TOWARDS THE END OF 1677, when Tekakwitha was preparing for baptism, her devotion to the Blessed Virgin increased. From Tionnontoguen, the capital of the Mohawk canton, came astounding news. Fr. Jacques Bruyas had received a miraculous statue of Our Lady of Foye from Belgium.

On the feast of the Immaculate Conception, he solemnly unveiled it. The Christian Iroquois sang the litanies of the Blessed Virgin in their language. From that day on, the same ceremony was repeated every Saturday evening. Then, on Sundays, the statue was exposed to the eyes of the faithful, who gathered together to recite the rosary. The heavenly Mother soon showed her appreciation. The Christians of long date renewed their initial fervor and, from day to day, the number of converts increased. Even more surprising, the unbelievers declared that since the arrival of the Mother of lesos in their village, they no longer feared anything.

At Gandaouague where Tekakwitha lived, many of the inhabitants were full of admiration for these changes. Many Christians and sympathizers went to Tionnontoguen to pray. Despite the winter cold and the fifteen miles that separated the two villages, Tekakwitha probably accompanied them. Her tender devotion to Mary would have inspired her to do so.

Even if the young catechumen was unable to make it to the chief town of the canton, she was still favored with the blessings the pilgrims to Tionnontoguen enjoyed. The reports about their visits to the Immaculate stimulated her love. From that time onwards, quite often during the day, she turned to the Blessed Mother and prayed: "Wari tsiati ioianerenstakwa..." On her lips the Hail Mary was a song of love.

During the Christmas season, let us imitate Blessed Kateri. Let us repeat time and time again, tenderly, with words of fire, the Hail Mary! And why not say some of these Hail Marys at the Lady chapel of the nearest church? It would help us all to live a truly Marian year.

SISTERS OF BLESSED KATERI TEKAKWITHA

During her lifetime, Kateri Tekakwitha tried to found a community of native Sisters, but was unsuccessful.



Now her dream Sr. Clare Xavier comes true as

the following lines taken from a recent issue of" Tekakwitha Notes," published by the Mohawk community of Saint Lucy's Church, Syracuse, N.Y., reveal. "On Pentecost weekend, June 5, 1987, the first Native American Religious Congregation in the name of Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha began. The foundress is Sr. Clare Xavier of White Earth, Minnesota. The Congregation began in Waukesha, Wisconsin where Sister Clare attended the workshop of the Fellowship of Catholic Communities. This fellowship was formed to aid new religious communities, which are just getting started, to take the right steps and to avoid making mistakes. Those with experience were very helpful to the newly formed groups and they were very helpful and encouraging to Sr. Clare Xavier.

"The Sisters of Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha will work with the poor and will also work with Native Americans. Their habits will be of the Native American style dress.

"Last summer Sr. Clare attended classes at the Good Counsel Summer School, of Waverly, Nebraska, conducted by the Institute on Religious Life, under the direction of Fr. John Hardon, S.J. This was a program of theology and spirituality for novice mistresses and formation directresses. We urge all the young ladies to think about serving the Lord through this Congregation. BLESSED KATERI HONORED IN BUFFALO, N.Y.



Fr. Walter Kern, pastor of the beautiful Romanesque church of the Blessed Trinity in Buffalo, N.Y., and headquarters for the Catholic Indians of the city, advised the Kateri Center he had had several plaques of Saints and Blesseds carved by the South Towns Wood Carvers. Among them. Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha and St. John Neumann. "Each saint's plaque has several symbols to indicate his or her life and/or virtues. Blessed Kateri has a turtle (her clan), the rosary (her prayer life), the crucifix (her reparation) and the lily (her purity). Her clothing is simple (humble and simple lifestyle in ordinary circumstances) and her hair is braided (natural beauty enhanced by her inner holiness of life)."

"Each saint," he added, "has an ordinary face, rather than the Hollywood-type of glamourous face so frequent in the iconography of saints. This is to stress that sanctity is not supposed to be unusual but rather the outcome of a good life of Christ-like virtue in our own state in life, which we live with a great deal of love."

BLESSED KATERI CELEBRATION AT ST. LUCY'S CHURCH

The Kateri mass celebration was held on Sunday, April 26, at the 12:00 mass. We were joined by the congregation of St. Lucy's parish and friends from the Sr. Regis Mohawk reserve, the Onondaga reserve, the Algonquins from Maniwaki and Syracuse, friends from Rochester, Utica, Pittsford

and Auriesville. It was a very happy and heart-warming celebration for our Blessed Kateri with a ceremonial blessing of the sacred pipe and sweet grass. Everyone was invited to a feast after the Mass.

TWO VICE-POSTULATORS COMPARE NOTES



Blessed Rupert Mayer, S.J.

Father Thomas Egan, S.J., pastor of the St. Regis Iroquois Mission, had served as a chaplain in the American army and, during his stay in Germany, had become a close friend of Father Karl B. Sieben, S.J. In early spring, Father Egan learned that his friend, who is Vice-Postulator for the Cause of Canonization of Father Rupert Mayer, S.J., would be in Canada during the summer. Unfortunately, Father Tom was unable to welcome him, for he was away at Berkley taking a course in pastoral theology.

Maniwaki and Syracuse, friends from Rochester, Utica, Pittsford years of age, with his competent

secretary, Fraulein Steffi Diepold, arrived at the end of June. Pope John Paul II had beatified Father Mayer earlier in the year and the Vice-Postulator wanted to promote devotion to him among the German communities established from Vancouver to Halifax. During his short stay in Montreal, it was my privilege to receive him as Vice-Postulator for Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha. We spent the evening of July 15, together. It was a very pleasant meeting for we were able to compare notes.

I learned that Blessed Rupert had met Adolf Hitler in the political arena as early as 1919, that he quickly denounced him and made it clear in public that in his view a German Catholic could never be a Nazi. He spent many years in concentration camp, but survived the war to take up his ministry again, among the poor and handicapped. He died on November 1, 1945. As a young Jesuit, Father Sieben had known Blessed Rupert.

The next morning, July 16, my Indian secretary, Mr. Albert Lazare, drove us with Fraulein Diepold to Kahnawake. Father and I offered the Holy Sacrifice and afterwards prayed at Blessed Kateri's tomb, before dining at the rectory with the personnel, who were interested in Blessed Rupert's life. To top off his stay in Montreal, in the afternoon, we visited the beautiful Basilica of Notre-Dame and the St. Joseph Oratory. All in all, it was a stimulating experience.

MAINE PASSAMAQUODDY HOST N.E. CONFERENCE

This year, the Passamaquoddy Indian tribe of Princeton, Maine hosted the Northeast Regional Tekakwitha Conference. With 400 conferees in attendance, the meetings were enlightening, enjoyable, and successful. Many new friendships were made as life events were shared. "A Journey of Inner Healing" was the theme of the gathering. Fr. John Spencer, whose work zeros in on drug and alcohol abuse, spoke of his success with helping children through the use of his puppets called BABES.

From St. Regis Reserve and Syracuse came fifty native Americans, who traveled the 600 miles from New York State in a chartered bus. They lent completion to the conference with their skills of singing, dancing, and acting. "Life of Tekakwitha" by the St. Lucy's Kateri Actors was deeply moving.

The closing Mass was celebrated by Auxiliary Bishop Proulx of the Diocese of Portland, He rededicated the lovely St. Anne's Church and recommissioned some twelve Eucharistis Ministers.

POPE JOHN PAUL II MEETS NATIVE AMERICANS AT PHOENIX

Mother Angelica, I am told, declared that the highlight of the Holy Father's visit to Phoenix, Arizona was his meeting with the Native Americans from the United States, from Mexico, and from Canada. The encounter took place at 4:30 p.m. in the Veterans' Memorial Plaza, where some 10,125 members of the Tekakwitha Conference awaited him.

Pope John Paul II entered the Coliseum through an entry covered with Navajo rugs and was taken to the center of the building by an honor guard in full regalia, where he was welcomed by Bishop Donald E. Pelotte, coadjutor of the Ordinary of Gallup, N.M., and the first bishop of Native American descent in the U.S.A.


The ornate chair to which the pope was led was on a rotating central stage. It was made of solid ash, with designs carved by David Montour, a Delaware Mohawk, and included inlays of turquoise, ivory, and coral designed by Dennis Numkena, a member of the Hopi tribe. A good deal of the work was by silversmith Richard Aguilar, a San Domingo Pueblo Indian.

Emmett White, a Pima Indian, began the ceremony by presenting an eagle feather symbolizing strength and honor to the Holy Father, who held the feather on high and then clasped it to his heart.

Much applause greeted Bishop Donald Pelotte of the Abnaki nation as he began to welcome the pope. More applause followed when he called for the canonization of Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha, the "Lily of the Mohawks."

Vice-President Alfretta M. Antone, of the Salt River Pima-Maricopa community addressed His Holiness on behalf of the Native Americans.

In his response, Pope John Paul II warmly praised the Mohawk maiden whom he called "the best-known witness of Christian holiness among the native peoples of North America."

ALFRETTA ANTONE'S ADDRESS TO THE HOLY FATHER

Your Holiness, Pope John Paul II, we welcome you and thank you for this sacred time together. We are affirmed and encouraged by your support of Native Peoples throughout the world. We respect you as a great spiritual leader and pray that you can help us on our road of life today.

As we approach five hundred years of Catholic Christianity in the Americas, we pray that all who come to this land will respect our grandparents who have lived on this land for over fifty thousand years. Upon initial contact with Europeans, we shared the land given us by our Creator and taught others how to survive here. History, however, stands as a witness to the use and abuse we have experienced in our homelands.

Today, little remains of the gifts and richness which our Creator has shared with us, the original peoples of these lands. We ask you to intervene with all people of good will to preserve our homelands for our families, our children and the generations to follow us.

We choose not only to survive, but to live fully. We want to live in harmony with all people and all of creation. We choose to keep alive for all generations the ways of living carved in the stones and bones of our ancestors. We are open to share and receive whatever is good for the life of the human family with all people of good will. Our traditions, our languages, our cultures with their rich teachings and values, our songs and dances, our stories and paintings, our art and ways of living, celebrate who we are as people of many tribes.

We pray that our governments and all our rights as distinct peoples be honored and respected. We ask Your Holiness to do all in your prayer, power and influence to help us secure, for our present and future generations, the following:

First, that our people be recognized, respected and treated as equals;

Second, that our people determine our own destiny, develop our own lands and resources, plan and make our own decisions in all matters that are properly our own: Third, that our sacred ways and prayers be respected;

Fourth, that we all learn to live in harmony as brothers and sisters on our Mother Earth:

Fifth, that racism, bigotry and a sense of superiority be laid to rest in our times:

Sixth, that the United States and other governments honor the solemn agreements and treaties they have made with us which safeguard our lands, waters and other natural resources;

Seventh, that just compensation be given for our lands which were taken illegally through theft or violation of treaties with our ancestors;

Eighth, that governments, churches and all people of good will share the goods and resources of Mother Earth so that our people can walk, tall, side-by-side with all people;

Ninth, that the Native American people be given the opportunity for a fair share in the resources of the world to provide the necessary housing, health care and general well-being;

Tenth, that our people share equally in the educational, health and social benefits of the Americas:

Eleventh, that our youth be given the necessary support and encouragement to work for a just present and future of our people:

Twelfth, that our people be strengthened in our resolve to overcome the alcohol and drug dependancies which have brought us such great suffering.

We recognize that our Native brothers and sisters come from many distinct tribes. We pray that we can work together in unity and mutual respect for both our individual and common good.

We also recognize that many of our Native brothers and sisters have exercised their freedom of religion by following either their own traditional sacred ways, another world religion or other Christian traditions. Many of us have chosen the Roman Catholic way of walking with Jesus, speaking His truth and living His life of grace.

As Roman Catholics, we Native Peoples ask Your Holiness to strengthen and affirm us. Until recent times, many of our people have turned away from the Church. Holy Father, we have always respected the one God, who made all and who is without beginning. The Creator has given us a way of life on Mother Earth. As Catholic Natives, we have come to know Jesus as the Son of God who loves us and lives with us. The Holy Spirit works in many ways

through our people. We are encouraged by the support the Roman Catholic Church gives us in affirming the beauty and value of our traditional prayers and ceremonies.

Our people are sharing their own cultural gifts in living and celebrating the mysteries of our Catholic faith. Our languages, which we treasure, are now even spoken by some of the missionaries. Yet, we still need your help and guidance in certain areas:

First, as Native Peoples, we seek to follow Jesus Christ in the languages and cultures which God has given us.

Second, we seek a fuller participation in the life of the Universal Church as bishops, priests, deacons, religious, catechists and in all lay ministries.

Third, we seek a fuller inclusion of our cultural gifts and languages in the sacramental life of the Church.

Fourth, we seek the canonization of Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha. This young Mohawk woman has given our people a beautiful example of a Native person living out the Christian Gospel. Through her help, our people are being gathered to the Church.

Your Holiness, as Native Peoples, we are affirmed in our journey and encouraged in our work through your love and support of us. We pray that God will continue to bless you and your ministry.

In the name of all Native Americans, we ask Your Holiness for Your blessing and guidance as we walk together with God as we live here on Mother Earth and for all time to come.





POPE JOHN PAUL II's RESPONSE

Dear Brothers and Sisters.

1. I have greatly looked forward to this visit with you, the original peoples of this vast country. I greet you with love and respect. I thank you for inviting me to be with you and for sharing with me some aspects of your rich and ancient culture.

I have listened to your concerns and hopes. As your representative spoke, I traced in my heart the history of your tribes and nations. I was able to see you as the noble descendants of countless generations of inhabitants of this land, whose ways were marked by great respect for the natural resources of land and river, of forest and plain and desert. Here your forefathers cherished and sought to pass on to each new generation their customs and traditions, their history and way of life. Here they worshipped the Creator and thanked him for his gifts. In contact with the forces of nature they learned the value of prayer, of silence and fasting, of patience and courage in the face of pain and disappointment.

2. The early encounter between your traditional cultures and the European way of life was an event of such significance and change that it profoundly influences your collective life even today. That encounter was a harsh and painful reality for your peoples. The cultural oppression, the injustices, the disruption of your life and of your traditional societies must be acknowledged.

At the same time, in order to be objective, history must record the deeply positive aspects of your peoples' encounter with the culture that came from Europe. Among these positive aspects I wish to recall the work of the many missionaries who strenuously defended the rights of the original inhabitants of this land. They established missions throughout this Southwestern part of the United States. They worked to improve living conditions and set up educational systems, learning your languages in order to do

- so. Above all, they proclaimed the Good News of salvation in our Lord Jesus Christ, an essential part of which is that all men and women are equally children of God and must be respected and loved as such. This Gospel of Jesus Christ is today, and will remain forever, the greatest pride and possession of your people.
- 3. One priest who desserves special mention among the missionaries is the beloved Fray Junípero Serra, who travelled throughout Lower and Upper California. He had frequent clashes with the civil authorities over the treatment of Indians. In 1773 he presented to the Viceroy in Mexico City a Representación, which is sometimes termed a "Bill of Rights" for Indians. The Church had long been convinced of the need to protect them from exploitation. Already in 1537, my predecessor Pope Paul III proclaimed the dignity and rights of the native peoples of the Americas by insisting that they not be deprived of their freedom or the possession of their property (Pastorale Officium, May 29, 1537: DS 1495). In Spain the Dominican priest, Francisco de Vitoria, became the staunch advocate of the rights of the Indians and formulated the basis for international law regarding the rights of peoples.

Unfortunately not all the members of the Church lived up to their Christian responsibilities. But let us not dwell excessively on mistakes and wrongs, even as we commit ourselves to overcoming their present effects. Let us also be grateful to those who came to this land, faithful to the teachings of Jesus, witnesses of his new commandment of love. These men and women, with good hearts and good minds, shared knowledge and skills from their own cultures and shared their most precious heritage, the faith, as well. Now, we are called to learn from the mistakes of the past and we must work together for reconciliation and healing, as brothers and sisters in Christ.

4. It is time to think of the present and of the future. Today, people are realizing more and more clearly that we all belong to the one human family, and are meant to walk and work together in mutual respect, understanding, trust and love. Within this family each people preserves and expresses its own identity and enriches others with its gifts of culture, tradition, customs, stories, song, dance, art and skills.

From the very beginning the Creator bestowed his gifts on each people. It is clear that stereotyping, prejudice, bigotry and racism demean the human dignity which comes from the hand of the Creator and which is seen in variety and diversity. I encourage you, as native people belonging to the different tribes and nations in the East, South, West and North, to preserve and keep alive your cultures, your languages, the values and customs which have

served you well in the past and which provide a solid foundation for the future. Your customs that mark the various stages of life, your love for the extended family, your respect for the dignity and worth of every human being, from the unborn to the aged, and your stewardship and care of the earth: these things benefit not only yourselves but the entire human family.

Your gifts can also be expressed even more fully in the Christian way of life. The Gospel of Jesus Christ is at home in every people. It enriches, uplifts and purifies every culture. All of us together make up the People of God, the Body of Christ, the Church. We should all be grateful for the growing unity, presence, voice and leadership of Catholic Native Americans in the Church today.

Jesus speaks of the word of God as the seed which falls on good ground and produces abundant fruit (cf. Mt 13:4ff.). The seed has long since been planted in the hearts of many of you. And it has already produced the fruits which show its transforming power — the fruits of holiness. The best known witness of Christian holiness among the native peoples of North America is Kateri Tekakwitha, whom I had the privilege, seven years ago, of declaring "Blessed" and of holding up to the whole Church and the world as an outstanding example of Christian life. Even when she dedicated herself fully to Jesus Christ, to the point of taking the prophetic step of making a vow of perpetual virginity, she always remained what she was, a true daughter of her people, following her tribe in the hunting seasons and continuing her devotions in the environment most suited to her way of life, before a rough cross carved by herself in the forest. The Gospel of Jesus Christ, which is the great gift of God's love, is never in contrast with what is noble and pure in the life of any tribe or nation, since all good things are his gifts.

5. I would like to repeat what I said at my meeting with native peoples at the Shrine of Saint Anne de Beaupré during my visit to Canada in 1984: "Your encounter with the Gospel has not only enriched you; it has enriched the Church. We are well aware that this has not taken place without its difficulties and, occasionally, its blunders. However, and you are experiencing this today, the Gospel does not destroy what is best in you. On the contrary, it enriches, as it were from within, the spiritual qualities and gifts that are distinctive of your cultures" (No. 3). The American Bishops' Statement on Native Americans rightly attests that our Caholic faith is capable of thriving "within each culture, within each nation, within each race, while remaining the prisoner of none" (Statement of May 4, 1977).

Here too I wish to urge the local Churches to be truly "catholic" in their outreach to native peoples, and to show respect and honor for their culture and all their worthy traditions. From your ranks have come a Bishop, a number of priests, many permanent deacons, men and women Religious and lay leaders. To all of you who have an active part in the Church's ministry I wish to express my gratitude and support. But the Church has some special needs at this time. And for this reason I directly appeal to you, especially to you young Native Americans, to discover if Jesus is calling you to the priesthood or to the religious life. Hear him and follow him! He will never let you down! He will lead you, in the Church, to serve your own peoples and others in the best way possible, in love and apostolic generosity.

At the same time I call upon your native Catholic communities to work together to share their faith and their gifts, to work together on behalf of all your peoples. There is much to be done in solving common problems of unemployment, inadequate health care, alcoholism and chemical dependency. You have endured much over hundreds of years and your difficulties are not yet at an end. Continue taking steps toward true human progress and toward reconciliation within your families and your communities, and among your tribes and nations.

6. One day Jesus said: "The thief comes only to steal and slaughter and destroy. I came that they might have life and have it to the full" (Jn 10:10).

Surely, the time has come for the native peoples of America to have a new life in Jesus Christ—the new life of adopted children of God, with all its consequences:

A life in justice and full human dignity!

A life of pride in their own good traditions, and of fraternal solidarity among themselves and with all their brothers and sisters in America!

A deeper life in charity and grace, leading to the fullness of eternal life in heaven!

All consciences must be **challenged**. There are real injustices to be addressed and biased attitudes to be changed. But the greatest challenge is to you yourselves, as Native Americans. You must continue to grow in respect for your own inalienable human dignity, for the gifts of Creation and Redemption as they touch your lives and the lives of your peoples. You must unyieldingly pursue your spiritual and moral goals. You must **trust** in your own future.

As Catholic Native Americans, you are called to become instruments of the healing power of Christ's love, instruments of his peace. May the Church in your midst—your own community of faith and fellowship—truly bear witness to the new life that comes from the Cross and Resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!
