



IN MY HEART

IN THE LAST ISSUE OF KATERI, I told the benefactors of Blessed Kateri's Cause that she would enshrine their names in the cockles of her heart. In just about the same way, I promised I would remember them at holy Mass and in the recitation of the Divine Office. I'm now adding my other prayers also, in particular my daily meditation and my thanksgiving after the Holy Sacrifice.

Since the appeal in favor of the Kateri quartely was launched, the Beata's friends have responded generously. More than \$60,000 have been donated, half of which has already served to cover the Center's debts, and the printing and the mailing of the 18,000 copies of each of the last two issues. The remainder shall meet the expenses of the next two issues. The friends of the Mohawk Maiden have every reason to rejoice: the Kateri quarterly will continue to appear, a necessity to stimulate devotion to her.

May I suggest another means that is not to be neglected: request the favor of Kateri's canonization in frequent communions and in attentive prayer, recite your daily Our Father, Hail Mary and three Glory Be's for this intention, a custom going back to 1683.

BLESSED KATERI'S FEASTDAY

April 17 was the 309th anniversary of Kateri's holy death at Kahnawake. This year the celebration took place at her heavenly birthplace, on Sunday, April 16. Bishop Bernard Hubert of Saint-Jean-Longueuil presided the liturgy at quarter past twelve. About forty Knights of Columbus in full regalia from the Mission, from Montreal and from New York State enhanced the ceremony.

At Oka, on the same day, at the Annunciation parish, the Pastor, Fr. Marcel Demers, P.S.S., honored Blessed Kateri in an ecumenical service. The Pentecostal choir of the town joined in with the Mission choir to sing the praises of the Lily of the Mohawks.

To the satisfaction of the St. Regis-Akwesasne Mohawks, Kateri was celebrated on April 30. The Mass was offered with a church filled to capacity. A group of youngsters danced the "Stomp dance" at the beginning of Mass and, at the end, the "Round dance" about the altar. A bus of Indians from Oka, P.Q. joined their compatriots to honor the Beata.

KATERI HONORED IN WEST GERMANY

During June and July 1987, Fraulein Steffi Diepold accompanied Fr. Karl B. Sieben, S.J., vicepostulator for Blessed Rupert Mayer, S.J., as he visited his

POSTAL RATES

The increase of postal rates hurts periodicals. Those that have less than 100,000 circulation shall have to face annual increases of 6,1% during five years... This increase in price results from the increase of the number of publications and in the increase of each one of them in Canada. The Government subsidizes the Post-Office department in order to grant publications preferential rates. It won't increase its aid for the next five years. It had at first had the intention of completely suppressing all subventions, but had to desist before the opposition this move would have provoked.

AT LAKE SIMON

KATERI AMONG THE ANICHINABEK

Each year the Algonquins render homage to their Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha. This year (1988), Kateri's days were organized at Lac-Simon the 5th, 6th and 7th of August. On these days came together the Anichinabek* of Winneway, Notre-Dame du Nord, Amos, Grand Lac-Victoria, Lac-Rapide, Maniwaki and Waswanipi. The theme was the Cross, the Precious Blood, and the Name of Jesus.

The opening session of the days dedicated to Kateri was animated by Fr. Remi Cadieux, O.M.I. and Mrs. Jeannette Papatie with the help of a video-cassette filmed at Auriesville, the spot where Kateri was born. For two hours, the attention of the Anichinabek was drawn to the details of her life and to the testimony of the Mohawks.

Saturday was a busy day: morning prayers and a Mass presided by Bishop Gerard Drainville. During this Eucharistic Celebration, Kateri's devotion to the Cross and to the Holy Eucharist were brought out. The Cross meant for her: isolation, incomprehension, betrayal, the loss of dear ones; Holy Eucharist: she was as happy as a deer in the woods when she received holy communion.

In the afternoon, all followed the Way of Kateri: a trail with six halts. At each halt a Cross awaited the pilgrims, it spoke 1) of Kateri's childhood, 2) of her difficult life, 3) of Jesus's Cross, 4) of her life of prayer, 5) of Kateri's message, 6) of the pilgrims' requests to Kateri. Prayers and hymns accompanied the procession between each halt.

The rest of the afternoon and evening was dedicated to the message of the Cross, of the Precious Blood and of the Name of Jesus, animated by Roger Gauthier from the Christian Video Ministry, who does this kind of work in St. Mary's parish in Ottawa. In the video cassette, Fr. John Bertolucci of Albany, N.Y. encouraged those who were trying to better their way of life. The animation was somewhat weak, but interest was completely renewed in prayer for all those who hoped to receive the power of effectively laying hands on the ill.


Sunday, the pilgrims were disposed to and prepared for Kateri's Mass by the morning prayer. This liturgy invited the pilgrims to pray for Kateri's canonization and to ask her to recommend to God our difficulties and joys. A *magochan* ended these days of prayer: the traditional feast so very much appreciated by the Anichinabek, a cultural and spiritual manifestation of deep significance.

ATHER McBRIDE was a man of action and a man dedicated to his work of making people aware of the love of God, through the Sacred Heart of Jesus and through one of Our Lord's followers, Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha. When he expired on October 23, 1988, his friends knew and felt that he was with God and that his work would continue from the heavens.

Father Joe's work was shown in his actions. He was always thinking of ways and means to make people know of the great love of God and the example of the little Indian girl who would become known the world over. He was always in demand for his many conferences on the Apostleship of Prayer. Father was a man who loved God, His Blessed Mother and the saints and he never stopped working for them once he became a Jesuit.

A year ago while working at the National Kateri Center for the summer, I asked Father to tell me about his schooling and his life. This is what he told me as I took notes knowing that one day a story on his life would be important as he was part of the history, perhaps even one of the greatest for making Kateri known.

^{*} At the request of the Algonquins, let us make use of the word Anichinabe (Anichinabek for the plural) instead of "Indian or Amerindian", words that don't really identify them.

The conversation began by his telling me he liked steaks, salads, biscuits, puddings, potatoe chips, peanuts and candy of all kinds. But what he liked most of all was to have some of his friends come to his longhouse and make dinner and later play cards. Games to him where a way of getting together and enjoying the company of people.

He was born September 9, 1916, in Buffalo, N.Y., the son of Alexander and Alice Hallam McBride. He also had a brother, James A. McBride who now lives in Passaic, N.J.

As a youth he went to Canisius High School and there was influenced by two Jesuit teachers who made him realize that being a Jesuit priest was his vocation in life. Father said he knew as a child he wanted to be a priest. It would take many years to be a Jesuit but he was willing to study. His parents encouraged him and Father would often mention how his father took him to the seminary at Wernerville, Pa. and how he felt pangs of homesickness as his father left. His mother always managed to get there on visiting day and bring her homemade cookies and cakes. Then came more schooling in Maryland, a bit of teaching at Jersey City and finally off to Weston, Ma. where he has ordained to the great happiness of his parents and friends. Father knew his parents sacrificed much but vowed he would repay them by prayer and any way he could.

McBride served his tertianship at Auriesville and became very familiar with the martyrs, St. Isaac Jogues, St. Rene Goupil and St. John de Lalande, the North American Martyrs. He also learned that Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha had been born in Auriesville in 1656. Little did he know that about 30 years later he would be working to advance the cause of Tekakwitha.

Good teachers were at a premium and so he was sent back to St. Peter's in Jersey City and then to Manhattan at Xavier School and taught history, math, English and Latin. He was an ideal teacher and liked working with high school students. It was also in Jersey City that he organized a youth group. Many excelled in dramatics and sports and quite a few have kept in contact with him over the years.

Father received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Georgetown University and his Master's at Woodstock College. He also took courses in industrial relations at New York University and Columbia University. He went to the Buffalo area and taught at Canisius College from 1959 to 1960 and then at Canisius High School from 1960 to 1967.

As a Jesuit, he especially had great love for the Apostleship of Prayer and eventually became director of it in the New York and New Jersey areas. He travelled a great deal hoping to get more devotees and gave many conferences at churches and schools. Father's mother became ill about this time and her death brought him much sorrow as she had always been there for him. He lived at the retreat house at Clarence Center, N.Y. and one of his good friends living there was Father William J. Schlaerth, S.J., Vice-Postulator for the cause of Kateri Tekakwitha. Father Schlaerth's health was not too good and he felt a younger man could do much more for the Indian girl so he talked to the Provincial and Father McBride became the new Vice-Postulator in 1968. Father Joe felt he should be on the land of Kateri's birth in Auriesville, but for the time being he continued her work at Clarence Center. Father Paul Gampp was the Superior and he helped and cooperated in many ways.

Father visited Auriesville and with the cooperation of the new shrine director, Father Thomas Egan, S.J., they took the statue of Venerable Kateri out of the Tekakwitha Museum and installed it in the Coliseum (the famous church with 72 doors). At last Kateri was in the church!

We met Father McBride through Father Schlaerth. Father Schlaerth thought we could be of help fo Fr. Joe. Father McBride heard that I was doing Lives of Saints at schools and other societies and had included Kateri Tekakwitha, so he invited me to do my monologue as part of the pageant on the Indian weekend in 1969. After my performance he asked me and my husband to accompany him out west where we might do many programs letting people know about the Mohawk maiden. At the first performance we met many people that are still working for Blessed Kateri such as Chet and Cecile Adams. Chet is still a member of the Tekakwitha board. It was in 1970 we began many tours with the Vice-Postulator.

Father Michael Jacobs, S.J., the only full blooded Mohawk Jesuit, lived at St. Regis, N.Y. and had been the priest on the reservation for over thirty years. He invited us to St. Regis so we might become honorary Indians. Father McBride was given the name of RAKENI KARONHIIO and made a chief. The meaning of his name was "Chief of the beautiful blue skies". My name was princess KATERI KASENNIOSTHA meaning "She makes the name of Kateri known and loved". Father Jacobs, Princesses Esther Kane Phillips, Annie Lahache, Mae Montour, Agathe Taylor Foote and Eileen Lefebvre were in charge of the ceremony. Attending were Rev. Henri Béchard, S.J., faithful Vice-Postulator of Kateri's cause in Canada, Father Henri Lalonde, S.J. and the famous Caughnawaga choir. Also adding to the occasion were Chief Solomon and Mary Cook

and their daughter, Michele. Chiefs Peter Garrow and Louis Sunday helped also with the activities.

It is true that at our first gathering at Auriesville many people that came now continue their work for Kateri. They would be Sister M. Winifred, OSF, Rochester, MN, Thomas Constantino, Amsterdam, NY, Anne Scheuerman, Rochester, NY (The Tekakwitha League's official photographer), Sister Zita of Convent Station, NJ and Father's great friend, Aunt Agnes. Father felt that awards should be given to people spreading the love of Kateri. Many of the above-mentioned became recipients of the Tekakwitha Award. Later others received it, such as Marlene and Allan McCauley of Phoenix, AZ, Mary Dearhouse, Detroit, MI, Msgr. Paul Lenz, Director of the Catholic Bureau of Indian Affairs, Washington, DC, and Albert Lazare, the Canadian Vice-Postulator's secretary.

We travelled to many places such as St. Francis Indian Mission, South Dakota; Holy Rosary Mission, Pine Ridge, SD; Mother Butler Indian Center, Rapid City, SD. We were also at the opening session of the Catholic Sioux Indian Congress, Milk Camp, SD; Davenport, Iowa; Bridgeport, IL for Father Paul Stauder who did some filming of our program. We also enjoyed the Ancilla Domini Motherhouse and school in Donaldson, IN; the Sisters of St. Joseph, Nazareth College, Rochester, NY; Marytown, Kenosha, WI and the Carmelites at the National Scapular Center, Aylesford, IL. (The invitation came from Father Howard Rafferty, O. Carm., at that time director of the Third Order of Carmelites and then there was the beautiful Indian River Shrine for the dedication of their huge Kateri statue.)

We travelled many miles and to many places but Father would talk about having a permanant center devoted to Tekakwitha. He felt it should be a place where the history of Kateri and her people could be told and where information could be obtained about people who had particularly devoted themselves for Kateri such as the Most Reverend Edmund F. Gibbons, Bishop of Albany, who opened her Cause, and the Vice-Postulator Fr. John J. Wynne, S.J., Fr. Thomas Coffey, S.J., and Fr. William Schlaerth, S.J. It would be a place where the entire history of Kateri Tekakwitha could be told.

Father knew he must leave Clarence Center, NY and live on the grounds of Auriesville. It was the proper place to be for the Vice-Postulator. Rev. Ronald Schultz, OFM., Cap., Director of the Fonda Tekakwitha Shrine offered him a place on the Franciscan grounds, on the other side of the Mohawk River at Fonda. However Father Egan felt that Father Joe should be on the Auriesville land and gave permission for a special house to be brought on the grounds. His Aunt Agnes helped with the funds. We now called his home,

THE LONGHOUSE. McBride would spend the rest of his life on the grounds and in that house. He never refused to see anybody that wanted to tell him their thoughts on Kateri or the Apostleship of Prayer. Many Bishops, sisters, priests and lay people would visit that house. Also the many cats in the barn near him came for their dinners. The first Kateri Center that he had was in the beautiful cafeteria. Yet he felt that Tekakwitha must have a place of her own and plans were made by him to build a center.

KATERI AT MASHTEUIATSH

O NE OF THE OLDEST RESERVES of Quebec and doubtless of Canada chose as patroness Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha. This was Pointe-Bleue on Lake St. John, known since 1986 under the Montagnais name of Mashteuiatsh: We'll-see-you-at-the-cape.

On July 16, 1647, Fr. John Dequen, S.J., discovered Lake St. John. Fr. Francis de Crespieul, S.J., spent the winter of 1671-1672 there; on June 8, 1676, he began the construction of a chapel at Metabetchouan which was replaced in 1846 on the arrival of the Oblates Fathers by a new chapel. In 1875 the Montagnais obtained a new reserve at Pointe-Bleue. In 1875 the chapel at Metabetchouan was moved on the frozen lake to Pointe-Bleue. The first Oblates to reside there arrived in 1889. Ten years later Brother Lapointe oversaw the construction of a new temple which was blessed in 1900.

Until 1986, the old church dedicated to St. Charles Borromeo served the population of Pointe-Bleue. On March 12, 1986, it went up in flames. The holy vessels, a crucifix and a Madonna of great historical value were saved. A new church was immediately planned and Mr. Pierre Gill was named to head the project.

The Pastor, Fr. Jean-Claude Pelletier, O.M.I., was well aware of the generosity of his flock. Already from 1860 to 1865 the forty or fifty families of the period had furnished the respectable sum of \$1,200 for the adornment of the place of worship. The present-day Montagnais are worthy of their forebears. They organized a very effective finance commitee. The insurance premium of \$177,000, the \$50,000 contributed by the local Credit Union and the \$30,000 added by the religious communities of the vicinity stimulated the committee. Then thanks to the Walk-a-thons, to the benefit performances and especially to the visits to the homes, the \$500,000 which were needed were quickly accumulated.

"The population", wrote Fr. Pelletier, "had settled on the equivalent of a week of its revenue as the sum to be given by each one. It could be the sum resulting from a week of work, from social benefits, or old age pensions. Everyone contributed as he or

she could. It's very significant when one takes into consideration that 80% of the people do not work full time".

Meanwhile, on May 13, the faithful solicited their Bishop, His Excellency Jean Guy Couture of Chicoutimi, to raise their Mission to the rank of a parish. On November 17, the Pastor wrote to the Bishop: "With regard to the possibility that Blessed Kateri become the patroness of our parish, a little referendum is being organized on the parish level. The final result will be known next November 23". Without any hesitation, the Mohawk Maiden was designated as the protectress of Mashteuiatsh.

On January 10, 1987, at Chicoutimi, Bishop Couture raised to the rank of "parish and movable cure" the Mission of Pointe-Bleue under the invocation of Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha with her feast-day on April 17. At the same time, he ordered that the decree be read at the Sunday masses on January 26, 1987 and had the news published in the *Quebec Official Gazette* of March 23, 1987.

The *Progrès du Saguenay* of January 18, 1987 had already foretold the beginning of the construction work for the first days of May. With a seating capacity of 415 people, the edifice was to be of rather traditional style but the possibility of arranging the interior with Montagnais fittings was not excluded.

On May 3, Bishop Couture came to lift the first spadeful of earth at the site of the future church. The architect was Mr. Jean Claude LeBeuf of Dolbeau, P.Q., the contractor was the church council, the foreman, Mr. Charles Courtois of the reservation, the workmen, 27 Montagnais and three French Canadians.

The construction advanced at a brisk pace and it was decided to honor specially the new patroness of the new church. A full-sized statue of Blessed Kateri had been carved by Mr. Charles Courtois. Lessons on her life had been given to the pupils of the school during an entire week to prepare them for the solemn ceremony of the unveiling of the statue on December 4, 1987. That day they wanted to celebrate their beloved patroness by a procession on the lakeside and through the village. A banner and pennants, symbols of nature which inspired Kateri Tekakwitha's prayer, were passed out to the participants and they marched through the village on their way to the newly built church.

In an animated dialogue with approximately four hundred persons, the leader invited them to praise and applaud the Trinity which had showered Kateri Tekakwitha with so many blessings. To the applause of the crowd, Mr. Claude Robertson, donor of the

statue, unveiled it. Mr. Aurélien Gill, Chief of the reserve, then invited the population to imitate the virtues of Blessed Kateri. The Pastor followed, exhorting his parishioners with the holy life of the humble Flower of the Woods after which he blessed and distributed medals of the Beata. The ceremony ended with the hymn, "Oh powerful Protectress, Kateri Tekakwitha, lead us to Jesus..."

To the immense joy of all, Fr. Jean Claude Pelletier in his capacity as Pastor celebrated the first Mass in the new temple on Christmas eve 1987 at nine o'clock in the evening. This liturgy of the Nativity pleased all the Montagnais of the reserve, but most of all undoubtedly Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha.

Bishop Couture had another great joy in store for the Native People: the consecration of their church seeing that it was free of debt. On October 2, 1988, he presided the celebration; Fr. Denis Paquin, O.M.I., Provincial Vicar General attended His Excellency. The Pastor, Fr. Jean Claude Pelletier, O.M.I., with the help of his parishioners had organized the ceremony, a special time reserved for thanking the Lord who had taken care of the Montagnais brothers and sisters of Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha. When the ceremony was over, all joined together in a community dinner at the Amishkuisht Center of Pointe Bleue.


Lately Sister Olivette Paradis, N.D.B.C. of Mashteuiatsh recently wrote me a few lines, the last one of which will serve to close this article to the glory of the Lily of the Mohawks: "In 1989, a project of Employment and Immigration yielded \$45,895 for the decoration in Montagnais style of this gem of a church".




