# Why Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha

## in the Seminar of Maryknoll, N.Y.

n the Maryknoll seminary in Maryknoll, N.Y. April 16: Dedication of the Formation Community Chapel in R-wing, 3rd. floor, to native American Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha, at 4:15 p.m. The seminarians and brother candidates invited everyone to come to the celebration. On this vigil of her death, Fr. Larry Lewis was celebrant of the liturgy of blessings. anointings, and prayers. Fr. Jim Kroeger lead the singing of the hymns, and Fr. Joe Arsenault played some American Indian flute music. Many house residents and many employees; secretaries and the kitchen staff came for the liturgy.

While visiting the birthplace of Kateri Tekakwitha at the Shrine of the North American Martyrs in Auriesville last October, I was moved to suggest that we dedicate our Formation Chapel to her. After a survey of my classmates' opinions, we agreed both quickly and unanimously that it would be a suitable honor for the virtuous "Lilv of the Mohawks." Subsequently, all parts of the Maryknoll community -Priests, Brothers, Sisters, and MAAF members - helped us to prepare for the dedication and came together on the vigil of her holy death for the ceremony.

Some points of personal reflection on why Kateri is especially appropriate for our Formation Chapel:

- ◆ Kateri is the first Native American to be beatified by the Catholic Church.
- ◆ Kateri is a representative of indigenous peoples, with whom Maryknoll frequently works.
- Kateri was young, and at a young age she committed her life to Christ. She died at age 24.

- ◆ The Native Americans number among the indigenous peoples of the earth who have suffered much. They were dispossessed of their property, stripped of their honor and heritage, and relegated to the status of outcasts in the very land which was their own. Through Kateri we honor these noble people and seek to foster an appreciation of them.
- ◆ Kateri stands as a shining example of piety, chastity, and devotion to the meaning of human suffering in life.
- Left pockmarked and half-blind by a childhood smallpox, Kateri, a true "wounded healer," preached and practiced love, peace, and understanding all of her short
- Kateri reminds us that missioners have much to learn from the faith lives of the people in the countries in which they work.
- ◆ Kateri calls us to be respectful of the fact that as missioners, we are quests in lands which are not our own.
- ◆ Kateri points us to look to the marginated, so often women, youth, and the indigenous peoples in the countries where Maryknoll works.
- ◆ Tekakwitha means "she who stumbles into things." In Formation we frequently bump into things within ourselves and our community. Through Kateri's example, we are mindful that our stumblings can be part of our journey leading us to God, and to our identity as God's beloved children.

## "Am I supposed to do this?"

Camp Glinondo, a Summer Camp close to Erie PA, is run by the Benedictine nuns and every year tries to promote nature through its "stations of creations" campaign.

This 1996 Summer camp was perhaps the most exciting and this is why.

As campers and their parents arrived, a statue of the Blessed Kateri was being carved into the base of a tree that stands across from the main house: "Tekakwitha House".

The tree the statue is being carved from was damaged in a storm last May, and was going to be cut down. Instead of taking all of the trees down, Camp administrators asked that about 12 feet of the tree be left so a statue could be created. Six or seven weeks ago, Sr Carolyn, the Camp administrator, called Bryan Sprague, tree sculptor, to see if he would consider it and he said he didn't know if he could have it done... "We have a

real devotion to the spirit of Kateri, said Sr Carolyn". You can sense her presence here." People know that she was the first Native American to be beatified by the Roman Catholic Church and that we expect her to be canonized soon i.e. be declared a saint publicly for the whole world."

Sprague is a well known sculptor, so very busy. "I prayed Kateri that he needed her help to

get this done," Sr Carolyn said. She called Bryan and asked him if he could do it on July 14 and he said no because this day was his birthday.

"I couldn't believe it" said Sr Carolyn. "I told him that July 14 was the feast day of Kateri" and he said: "I am supposed to do this." Sprague worked for 8 straight hours to complete the statue Sunday and Sr Carolyn said she plans on putting flower beds around the statue. "It's wonderful!" She said that "Tekakwitha" has two translations. The first "she who bumped into things" was given to her because she never recovered full eyesight after suffering from small pox. The second, "She who moves things out of her way," is the one Sr Carolyn likes best.

"I suppose that shows she was someone who wants to get something done." she said. "There is an energy, a force, I feel I need to get things

done and Kateri gives me the initiative to do it."

Kateri Tekakwitha "is the patroness of Peace and Ecology" and that, Sr Carolyn said, is why Camp Glinodo has such as devotion to her.

## The woman in Native society

The majority, if not all the Native nations, were matriarcal. That is to say that the woman held a preponderant authority in society. In fact, amongst the Innuits, women held

the most important role. Firstly wasn't she the one who gave life? The one who transmitted the culture, spirituality and the values, the one who educated. In short the one who made the nation what it is.

In the Innuit nation, every one occupied a very definite role. Man would provide the big game, would plan out itinerary and organize hunting. He would take care of the transportation of the family (from the village to the territory), of the canoe portages, of heavy loads and installation of the camps at each stop. The woman, on her side, would back up the man.

Her principal tasks consisted in raising the children, educating them in all respects. Moreover during the hunting of big game when the men would leave for a few days, it was normal that she would take care of the daily chores, like getting ready the daily meals, hunting for small game, as rabbits and partridges... fishing and picking wild fruits. It is her also who saw to the treatment of the meat and the

fish, by smoking them. It is her also who took care of the cleaning of the furs so that they could be used for the confection of garments and serve to make different accessories necessary to the hunters.

It's her also who saw to the renewal of their pine in the tent, to the hygiene of the camp, to the health of the family, to sewing, to children's education, to reading and writing for the youngsters and adolescents too. It would also happen that in the families where the elders were girls, that they would go hunting with the father.

#### From nomad to sedentary life

With the advent of sedentary life, the woman has lost most of its occupations. Valorized as she was, she became the one to prepare meals, to do the

housework, a kind of a maid what! The school has replaced her as an educator, the dispensary (a CLSC which takes care of the health of all) and the store provides for the food and clothes – all you have to do is to choose and pay.

The transmission of the values and of the culture often runs counter to school teaching; TV offers images more interesting than the legends which made the delight of the children brought up in the forest.

One must not be suprized then if the Natives know social problems. They were transplanted without any preparation in a foreign civilization of which they ignored the language and the rules of the game. Overnight, all what valorized them, all what they liked became absurd, without value, interest put aside.

### • The Native Woman Today

Nevertheless, even though she was plunged in confusion, incomprehension, revolt and despair, the woman has recovered her balance. She adapted herself to the new situation where man is the "chief" of the family, according to the new rules of the leaders. She went to work, she studied and has invaded the labor market.

Today, you find the woman in all spheres of life. Of all the young Natives studying in post-



secondary schools and universities, the majority are women. Amongst those who obtain diplomas, they are the most numerous.

On the labor market, in the communities, the employees hired are those with longer studies, not necessarily the most talented.

But the women earn their position. Today they are more combative and have recovered confidence in their possibilities, in their values.

The woman is under way regaining her place that she occupied in the Native society, quietly, but in a sure way. It won't be easy, but she has the capacity to do it, as soon as the will will be behind it. Through her the whole population of the nation will rediscover its roots, pride and identity.

## A WHITE BEAR IN THE MOONLIGHT

Being an adult, I hunted by myself, even when I pursued a ferocious animal. I had heard that the white bear could be a very violent agressor, but I had never met one until that night.

I had settled myself for the night in a small igloo, accompanied by my son only. All of a sudden, while we were sleeping, a bear struck the top part of the igloo and half of it crumbled in. He was standing right by, facing us. Our guns out of reach were buried inside under blocks of snow that the bear had pushed inside. It was night and our only guide mark was the rays of the moon.

The bear was preparing for the attack and would have jumped on me if I hadn't started

screeming. I cried out at the top of my voice - it was the only way to curb his dash. I couldn't even interrupt my yelling to tell my son what to do. And there I was without a weapon, facing a big bear. Without stopping my cry, I succeeded in grabbing my knife and I drove it into the bear hoping that this would at least scare him away, but this did not scare him a bit. During this confrontation, my son slipped out of the igloo through the hole the bear had made. Neither I, neither the bear had seen nothing. Suddenly, the sound of a gun exploded. I then realized that my son had seized the firearm and had shot the bear.

I thought I was the only one able to master such a situation, my son being so young. But surprizingly it is he who saved my life, because without his intervention the bear would have torn me to pieces. It was the first bear that my son shot dead that night in the moolight. He was then but a child but still he defied a bear to save my life. This is why I'm still alive today.

## The Power of Prayer

"want to share with you a special story of hope and healing. It happened in the mountains of North Carolina, where Glenmary's Father Tom Field serves two small parishes."

Two young brothers, summer residents of our Saint Joseph parish in Bryson City, were "horsing around" one day when Don threw a jeweler's screwdriver at his brother Billy. Tragically, the screwdriver hit Billy squarely in the eye, piercing the cornea and damaging the retina.

Billy's parents raced him to the emergency room, praying that his eye would be all right. But after examinations and surgery, the doctors broke the sad news:

"He'll definitely lose vision in that eye," the surgeon said. "We left the eye in for cosmetic reasons, but I'm certain he will be blind."

Billy went home to heal and to adjust to this new reality. In a few weeks, he had progressed from an eye-patch to sunglasses, which he was required to wear at all times.

When Billy went to Mass with his family one Sunday morning, Father Tom asked him why he was wearing sunglasses in church.

"Are you a movie star?" Father Tom joked.

Billy and his mother told Father Field the whole story, and the Glenmarian suggested, "Let's pray for healing." Invoking Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha – the first Native American recommended for canonization –

Father Tom asked the Lord to heal the boy's eye.

One month later, Billy went to have the sutures removed from the eye. to the doctors' amazement, an eye exam revealed what even they called a "miracle" – Billy's eye was completely healed!

Not only could the youngster see, but his vision was 20/20, absolutely perfect – totally restored!

If you ask Father Tom about Billy's healing, he'll credit Blessed Kateri for

"giving God a nudge on Billy's behalf."

The doctors said it was "impossible," but Father Tom remembered that "for God, all things are possible" (Matthew 19:26). With the intervention of Blessed Kateri, Father Field's prayer and Billy's faith, the boy's eyesight was restored.

Billy's story is an inspiring testimony to the power of prayer, isn't?

not prophetized any more but proposed.


Ittle child is given us.

## The 12 days of Christmas

From the year 1558 to 1829, the Roman Catholic church in England was forbidden to openly practice the faith. Members of the Church developed ways to communicate the gift of faith in a coded song known as The Twelve Days of Christmas. Listed below are the various explanations of the symbols.

The 12 days were from December 25 (Christmas) until January 6 (Epiphany). The 'true love' referred to God. The repetition of the melody

signified God's continual renewal of His gifts.

#### A PARTRIDGE

is a symbol of Christ. the partridge will feign injury to protect nestlings who are defenseless, just as we are before Satan without Christ.

#### A PEAR TREE

is the symbol of the salvation of man, just as the apple tree signified his downfall.

#### 2 TURTLE DOVES

symbolize the Old Testament sacrifice, offered by even the poorest of people.

#### 3 FRENCH HENS

valued for their beauty and rarity, symbolize the gifts of the three Wise Men and the three theological virtues of faith, hope and love.

#### 4 CALLING BIRDS

represent the four major prophets and the four evangelists, the former announcing His coming and the latter proclaiming His message.

#### 5 GOLDEN RINGS

represent the perfect circle of faith: God's love for us, our love for God and our love for each other. The number five refers to the five obligatory sacraments and the five books of the Bible which make up the Pentateuch, also known as the Law.

#### 6 GEESE A-LAYING

represents the six days of creation.

#### 7 SWANS A-SWIMMING

are the seven gifts of the Holy spirit and the seven works of mercy. The number seven is the number of perfection.

#### 8 MAIDS A-MILKING

are the eight beatitudes as well as the eight times during the year that were prescribed at that time for the reception of the Eucharist.

#### 9 LADIES DANCING

are the nine ranks of angel choirs and the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit.

#### 11PIPERS

are the eleven apostles proclaiming the Resurrection of Jesus.

#### 12 DRUMMERS

are the twelve minor prophets of the Old Testament and the Twelve points of the Apostles Creed. Referring to the Twelve tribes of Israel and the Apostles, 12 represents completion and fullness.

at Kahnawake, made to Bishop Dominique Racine of Chicoutimi,


around the year 1875.

A fragment of the relic (the sternum of Blessed Kateri) was offered as a gift to the church of Mashtieuiastsh (Pointe Bleue) on the occasion of its blessing and dedication to Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha. in 1987.

The relic arrived in Kahnawake on All Saints Day, a foreboding of Kateri's canonization maybe, who knows? It will be used for individual veneration by so many pilgrims coming to the Sanctuary, as it can be held by the hand.

Thank you also to Fr Jean-Philippe Blackburn, archivist of the diocese who confided it to Fr Jacques bouchard to be brought to Montreal in security, before it reached Kahnawake.

Fr Henri Béchard s.j., vicepostulator for 47 years must be rejoicing in heaven on the translation of the relic to Saint Francis-Xavier Mission where it originated from. The Natives think it so normal that the bones should be kept together. Father Bruyère is dancing with joy.
