Katerigram

One of the first steps in the process of canonization of a person is to prove the authenticity of the heroic virtues practiced by the saint to be. Heroic means: magnaminous, valiant, extreme... Rome has accepted that Kateri practiced all virtues in a very special way.

Her love for Jesus on the cross was her most astounding trait. "She loved the cross because of her Lover attached to it." This is why she could forgive so easily. "Forgive them, my Father. They do not know what they are doing." Those who mocked her, because she talked to the "black robes", who jeered her when they saw her going to church, who accused her falsely because of jealousy: all these didn't know what they were doing.

There are a lot of grudges, of criticisms, of hates, brewing in people's hearts to-day. They nurture a spirit of vengeance, of vindictiveness, not even suspecting that their offenders do not know what they are doing. But even if they did, God in His mercy forgives them. As Christians should'nt we share this love with everybody and accept others as they are. God loves us as we are and will even forget our faults. Why then should we try to find fault with others when we cannot read their intentions, when we don't know their hearts.

Saint Paul says: "While going to pray, if you remember that you have something against your brother, go, forgive your brother first and then make your offering." Sunday Mass, is a unique occasion for reconcilation. "I confess to Almighty God, and to you, my brothers an sisters... that I have sinned." Then we can make our offering with a clean heart before we go forward to receive the sacrament of unity, feeling at peace with our brothers and sisters.

"To pray is human, to forgive is divine." Only those who really believe in God can forgive others and accept them as members, with us, of the great family of God.

Kateri knew all this and lived it. But she was a saint, will you say. Aren't we all called to be perfect like our Father in heaven?

Kateri was once seen by a lady nearby, to enter the longhouse where there was a man all by himself. this lady accused her at the rectory but her spiritual director would not believe his ears. When Kateri came to see him, Father Cholenec told her about the accusation. Very serenely she answered that in her whole life she never had such an inclination. Kateri also never asked herself who the false accuser could be.

God knows our hearts to the very bottom, and he understands. Can we read the heart of others? If not, let us try to imitate our Lover on the Cross.

You, Too, can be Saintly

There is so much goodness in the average person that I'm always tempted to say, "You're a saint and you don't know it." That remark almost always produces embarrassed laughter and a sharp denial, people don't think of themselves as saints, especially those who truly are.

Leon Bloy wrote, "The greatest sadness is not to be a saint," and he was right. But this kind of sadness is not a bad thing. We can live with it and even put it to work for us. Think about it: When you are sad about disappointing God, it's a sure sign that you are deeply in love with Him. This is a holy sadness which can purify your soul. It leads to a passionate desire to be more perfectly united with your Maker.

Evelyn Underhill (1875-1941), an expert in mysticism, wrote: "Quietly dealing with one's own uncontrolled thoughts and desires is infinitely more humbling than any sort of deliberate austerity (like fasting) which only makes one feel one has done something!" Underhill said that most of your transgressions which trigger feelings of sadness are, in her words, "more temperamental sufferings than sins; and because they are a form of suffering you can always accept them and add them to the cross. The root principle is that God is all that matters in religion and because of this, there is never anything to be afraid of, in spite of your illusions to the contrary. A Christian can always do something with suffering. Simply offer it up to God."

The saints offered their sufferings in many ways. They believed that we can ransom someone from danger or misery simply by offering our sufferings to God in their behalf. The highest goal is the cheerful acceptance of suffering as a sign of God's permissive will. Few can attain that level of acquiescence: "If this is my cross, Lord, I shall bear it. Please give me the courage to be brave and not complain.

In times of sadness, it's a good idea to imitate the Arab in a sandstorm - lie down and remain motionless until the storm passes. A storm cannot be resisted, so you are wise to wait.

Patience is the sign of a holiness. It's never easy to be patient. Sometimes, it can be a crucifixion. In either case, God is never absent. The Holy Spirit uses both our agony and our ecstasy to come closer to us. Through it all, he remains unchanging love.

The Pope does not forget Blessed Kateri

ast January, Father Walter Abbott S.J. from Boston Mass... celebrated Mass with the Pope in his private chapel. Alter Mass, he introduced himself to His Holiness as well as his two companions, Sr Mary Melgrani and Mrs Elisabeth Parker.

While introduced, Mrs Parker handed to the Holy Father, a photo of her three children and a prayercard of Bl. Kateri. The Pope looked at the card and exclaimed: "This is the Indian girl!" "Yes said Mrs Parker. This Mohawk Indian girl is Bl. Kateri Tekakwitha!" The Pope looked at the back and the front of the card then handed it to Msgr S. Dziwisz, his personal secretary who was standing by and said: "We shall keep this". He blessed the photograph of the children and returned it to Mrs Parker.

Later on, Mrs Parker confided to Fr Abbott that she thinks that Bl. Kateri will play an important role in the Holy Father's plans for evangelization in preparation for the new millenium. She told him that in the back of the card, above the printed words "Prayer for the Canonization of Bl. Kateri Tekakwitha, she had written: "North America needs her blessings."

Thunder Bay celebrates its newest Native parish

t the end of a 15-year Journey for Thunder Bay Native Catholics, who gathered as a community in so many places, they finally have their parish. It was blessed by Bishop Frederick Henry, on January 7. All the parishioners sounded so happy. "It's important for us to have a place where to gather, where people know the other people".

Andrée Perreault-Stenberg, an Obijbwa born in the U.S. said her pride of being a Native and her joy of seeing the diocese encouraging native culture.

Bishop Henry himself admits his contentment after seeing an elder purify the church's registry and its sacred pipe with the smoke of sweet grass and tobacco.

The pastor, Fr. Larry Kroker S.J. is also at the head of the parish in Fort William reserve. The Jesuits made a commitment to the diocese to provide clergy for this new Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha Parish.

A big piece of land has been purchased in Valencia by the Archdiocese of Los Angeles in view of building a church dedicated to Bl. Kateri Tekakwitha. The construction will start very soon. The site which dominates a lovely valley is magnificent. For the time being Mass is said in a High School auditorium. As there are 100,000 Indians dispersed on L.A. this new parish may become a shrine to Blessed Kateri.



The Natives in California

■t is difficult to estimate them because they are so dispersed. belonging to different tribes and nations. In Canada, Natives live mostly on reserves, even though many choose to live outside this reserved land. In the City of Los Angeles only, there could be 100,000 people, living in all parts of this enormous city. Moreover there are the Mexican Indians who migrated in great number and who are gradually being assimilated by this great hybrid population where two languages are spoken: English and Spanish. Spanish really seems to be a second language and Americans, to live at ease in that area, feel obliged to learn some Spanish because of the large contribution brought by the immigrants of Central America.

The past

Wherever you go, you're bound to find traces of Natives: cemeteries, old houses, monuments, artifacts... Last year only, while excavating an empty lot to build a new MacDonald Restaurant, the workers discovered bones and tombstones dating very far back. When you visit the 21 Fanciscan Missions founded all along the Californian Coast. you cannot but imagine the agglomerations of Natives around these enclaves. In the cemeteries of these Missions you find the tombs of missionnaries and Natives, side by side.

One morning in January 1996, under a warm sun, while walking in Westlake Village, I discovered a commerative stone carved with these words: "During thousand

of years, the Chumash and their forebears lived here in this valley. They have been described as representatives of the Stone age, famous hunters and gatherers resourceful, friendly, fun loving, astute traders, fine crafstmen and expert rock artists." Then the vessels of Juan Rodriguez Carrillo anchored by in Oct. 1548. These Chumash rowing their unique plank canoes, swiftly and with great dexterity, came out to greet them and the confrontation and the exchange of culture began. Later on January 13, 1770 the Spanish expedition of Gaspard de Portola, returning from Monterey, entered the valley near this spot. Fr Fray the Juan Crespi O.F.M. who accompanied them named this village «El Triunfo del dulcissimo nombre del Jesus". The designation Triunfo is preserved in many places of the vicinity. In his journal, he noted: "It is a plain of considerable extent and much beauty, forested in all parts by oaks (Thousand Oaks) with much pasture and water." Anza added: "This a nice valley where friendly Natives made us welcome. There is little more to be desired for a homeland."

This warm welcome by the Indians "for whom man belongs to the earth and not vice-versa" struck the invaders who often came as domineering conquerors. The Missions protected the Natives for a long time till, the day when the task of education was taken away from them. The missionaries losing contact with them were not able to help them save their culture, language and spirituality.

Close to Thousand Oaks, in the Mountains of Santa Monica, one will find the ruins of an old Chumash village, called Sitwiwa (Bluffs). Tourists will see there a traditional Chumash habitation circular, with two doors and a skylight in the center, as well as a museum full of cultural souvenirs and artifacts.

The future

Today the Natives are exerting an effort to go back to their roots, with difficulty though because of their dispersion. mixture and smaller numbers. In the neighboring States of Arizona, Utah, New Mexico and Colorado, the Natives are better established, so enjoy more stability. Just to mention a few nations: there are the Jicarilla Apache in New Mexico who number about 2800 people; the Navajos who live on a 17.5 million acres in Arizona, total 210,000 members: 2 bands of Paiute regroup in two reserves touching the borders of Utah and Arizona; the 19 Pueblo tribes of New Mexico whose traditional occupations are farming and raising livestock. They knew a great civilization having built the great stone cities of the 4 Corners Region. Today tourists come along just to admire the ruins. Unfortunately many Natives face an integration of their centenary old traditions in the development of the 20th Century.



Miraculous return of the statue of Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha to Mission Dolores

In late April of this year the cemetery at Mission Dolores was vandalized with graves desecrated and the statue of the saintly Indian woman, Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha, Lily of the Mohawks, stolen. Blessed Kateri was a Mohawk Indian, who converted to Catholicism, and became known for her great personal holiness. It is only a matter of time until the Church declares her a saint. The attack on Mission Dolores seemed to be iust one more of the attacks made on the California missions by those who have attempted to portray the missions as oppressive institutions that sought nothing more than to enslave the

Indians. The miraculous return of the statue of Blessed Kateri suggests a different reality.

The Archives role in the return of the statue began on September 1 when Dr. Burns received a call from Corpus Christi, Texas from a Mary Ellen Gomez, who inquired as to whether there had been an apparition of our Blessed Mother dubbed "Our Lady of the Mohawks." Mrs. Gomez is deeply involved in the Marian Movement and was quite excited. Her brother, John Rodrigues, an employee of the Golden Gate Bridge District who paints the Golden Gate Bridge for a living, had discovered a very dirty cement statue, which he took to be our Blessed Mother, while he was searching for a tool he had




Mrs. Betty Bilay and the Vice-Postulator by the reinstated statue of Kateri.

dropped amidst the rocks beneath the Golden Gate Bridge.

When John Rodrigues dropped his tool from atop the Golden Gate Bridge, he felt a strong "urging" to retrieve it immediately. This was unusual,, as on previous occasions he would not bother until the work was finished - if it was an important tool - as you can imagine the inconvenience and time involved in making that long and cautious descent to the base of the bridge where the tool was believed to have dropped.

Mrs. Gomez said that all they could make out was an inscription that read "Lily of the Mohawks." Dr. Burns immediately re-

cognized the appellation as being one of Blessed Kateri's. and suspected that the statue Mr. Rodrigues has found was the statue stolen from Mission Dolores, Dr. Burns contacted Mike Romo at Mission Dolores. who called Mr. Rodriaues and determined that the statue that he had found was indeed the statue that had been stolen. On Sep-



tember 23 the statue was returned to Mission Dolores. A special prayer service conducted by Monsignor John O'Connor, pastor of Mission Dolores, and Andres Rosales Galvan, an Ohlone Indian, welcomed Blessed Kateri home. Her return may seem the result of an odd series of coincidences to the nonbeliever, but to the believer it rightly seems miraculous. Three other notes make the story all the more unbelievable. First, Mrs. Gomez had called two other dioceses before contacting Dr. Burns. Had either diocese provided her with the information she had sought she would not have contacted San Francisco. Second, Dr. Burns was not supposed to have been at the Archives that day, but had come in to finish a project he was working on. Had he not been there, Mrs. Gomez



probably would have called elsewhere, and the statue sent to Corpus Christi, Texas. Third, in doing some research on Mohawks. Monsignor O'Connor discovered that they were called "The People of the High Bridges!" All these factors suggest the return of the statue was no ordinary event. Perhaps Blessed Kateri was looking out for her people and pro-

vided the return of her statue as a special blessing.


Statue of Kateri at the Mission Dolores.

The church of St. Francis Xavier Mission celebrates its 150th Anniversary

These anniversaries are not a rare occasion in Quebec today, but when it happens in Kahnawaké, it's special, since the Mission dates back to 1717. The first church was erected around 1717. Fr Marcoux has served as pastor from 1819 to 1855, found it too small. In 1845, he has just finished the building of the new, on the very site of the old one. The tower, the steeple and the sacristy were simply integrated to the new cruciform construction. Its first patron-saint was Saint Francis Xavier. In 1983 after the beatification of Kateri Tekakwitha, Kateri was named second patron of the church and this last one was proclaimed Kateri's Shrine.

On December 3rd, the Bishop of Longueuil was invited to preside the big anniversary celebration. But surprise, who comes in to celebrate the Eucharist but his episcopal vicar, John Walsh. (Bishop Hubert wa already hit by a sickness which was to take him away at the beginning of February.) As a snowstorm was raging outside that morning, the parishioners first thought of a delay...

Several Knights of Columbus in full regalia took part in the entry procession along with Fr Louis Cyr, the Pastor, Fr Jean Bellefeuille, the Jesuit Provincial, and the Deacon Ron

Boyer. Meanwhile the mixed choir was hushing in very harmoniously the time of Advent, on the Dec. 3. A very important date for the parish this feastday of Saint Francis Xavier, since it recalls the zeal of the first Jesuits who founded the Mission in 1667, have served it to this day, except during their absence between 1783 till 1903, due to the suppression of the Jesuits.

In his homily, Fr John Walsh made an appeal to this "collective memory that we need to rely on the past, to remember our origins, our culture, our traditions on which our faith stands. The Mohawks like other Natives call this collective memory a "consensus" which allows every last

person in the Nation to relate and recount the same story the same way of seeing things, the same way of understanding the past of be one in the present and of looking forward together in the future. Our collective memory enables us to recall together how the modern Jesuit Missionaries, in the footsteps of their patron of the Missions, Saint Francis Xavier, were here at Kahnawaké for most of the years there has been here a Catholic com-

munity. We are indebted to the Jesuits in Lower and Upper Canada, for their continuing great services to the First Nations. Today on the canonization of Bishop Charles de Mazenod in Rome, we add to our memory the presence of the Oblates (1855-1892) who contributed to the conservation of the Mohawk language, by composing a lexicum and a grammar as well as to the liturgy by apposing vernacular language to the Church hymns.

"Finally as we share the meal at Jesus table, we will again be reminded: Do this in memory of me. We renew the part we are to play in building a new and modern "common and collective memory."

After Mass, the people present were all invited to the Kateri Hall to share another meal so well prepared by these devoted ladies so faithful and experts in culinary art.

To prepare the next visit of Bishop B. Hubert every one was asked to remain in the hall so they could ask Fr Walsh all the questions pertaining to the parish.

Thanks to all those who helped us to celebrate so beautifully.

Vou were present with us every Kateri Feast Day since 1979, except last year, when ill health delayed your visit until our Tekakwitha Conference celebration last August 4th. You were with us in Rome in June 1980 when Kateri was beatified. You were here in 1981 when a special 17¢ commemorative stamp was unveiled in her honour; in 1983 you came here to declare

her our second patron and this, our church, her shrine. You were here in 1988 to preside over the Sunday Eucharist in her honour which was televised nationwide in both French and English. Truly, you always had a soft spot in your heart for her... and

for us too...

You personally confirmed closed to 200 students from our community. You ordained Jacques Nicole S.J. (Dec. 1984) and our permanent deacon Ronald Boyer (Oct. 1988) in our church. You stood by us as we mourned the passing of Fr. Beaudoin (1985) and Fr. Béchard (1990). As an active member of both Canadian and Quebec Bishops' Conferences, you were a staunch and vocal advocate of aboriginal rights - as president of the former your signature adorns the historic and ecumenical "New Covenant" (Febr. 1987) that is hanging at the back of our church. Behind the scenes you were an effective support for our community in time of crisis (1990) and came here that same autumn to induct our present pastor.

You borrowed Fr. John Walsh from Montreal to be our episcopal vicar since 1989, and as such he made what every bishop can only dream of: a 3-day pastoral visit among us in May 1993.



Really, how many parishes in our diocese can boast of a smuch presence and involvement with us?

Four days before your own scheduled pastoral visit last Dec. 3rd, you fell ill once again. From your hospital bed you later phoned me to apologize for having missed us, promising you would make up for it. Last Jan. 23rd I was able to remind you in person at the Diocesan Center that Kateri Day, next Aprtil 14th. would be an ideal

occasion to make good on your promise. You felt much better, or so you said, and with your usual big smile immediately took note of it in your diary, delighted that you were to be free that Sunday. But again, it was not meant to be, this time for

good...

Last Wed, evening, Jan 31st, you were in Candiac, making yet another pastoral visit. Somebody asked you publicly how you envisoned death. You answered (I'm quoting freely Bishop Berthelet in yesterday's homily) that, for you, death was merely a further step towards Life; and that for some time now, every word you said, every gesture and task you accomplished every day, was done as if it was the last one of your life here below... Somehow you knew, and you were ready...

We miss you already. But surely, from your vintage point, you will continue to watch over us, to guide us, to help us continue to grow, and see to it that your successor will make the rest of your vision of us come

Niawenhko:wa for the friend you were and always will remain for us. A-Dieu! ■

Toponomy

When you ask Quebecers to enumerate names of Amerindian origin, most of the time, they hardly know how to answer. Yet, the soft consonnances resound constantly in their conversations, without their knowledge.

Hundreds of lakes, rivers, mountains, cities and towns owe their name to the First Nations who dwelt here. Quebec, Chicoutimi, Shawanigan, Megantic, Saguenay. These names not noticed by the Quebecers, since they are so well integrated in e vocabulary, agreably surprise the visitors of the "Old Country".

And with good reason. The Amerindian names not only sound well but they also prove to be rich in description. As the Natives changed place a lot and that they not have any maps for guidance, then the names of places would evoke the configuration, the essence itself of the spot.

Many toponyms put an accent on the physical particularity of

the spot: for ex. Gaspé, a Micmac name, signifies "the end of the extremity and Tadoussac "the breasts of a woman", referring to the two round hills limiting the place. Other appellations keep a direct link with water: Chicoutimi (Montagnais) means the "end of the deep waters..."; Magog (Abenaki) expanse of water"; Mattawa (Algonquin) "a confluence of rivers." As the Natives depended just about totally on nature for their survival, the names of places signaling the abundance of food, are also numerous. Megantic, (Abenaki) signifies host of many fishes", Anticosti "bear hunting", and Cacouna (Cri) "land of the porcupine". Certain names also point out the presence of resources used for the fabrication of tools and objects necessary to live in the woods. Manicouagan (Cri) signifies "where there is bark for canoes"; Etchemin (Abenaki) "where there is hide to make snowshoes", and Rimouski (Micmac) "Land of the moose".



Examples could be multiplied infinitely. The Indian toponyms are so numerous that hundreds of them are not inscribed on the maps. This phenomenon is not restricted to Quebec but to the three Americas. By way of example, let us mention that in Canada - also a word of Indian origin - four Provinces out of ten owe their names to Amerindians: Saskatchewan, from Cri "kisiskatchewani," signifies "river with a rapid flow"; Manitoba, for sure from the Assibniboine mini-tobow, "Lake in the Prairies"; Quebec from the Algonquin "kebec" "where the river narrows"; Ontario, from Huron "ouitario"; "nice an sparkling water"; and the Yukon, from Athabascan diuke-on, which signifies "clear water".

The Founder of the Oblates is canonized

Bishop Charles de Mazenod, born in France in 1782, founded the Congregation of the Oblate Missionaries of the Immaculate Heart of Mary to evangelize the abandoned and

the poor, and to announce the Good News: "Dare all to spread the reign of Christ." He said: "Charity embraces everything. For new needs, you must invent new means." Thus in 1996, Oblates are present in 68 countries and number 5000.

At the very beginning of its foundation, at the request of Bishop Ignace Bourget of Montreal, Bishop de Mazenod sent 6 missionaries to Canada. In 1845, a few were sent to Bytown and to Western Canada. This was the start of the missionary epic of the Oblates in a most difficult territory: the Northern missions with the Natives. Pope Pius XI recognized their merits when he said: "Because of the isolation, the cold, the distances, the dialects and ways of life, the Oblates of the frozen North, work in the most difficult missions of the world."

The Church of Canada rejoiced on the December 3rd canonization. May it give a new impetus to the missionary zeal of the Oblates who have shared so much with the Natives of our country.
