In the Divine Comedy, Dante tells us about the deep influence exercised on his life by Beatrice. Even though he had seen her at a distance only, her beauty and radiating purity of a youth had impressed his soul forever. This ravishing beauty commended admiration and especially respect, without which his heart would have been in disarry. This unique vision never left his soul. The great poet Virgil assigned to Dante to guide him through, Hell, Purgatory, till Beatrice joined them again in Heaven. Dante had always kept for Beatrice a spiritual, mystical love. Beatrice in the Divine Comedy represents divine love, theology, the Church and Mary...

When about to leave on his journey, Dante met a formidable lion. Three holy ladies, amongst whom Beatrice, delivered him from it., Then Dante deeply moved by this compassion and radiant eyes, "like a flower which opens to the morning kisses of the rays of the sun, felt an ardor still benign inside his heart." He could at last take up his journey in company of Virgil, his guide.

Blessed Kateri warmed up by the rays of divine Love, lavished her kindness, her charity and her inspiration on all those who came in her presence. She was of a surpising gaiety, writes Father Cholenec, amidst her sufferings, and her joyful face revealed the tranquillity of her soul and the pleasure she felt enduring her pains. One must not be asthonished at that. This young girl being nailed to the Cross with her Savior took joy in dying on the cross following His example. Even after her death her body laid out in a long house, her face appeared prettier then during her life. It gave joy and fortified every one in his faith that he had accepted; it was a new argument of credibility that God gratified the Indians with, so that they could appreciate their faith better."

Kateri's power of attraction was due mainly to her innocence. She but lived by the Spirit. After pronouncing her vow of virginity, all her being was resplendant with purity, of a unique beauty which enthralled her brothers and sisters.

What a model for the youth of today who weaken their faith through negligence and lose their innocence so early. The face of the Blessed Mother and of all the saints have the power of attraction and inspiration which will help us to follow their footsteps "as flowers opening to the rays of the sun and whose petals are spellbound by the light which guides us."

Paul Claudel once wrote, as a poem: O Lord, spiritualize my flesh, so that all my being may live by the Spirit.



Dangerous animals! How could they be there so close to baby Jesus. So he said to himself: If noboby protects Jesus from these two brutes, he would do it.


He kept on

Dear Holy Father,



Saints of the past, Present & Future

Who are saints?

"All the faithful of Christ, whatever their rank and status, are called to the fullness of Christian life and to the perfection of charity," says the Catholic Church's constitution.

Thoughout its history, the Church has publicly declared that some people have led heroic lives in the service of God. These are the canonized saints. Because each person is a unique creation and lives in unique circumstances, holiness is expressed in a multitude of ways. That's why there is such a range of saints: beggars and royalty, scholars and soldiers, single and married women and men, popes, artists, and religious.

They give their lives over to God, but that does not mean they are unable to appreciate good things in this world. Joan of Arc loved horses; Charles Borromeo was a great chess player; John of the Cross enjoyed music. What saints have in common is an ardent love of God and commitment to hhis people.

• Elizabeth of Hungray was a married woman, a mother and princess. She emptied the palace cupboards to feed the poor and started a hospital-hospice where she cared for patients herself, her life was ruled by a fiery love of God and a compassion for others.

• Martin de Porres, the son of a black slave, was a Dominican Brother in Lima, Peru. He excused the faults of others and forgave the bitterest injuries. He comforted the sick and aided the poor. His prayerful life and love for all earned him the name "Martin of Charity."

 Francis of Assisi saw God's love revealed in His universe. He offers an example of genuine respect for the integrity of all life, all creation. What he taught centuries ago has the same importance today: everyone has dignity, because everyone is a child of God.

• Mother Frances Xavier Cabrini came to the United States from Italy to serve the growing population of immigrants through her schools, hospitals and orphanages. On the day of her canonization in 1946, Cardinal Samuel Stritch of Chicago said: "She is telling us that if we love Christ with all our soul, in the very conditions of our lives, we shall be holy and pleasing to Him."

• Brother André Bessette was a form boy and became a religious of the Congregation of the Holy Cross, where he worked as a doorkeeper. It is then that he discovered Saint Joseph, patronsaint of the labours, who inspired him in his works. He planned to erect a shrine in his honour where the laborers as well as the whitecollar workers could honour him and try to imitate him. Because of Brother André the city of Montreal can pride itself of Saint Joseph's Oratory on the Mount-Royal, a citadel of prayer and devotion.

 Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha was a young Indian girl who discovered God in His creation and Jesus on His cross. She became "the mystic of the wilderness" and "the lover of His cross. She only tried to please God in all things. All to the grater glory of God.

Whether recognized by the title "saint" or not, through the ages, people of every race, culture and creed have dedicated themselves to the task of making a better world by promoting God's justice,

mercy and peace. In our own times, saints are all around us.

What are Signs of Holiness?

A holy person is prayerful, loving, forgiving, just, faithful to commitments, full of peace and joy, and above all, compassionate.

A Prayerful Spirit

"Prayer," said Teresa of Avila. "is a heart-to-heart conversation with God whom we know loves us." Prayer is the root of the strength and wisdom needed for fruitful action. Saints are people of prayer through Scripture reading, meditation, liturgy, words and deeds. Responding to God's loving presence and radiating it to others is an integral part of the daily life of holy people. The story goes that someone ran through a city shouting, "We must put God in our lives!" Hearing this, an old monk said, "You are wrong. God is already in our lives. Our task is simply to recognize that."

A Spirit of Love

in his First Epistle, John the Apostle wrote: "Let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action." (1 John 3:18) Such love accepts each person as equally loved by God and makes a commitment to the welfare of others.

Readiness to Forgive

The ability to forgive injuries and hurts, however difficult, is a sure sign of holiness.

A Strong Sense of Justice

Religion cannot be restricted to private concerns. Caring for others includes the welfare of the whole community. Pope John Paul II called for "a decisive commitment to justice, respect for human rights, morality and honestly in private life, denouncing all that harms the common good and peaceful coexistence."

Fidelity to Commitment

Therese of Lisieux explained through her "Little Way" how holiness can be found in the commonplace. Life should be lived with selflessness and generosity "always doing the tiniest thing right, and doing it for love."

Many are faithful to commitments at great sacrifice. Priests, other members of the clergy and religious serve their people. Mothers and fathers care for their children. Spouses and single people all struggle to live Gospel values in their own ways.

A Spirit of Peace and Joy

"Joy is the echo of God's life in us" wrote Dom Joseph marmion. "A saint who is said in a sad saint."


A Spirit of Compassion

How we can help one another (The communion of Saints)

According to God's plan, human beings are not just individuals but are social beings, not only in the natural order but aslo in the supernatural order. In the natural order we are members of a family, of a larger number of organizations, formal or informal, and of political communities. And in the supernatural order we are intended by God to be united to Him and to one another by sharing divine life and by living not just for ourselves but for others.

We are a Body

St. Paul compares us to a human body. As the parts of the body work together for the benefit of all, so should we. Christ is pictured as the head of this body, we are pictured as its different parts: "There is no division inthe body, but all its different parts have the same concern for one another. If one part of the body suffers, all the other parts suffer with it; if one part is praised, all the other parts share in its happiness. All of you, then, are Christ's body, and each one is a part of it" (I Cor. 12:25-7).

We are to be Saints

All human beings are called to be members of Christ's "body" by belonging to the Catholic Church, and to be living, not dead, members, that is, to be in the state of grace and live with the life of Christ Himself. The word "saint" means "a holy one," that is, someone pleasing to God. The expression "Communion of Saints" indicates the unity belonging to those who live with divine life and are pleasing to God.

Now, members of the Communion of Saints are found (1) in heaven, (2) in Purgatory, or (3) on earth. Together they constitute the Church, the Kingdom of God. Members of the Communion of Saints share faith, hope, and love with one another. (Of course those in heaven have faith replaced by the vision of God, and hope replaced by possession of God.) Members of the Communion of Saints on earth, who are still on their pilgrim way, share with one another also the Church's sacraments. They are also called to share their God-given talents with one another: "There are different kinds of spiritual gifts... There are different ways of serving... There are different abilities to perform service... Each one is given some proof of the Spirit's presence for the good of all" (I Cor. 12:4-7). And it is not just spiritual goods that they are asked to share. They are called upon to share temporal goods as well. For example, parents are to share with their children, and the well-off with the less fortunate.

We Can Help One Another

Indeed, we are so closely united to one another in the supernatural order that every good deed we do helps the whole Church, and every sin harms it: "The least of our acts done out of charity redounds to the profit of all, in this solidarity with all persons, living or dead, the solidarity founded on the Communion of Saints. And every sin harms this Communion" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, #953).

The three parts of the Communion of Saints can be of help to one another, but in

different ways. The members of the Church in heaven are not able to be helped by us or by the Souls in purgatory since, once they have attained their heavenly glory, their share of it is determined eternally. They can, however, receive honour, though it does not increase their happiness.

The Souls in Purgatory can be helped by the Blessed and by us on earth through prayer for them. And we on earth can also gain indulgences for them, and make sacrifices for them, so that their purification is hastened or made less painful.

And the Blessed, and the Souls in Purgatory, can help us by their prayers. One of the most comforting doctrines of our faith is that the Blessed can help us by their prayers. And we know that this help can be a very important factor in our lives if we pray constantly for the intercession of the saints (and, we might add, of the angels also). In the Hail Mary we ask the Blessed Virgin to pray for us "now and at the hour of our death." And the Church encourages us to pray to St. Joseph, to our patron saint, and to our Guardian Angel. Indeed, it encourages us to pray to many of the saints. There is a Litany of the saints, which is part of the Church's liturgy on holy Saturday evening and at the ordination of priests. St. Theresa of Lisieux said: "I will spend my heaven doing good on earth."

The Church on Earth

It has already been stated that the members of the Communion of Saints on earth can help one another in both spiritual and temporal matters. We might mention four ways in which we can help others spiritually:

1) We can instruct others, encourage them, and especially, give them good example;

2) We can try to lead sinners away from evil;

3) We can pray for others;

4) We can atone for others, that is, do penance for their sins. As concerns these last two ways in which we can help others, we might note that in 1993 the Pope beautified Blessed Dina Belanger, who died still quite young in the 1920s in the province of Quebec. In her writings she tells us that Christ appeared to her from the age of seven and asked her to pray and suffer for sinners. She was a "victim soul," and suffered for sinners, but tells us that in her suffering there was great joy because Christ even showed her the persons she was saving from hell.

Unfortunately we cannot only help others but also harm them, by our neglect, by our bad example, and even by our secret sins.

Like it or not, we are good or evil not only for ourselves but for others. New Centre Opens for City Natives

The Native Catholic Community of the city of Thunder Bay gathered the first weekend in September for the Diocesan Native Prayer Weekend and to celebrate the blessing and official opening of the Kitchitwa Kateri Nimayagamik Church Centre.

The Native Prayer Weekend celebrated two themes this year, "Blessed kateri" - our patroness, and the "Family of God" - in response to the call to mark the International Year of the Family.

Prayers during the weekend took both Native and Catholic Traditional forms. The Native traditions included the use of the eagle feather, pipe and medicines in the Gathering Circle room, while the Rosary, Benediction and exposition of the Blessed Sacrament in the Mary Prayer room represented Catholic Traditions. The Kateri Church Centre was established to serve the pastoral needs of the Native community of Thunder Bay. The Centre's pastoral team includes Fr. Larry Kroker, S.J., Fr. Gordon Bazinet, S.J., Br. Gerry Forest, S.J., Rev. Mr. Steve Hanson, and the receptionist is Ruth Ibler, a retired teacher and Apostolate Volunteer from Toronto.

The Centre is open Tuesday -Saturday from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. and promises to be rather busy with a ministry office and library available for those interested in ministry.. The Centre's hall is used as a drop-in for soup, bannock and coffee. The Legion of Mary gathers on Tuesdays at 7:00 p.m. for their weekly meeting and Rosary, and on Wednesdays there are Prayer Gatherings at 7:30 p.m. Sunday Mass is scheduled for 12 Noon with Baptisms on the third Sunday of the month. The first Sundays of the month are dedicated to Native Cultural expression. Ministry teams are starting to form this Fall for every ministry from Baptism and Marriage Preparation to Readers, Eucharistic Ministers and Hospital Visitation.
