of Fatima. "Let this statue," reads the day's program, "and also what it represents be a visible expression of the love of the people for the Mother of God and for our Holy Father who reigns over the church of her people, acknowledging their renewed faith in building a stronger bond between God, church, and country."

In the evening, a banquet was served in the beautiful Shrine Cafeteria close by the Coliseum, followed by a symposium on the glories of Mary, organized by Fr. Robert I. Boyle, S.J., Director of the Shrine, by Fr. Louis A. Devaney, S.J., missionary in Columbia, and by Mr. Thomas B. Constantino, President of the Noteworthy Company of Amsterdam, N.Y. Sr. Mary Miranda, Directress of the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Francis the Holy House at the Blue Army Shrine, Washington, N.J., enthusiastically described the ever growing devotion to Our Lady of Fatima. Fr. Joseph S. McBride, Vice-Postulator for Blessed Kateri in U.S.A., spoke beautifully about Our Lady and the Lily of the Mohawks. The Mohawk Beata was certainly present at her birthplace on this day set aside to honor Our Lady whom she had so loved during her short life on earth.

THE FIRST FRIDAY CLUB IN PLATTSBURG

On the occasion of the first Friday of June, invited by Bro. Richard Côté, O.M.I., Messers. Paul Lafontaine and Romuald Lesage, the Vice-Postulator was at Plattsburg NY to offer the monthly mass for the First Friday Club and give the homily on the three loves of Blessed Kateri. He was the guest of the Oblate Fathers who graciously received him at their historic St. Peter's parish, but celebrated the liturgy in a special room at the Howard Johnson restaurant, where lunch was later served. Brother Côté is soon leaving for a five-year stint at Tahiti, where he intends to spread devotion to Blessed Kateri.

LETTER FROM SPOKANE



NCLOSED are two pictures of what seems to be an ancient church and shrine to Kateri (spelled Cateri by the shrinemakers). The sender is a friend who writes from Montana.

I will quote from his recent letter about the pictures:

"I am enclosing two pictures of a Kateri Shrine and humble church along the highway west of Duluth, Minnesota. I took these pictures when we lived at Cass Lake, Minn., and I worked with the Consolidated Chippewa Agency there. That was about 37 years ago and my memory fails me as to the exact location, but I think it must have been near Floodwood, possibly on the Fond-du-Lac Indian Reservation.

REGIONAL TEKAKWITHA CONFERENCE AT ST. REGIS MAY 20-22

Approximately 200 people representing five Indian nations as well as those engaged in ministries among native Americans gathered at the St. Regis-Akwesasne Reservation on the weekend of May 20-22 to participate in the Second Annual Tekakwitha Conference for the region of northeastern United States and eastern Canada.

At the first regional meeting at LeMoyne College in Syracuse in June 1982, St. Regis delegates had offered to host the next conference. The offer was promptly accepted in hopes that because of its unique location on the New York-Ontario-Quebec border St. Regis would draw some of the Indian peoples of eastern Canada to the conference. In the view of Fathers Thomas F. Egan, S.J. and Robert L. Fleig, S.J. who are finishing their first year of service at St. Regis these hopes were fully realized. Not only were there ten delegates from the Mohawk community in St. Lucy's Parish, Syracuse and several other Iroquois people from Buffalo, Rochester and Utica, but also ten participants from the historic Mohawk mission of St. Francis Xavier in Kahnawake, Quebec, eight Algonquins who came with their pastor from Maniwaki in northern Quebec, and 26 Objibways representing a half dozen settlements along the shores of North Channel and Lake Superior in Ontario.

Dr. Solomon Cook, retiring senior chief of the American Tribal Council, welcomed the delegates when they assembled on Friday at 8 p.m. in the Kateri Hall in Hogansburg, New York. The theme of the conference, "A Journey with Blessed Kateri," was explained and the prayer for Kateri's canonization which opened the meeting was repeated at the start of each session.

Father Gilbert Hemauer, O.F.M. Cap., president of the National Tekakwitha Conference in Great Falls, Montana, used the opening address to give a brief account of the beginnings of the organization in 1940 and its phenomenal growth since the beatification of Kateri in 1980. Father Henri Béchard, S.J. of Montreal, vice-postulator of the Kateri cause in Canada, then spoke on the spirituality of Kateri, stressing the influence of the Blessed Mother on her conversion and subsequent spiritual growth and recalling how Blessed Kateri's last words were "Jesus, Mary."

The final portion of the first session consisted in a service of prayer and healing conducted by the Kateri Music Ministry and directed by Rev. Mr. Murray Sayers of Batchwana, Ontario, first married deacon among the Objibway people.

Next morning under the guidance of Sister Kateri Mitchell, S.S.A. the main workday of the conference was launched with an audio-visual reflection on Blessed Kateri and her impact on the Indians of today. A native of St. Regis who spent the past 17 years as a teacher in two of the reservation schools and eventually as principal of the Akwesasne Mohawk School on Cornwall Island, Sister Kateri, had been the major force behind the planning of the conference and coordinator of the various committees until her departure for a new assignment last Mach.

Rt. Rev. Msgr. Paul A. Lenz, executive secretary of the Bureau of Catholic Indian Missions in Washington, D.C., described for the delegates the workings of his bureau and the various forms of assistance which it is able to funnel from the American bishops to the various Indians schools and congregations throughout the United States. In addition to the support it gives to the activities of the Tekakwitha Conference the Bureau presently seeks to promote two objectives: the canonization of Blessed Kateri and the selection of a native American priest as the first Indian member of the American hierarchy.

Deacon Sayers and his wife, Betsy, representing the Objibway and William Mitchell and Mrs. Felicia Jock representing the St. Regis Community served as a panel of speakers for the workshop on family life. By this time the morning was over and the delegates adjourned to the nearby Mohawk School to enjoy a luncheon which Mrs. Mary Frances and her daughters of St. Regis Village had volunteered to prepare.

A second workshop, scheduled for the early afternoon, dealt with Alcohol and Drug Abuse. Mrs. Marlene Scott, counselor on alcohol addiction at Kahnawake, and Mrs. Lois Terrance, director of the Partridge House at St. Regis, both gave presentations and then fielded a barrage of questions from the floor. The final workshop on Indian Identity and Cultural Traditions brought together Henry Lickers, a native of Brantford, Ontario, now serving as environmental adviser with the St. Regis Canadian Band Council, and Henry George of Utica, New York, for many years the Mohawk Iron Workers representative in that city, who provided insights on the views, both of those who adhere to traditional beliefs and those who come from a Christian background of three centuries.

A late afternoon liturgy in the Kateri Hall brought the delegates a sense of togetherness, as many admitted, when the principal concelebrant, Father Réal Paiement, O.M.I., pastor at Maniwaki, led them in the votive mass in honor of Blessed Kateri. The homilist, Father Michael Stogre, S.J. of Toronto, spoke of how the gospel message was intended by God to take root in each distinct culture developed within the human family. Mrs. Anne Scheuerman of

Pittsford, N.Y. of the faculty of Monroe Community College in Rochester, was chosen to read the petitions before the offertory, Both the Objibway members of the Kateri Music Ministry and the Akwesasne Singers of St. Regis contributed to the music at the mass, while Richard Sayers of Iron Bridge, Ont. and John White of St. Regis presented solo hymns in honor of Blessed Kateri. The final blessing was given with the first class relic of Kateri after which all present were given the opportunity to venerate this relic.

After an evenng meal at the Mohawk School and a period of relaxation both out-of-town and local delegates returned to the Kateri Hall for an evening of entertainment at which they alternatively were treated to Indian social dances with accompaniment by Mohawk tribal singers and drummers and to country western music and square dancing.

Bright and early next morning delegates assembled for a "wrap-up" session of the conference. Father Hemauer first presented a summary of events, then spoke of the direction in which the Tekak-witha Conference movement seemed to be taking. After a spirited discussion from the floor a committee was appointed to select a site for next year's regional conference and in a meeting held before the adjournment the committee members recommended acceptance of an invitation from LeMoyne College to bring it back to Syracuse next year.

At 11 a.m. conference delegates joined regular worshippers for the festive mass of Pentecost in the historic church of St. John Francis Regis on Quebec soil just 500 yards north of the New York border. Father George Mathieu, a Potowatomie of the Diocese of LaCrosse, Wisconsin, one of the seven native priests to assist Pope John Paul II at the beatification mass in 1980, was chosen to be principal concelebrant. As part of the penitential service sweet grass was ignited and then blessed as a native substitute for incense. Each of the priest concelebrants was then asked to spread the smoke and fumes of the sweet grass over his body in a prayer that God might purify him before entering upon the sacred mysteries. The prayer of the faithful was offered in Mohawk, Seneca, Objibway, Algonquin, Potowatomie, and English.

Homilist at the mass was Father Frank R. Haig, S.J., LeMoyne College president, who early this year instituted an Iroquois Studies Program as part of the college curriculum.

All the priests taking part in the conference served as concelebrants at the two masses. In addition to those already mentioned above these included Father Jacques Bruyère, S.J., of the Jesuit Mission Bureau in Montreal; Father Robert D. Cloney, S.J., master of novices at St. Andrew Hall, Syracuse, for the Jesuits of the New

York Province; Father Leon Lajoie, S.J., pastor of St. Francis Xavier Church, Kahnawake, Quebec; Father Bernard Mayhew, S.J., of the Jesuit urban ministry to Indians in Toronto; Father Joseph S. McBride, S.J., vice-postulator of the cause of Blessed Kateri in the United States with headquarters at Auriesville; Father Richard Sturtz, professor of history at Wadhams Hall Seminary, Ogdensburg, N.Y., and Father Ted Zuern, S.J., director of the Jesuit Social Ministries in Washington, D.C.

A farewell banquet, which still another parishioner, Mrs. Ruth Herne, had volunteered to prepare, gave the delegates a final occasion to reminisce and plan future contacts. Acknowledgments were made to Father Fleig through whose efforts many out-of-town delegates were drawn to the conference and the list of speakers and panelists arranged, to Mrs. Louise Cook, who had succeeded Sister Kateri as coordinator, to Sister Kathleen Navarra, S.S.J., C.C.D. directress at St. Regis, who with Fr. Fleig planned the two liturgies, to Mrs. Elaine Ransom Cook, who found homes for all the visitors, and to Mrs. Elizabeth Jacobs, Mrs. Mary Garrow, Mrs. Ruth Papineau and Mrs. Harriet La France, who as hospitality experts, anticipated every need.

An unusual feature of the conference lay in the provisions made to house all out-of-town guests on a personal basis. Visiting priests were accommodated in nearby rectories, sisters were welcomed in area convents, and lay delegates were lodged in the home of St. Regis parishioners. There was general agreement that this arrangement made the conference a warm, family event from the start.

PROGRESS

(Continued)

(On March 15, 1932, Bishop Gibbons of Albany requested additional faculties from Archbishop Gauthier of Montreal to proceed with the Cause of Kateri Tekakwitha.)

A RCHBISHOP GAUTHIER did not need to be asked twice and on March 18, 1932, he granted Bishop Gibbons all the necessary faculties and privileges.

On the preceding day, in Rome, the Postulator General, Msgr. Breslin, had named Fr. John J. Wynne, S.J., Vice-Postulator for the Cause of Kateri Tekakwitha, a position that he had held until then without having been officially named to do so. At the rectory of the Albany Cathedral, the new Vice-Postulator formally gave notice that the Informative Process on the reputation of holiness, on the virtues and miracles of the Iroquois Maiden, was over and invited Bishop Gibbons to call the Process of non-cult, without which the beatification of the young Indian maiden could not take place.

The priests present, future members of the Tribunal de non cultu, were told, if they did not already know, that His Excellency had forwarded the documents concerning the Informative Process to His Eminence Camillo Cardinal Laurenti, Prefect of the Congregation of Rites. Fr. Joseph M. Congedo, pastor of the parish of the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and of Mary in New York had served as courier.

The time had now come for Bishop Gibbons to launch the important process on non-cult. He set about it on the spot by appointing to the Tribunal,

Fr. Joseph Delaney, Judge Delegate; Frs. Michael Looney and Henry Miller, Assistant Judges; Fr. John Glavin, Promoter of the Faith, popularly known as the "Devil's Advocate," Fr. James H. Hilden, Notary, and Fr. Joseph Kelly, Messenger.

On the morning of July 12, all the members took the usual oaths: that of secrecy, which bound even Bishop Gibbons under pain of excommunication reserved to the Holy Father; that of not accepting gifts, of faithfully fulfilling their duties and of aiming positively at the success of the mission; of speaking the truth and

of being careful about the accuracy of the statements made by the witnesses after their recorded testimony has been read back to them. As the Postulator in Rome, the Vice-Postulator must take the oath to preclude calumny, in other words that he would speak the truth throughout the process, and that in promoting the cause before the tribunal he would not use fraud or deception of any kind.

For the following session, the Vice-Postulator had carefully prepared a series of articles about which he intended to question in detail Fr. Charles J. Mullaly, S.J., National Director of the *Messenger of the Sacred Heart* from New York; Fr. Peter F. Cusick, S.J., from the Shrine of Our Lady of the Martyrs at Auriesville, N.Y., where Sts. Isaac Jogues, René Goupil, and John de La Lande were martyred and where Kateri Tekakwitha was born; Fr. Arthur Mélançon, S.J., archivist at St. Mary's College in Montreal; Fr. Conrad Hauser, S.J., pastor at the Mission of St. Francis Xavier of Caughnawaga, where the Mohawk Maiden attained union with God; Fr. John J. McGrath, S.J., from the Auriesville Shrine; and Fr. Joseph H. O'Connor, pastor at Fonda, N.Y., where Kateri was baptized.

Here are Fr. Wynne's articles or propositions:

1. That is was and is true that the Servant of God Catherine Tekakwitha departed this life 17 April, 1680, at the Mission of St. Francis Xavier on the St. Lawrence River, in Canada, and that her sanctity and singular graces won the great esteem of her people; that a great crowd of them came to view her remains at the house where they were exposed until her funeral; that a multitude of people attended her obsequies and her burial in the cemetery of the Mission. Because of the renown of holiness of this Servant of God, which is widespread, a great many still visit the place of her burial. However, in all this, there never has been, nor is there now, any sign of solemn and ecclesiastical, public workship by which the decree of Urban VIII, of holy Memory has been violated...

2. That, to satisfy the desire of the faithful, because of the renown of holiness of the Servant of God, her images have been painted, carved, and cast, but they have never borne raised aureolas, diadems or the inscription of Blessed or Saint, or any other that would indicate public veneration or worship...

3. That the images of the Servant of God, whether painted or carved, or cast, have never been exposed for the public veneration of the faithful in churches or in oratories or in any other sacred place; they have never been carried in processions or hung upon her tomb; nor placed in churches or oratories alongside the images of the Saints and Blessed...

4. That the relics of the Servant of God, although eagerly sought after, have never been placed upon the altar, exposed for public veneration, or carried in processions, or placed alongside of the relics of the Saints or Blessed. Nor have lamps or candles or other lights been lit at her tomb or before her images or relics...

5. That although a great many favors are attributed to the intercession of the Servant of God, still when thank-offerings to God are made, for favors obtained, through her invocation, they are never placed as votive tablets or in any other form at her tomb or in church or in any other public place, but kept in a separate and private place. . .

6. That, before the painted or carved images of the Servant of

God or at her sepulchre or in any other place, there are found no eulogies, epitaphs, inscriptions, which give or suggest the title of saint or blessed or any other, which might indicate public worship. Moreover, although the aforesaid Servant of God is considered by all as a Saint never by word or mouth, writing, whether public or private, in manuscript or in type, is she honored by the title of saint or blessed. Nor are eulogies pronounced of her which imply public or ecclesiastical worship...

At two o'clock in the afternoon of July 12, the witnesses gathered in the rectory of the Albany cathedral, where they took the oaths of speaking the truth, of secrecy and of not mentioning anything concerning the process except to the judges of the Tribunal. Then followed the interrogations, the answers of which fully confirmed the six articles, with only two exceptions. To the question, "Do you know a book or manuscript in which the Servant of God Catherine Tekakwitha is called 'Saint' or 'Blessed'?", Fr. Mullaly replied, "Yes, I know of a typewritten English translation of a biography of the Servant of God, Catherine Tekakwitha, from the original French biography, the title of which reads as following, La Vie de la - B - Catherine Tekakwitha by Fr. Claude Chauchetière, of the Society of Jesus. In this translation of the French original, the English translator gives to the letter - B. - the meaning of the English word 'Blessed.' In my opinion, this is a faulty translation, seeing that the letter - B - of the French biography apparently means 'Bonne,' Furthermore, this English typewritten document was not widely distributed and consequently the error of the English translator did not result in the violation of the Decrees of Urban VIII."

The pastor of St. Cecilia's at Fonda, N.Y., Fr. Joseph M. O'Connor, to the question, "Is there an image or a statue of Catherine Tekakwitha in your church?" answered, "There is no statue in the church but there is a stained glass window in an inconspicuous place in the church namely, behind the organ, representing Catherine Tekakwitha."

To the next question, "Have you seen any image or statue of her with any sign that would indicate 'Blessed' or 'Saint' or public worship of her?", the priest replied, "The glass window, which I have mentioned above, has a halo, it had been placed there by a non-Catholic artist in the year 1926 as a donation of a non-Catholic lady. After the window had been placed, the artist called me to look at it. When I saw the halo I called His Excellency's attention to it, who told me to change it. Never was any public worship held and Bishop Gibbons was able to see for himself on March 6, 1939, that the halo had been replaced by a colored glass."

On the following July 21 at two o'clock in the afternoon, Bishop Gibbons, the Judges of the Tribunal, the Promotor of the Faith and the Notary for the Cause gathered together in the sacristy of the church of the Jesuit Fathers in the old Mission of St. Francis

Xavier of Caughnawaga, today Kahnawake. Appeared before them, Fr. Benedict Dechêne, S.J., who, after having sworn to tell the truth, answered among others, two important questions concerning the place of internment of Kateri Tekakwitha and the absence of any forbidden cult relative to her. He had no doubts about it, since, for three centuries, pligrims visited her tomb; the Indians themselves never had any misgivings concerning its whereabouts. For three centuries also, never was there any public cult in relation to the Servant of God Catherine Tekakwitha. The next witness was Fr. Conrad Hauser, S.J., who expressed himself in just about the same way.

The little group of clerics then proceeded to Côte Ste Catherine de la Prairie, exactly where the Mission of St. Francis Xavier was located in 1680. Bishop Gibbons, the Tribunal and the Promotor of the Faith carefully examined the cenotaph erected by Fr. Walworth. The Iroquois inscription *Onkweonweke Katsitsiio Teotsitsianekaron* worried them. What did it signify? Fr. Hauser translated it for them: "The most beautiful flower that ever bloomed among Indians." It did not contain even the slightest indication of public worship.

Thereupon, returning to the 18th-century rectory, they visited in detail the church built in 1845 by Fr. Marcoux. They faithfully followed the prescriptions of Canon Law and examined closely the altars, statues, columns, the sanctuary and the sacristy, and especially the ebony chest containing the remains of Kateri Tekakwitha. They looked for votive plaques, lettered in Kateri's honor, epitaphs indicating public cult. Everything was in order, no illegitimate manifestation of worship was to be found.

The diocesan Informative Process on the reputation of holiness of Kateri Tekakwitha did not call for a sentence nor, of course, did that of her writings. This was not the case, however, for the Process of non-cult. On August 5, 1932, at two o'clock in the afternoon, the customary hour of these reunions, at the rectory of the cathedral of Albany, Fr. Joseph A. Delaney, Delegate Judge, formally pronounced the sentence of non-cult in the presence of the Bishop, the other judges, the other members of the tribunal, and the Vice-Postulator, to their great satisfaction.

From heaven, Blessed Francis de Laval, first Bishop of Quebec, whose territory took in the Mohawk Valley during Kateri's lifetime, must have smiled down benignly on the Bishop of Albany and on Fr. John Wynne. They had well played their roles, for the Cause of the Mohawk Maiden's canonization had at last gathered momentum.

On Sunday, September 11, 1932, at the Shrine of the Jesuit Martyrs at Auriesville, N.Y., the very spot where, according to Pius XII, Kateri Tekakwitha was born from the blood of the Martyrs Isaac Jogues and of his Companions, the Diocesan Tribunal for the Cause of Beatification and Canonization held its last meeting. Bishop

Gibbons set the episcopal seal to the documents furnished by the Tribunal as proof of the absence of illegitimate cult concerning the Servant of God Kateri Tekakwitha, and handed them over to Fr. Wynne, Vice-Postulator, to see that they reach the Eternal City.


