



CHRISTMAS, 1677...

(This is page 1 of the 1st issue of Kateri, December 1948)

The three bells of the snow-clad chapel of St. Francis Xavier pealed forth in the frosty silence of Christmas Eve. 1677... Noël! Noël! Noël!... From the sixty cabins of the Iroquois Mission, the faithful wended their way to the Ononsatokenti, the Holy House... Noël! Noël!...



An obscure Indian maiden, Kateri Tekakwitha from Ossernenon (Auriesville, N.Y.), had traveled up into New France and there, at Midnight Mass, achieved her one consuming desire – the privilege of receiving her first Holy Communion.

Since 1943, this Iroquois girl is known as the Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha. Our quarterly bulletin intends, above all to tell her tale, to foster devotion to her and to record the favors both spiritual and temporal you receive through her intercession. As a result, it is hoped, the cause of her Beatification will progress more rapidly. It will also introduce you to Kateri's people, the Iroquois, for whom she shines as a beacon and for whom St. John de Brébeuf. St. Isaac Jogues and their Companions have lived and died...

We have dreamt dreams, and now, we are trying to realize them. Our publication is a hommage, we believe, to which Kateri has a right. To send it to yu, modest though it is, the Mission of Kahnawake, which is already in debt, has waded into even deeper waters. Kateri is asking you to help. Flatly, if out of your Christmas bounty, you sacrificed a dollar and found us a few new friends, the problem would be solved for the year.

Will KATERI live and prosper?... Let your heart answer Kateri will not be ungrateful.

THE JESUITS OF THE ST. FRANCIS XAVIER MISSION

"Kateri" is 50

The cult of Blessed Kateri has been continuous ever since 1680. The Jesuit missionaries have spread it. The Indians proudly talked about her to other nations and besides the Jesuit Relations and many books have introduced her to the world.

In New France and in the state of New York, Jesuits and other priests have kept the fire burning. Her Cause had been introduced with that of the North American Martyrs, but because she was not a martyr, her name was dropped from the list

Even during the suppression of the Jesuit Order (from 1773 to 1824) diocesan priests and Oblate Fathers still encouraged pilgrimages to her burial place in Côte Saint Catherine. And when, after 50 years of absence, the Jesuits returned to Laprairie, they were eager to erect a new cross by her tomb. Kateri seemed to belong to the Jesuits as she had been instructed, baptized and advised by them. So much so that it has been said that Kateri had an Ignatian spirituality.

More recently, many Fathers have sponsored her Cause, to an extent that she was declared Venerable by Pope Pius XII in 1943. Father Antonio Poulin, S.J. was her Vice-Postulator in Montreal from 1937 to 1950. When Fr Henri Béchard was assigned to Caughnawaga, he became director of the Kateri School and through his writings on the Mission rediscovered Kateri. He was named Vice-Postulator in 1950.

It is in December 1948 that he issued the first KATERI for the English-speaking people. Nine

vears later he also catered to the French population. Albert Lazare, the actual accountant and manager of the Kateri Center. who replaced his brother. Thomas, recalls how the first office was on the main floor of the rectory. right beside the Mission procuration which had to fill many financial gaps. In no time the suscriptions flooded in and Father Béchard had to borrow help from the girl Sodalists, the school children and many parishioners, Mrs. Rita McComber wrote this little known fact: "In the later 1930's four young ladies from Kahnawake were busy helping to spread devotion to Kateri. Meeting in the rectory. every Saturday afternoon, they addressed and stuffed envelopes to be mailed to people across Canada and the United States. This was done under the guidance of the late Flora MacDonald who had a great devotion to Kateri. She absorbed much of the cost of this endeavor. Still, in Kahnawake today, and still devoted to Kateri are these young ladies: Josie (Moon) Delisle and Eileen (Jacco)

Lefebvre, members of the Kahnawake Choir, Inez (Saylor) Morris and Violet (Snow) Delisle, retired school teachers. I feel they deserve to be acknowledged for a job well done."

Fr Béchard had first invited Fr Camille Drolet to do the illustrations for the magazine. But very soon, in 1956, Mrs. Andrée de Groot came to his rescue. She was mainly an accomplished painter, but Fr Béchard talked her into making drawings and even cartoons for the magazine. The Cause owes her so much gratitude.

All the while, many people came along as promoters or financial aides. Just to name a few: Tom Constantino, Joseph O'Brien, Solomon Cook, Chet Adams, Pierre Hébert, Gordon Deer, Marlene McCauley, Anne Scheuerman, Sarah Hassenplug, Armour Landry and Fr Paul Hamel, as photographers, the Kahnawake Knights of Columbus and the Daughters of Isabella.

In the year 1959. Fr Béchard and the Kateri Center moved to Rachel St. in Montreal. Miss Flora MacDonald and Albert Lazare followed and were joined by Mrs. Juliette Charlebois and gave Fr Béchard a very much appreciated help. Fr Béchard went on writing books about the Mission, Bl. Kateri and Indians. He even crossed the ocean to do research in France about the missionaries whom he called "The Seven Fools," who had known Kateri, written about her or served as spiritual directors.

Fr Béchard was never idle. Even as Superior of the Antoine Daniel residence in Montreal, he would find names for the new chapters of his books, preach retreats, worked for Kateri's Beatification. even if his heart was becoming weaker. All the while. Albert Lazare, his right-hand man. travelled across the river distributing work to the many volunteers, nuns and lay people who had at heart Kateri's Cause. to name a few: Srs. E. Binette, M. Bergeron, L. Camden, Mrs. M. Huet and Mrs. L. St. Germain. In the background, at the Municipal Library, Miss Marie Baboyant was making intense research for the Kateri Center.

Then, in 1980, came the big news: "Kateri would be beautified!" What a joy and what a busy preparation. A few years later the banking account of the Center hit a new low. Tom Constantino from Amsterdam, NY came to the rescue by launching a fund-raising campaign. It paid off. Fr Béchard, before he passed away in 1990, had time to finish his best book vet: a compendium of all he knew about Kateri: "Kajatanoron Kateri Tekakwitha." The Kateri Center is now back in Kahnawake and is still publishing the KATERI magazine, Albert Lazare, his wife Eileen and Alice Marion are working under Fr J. Bruvère's quidance.

Many thanks to all those who support Kateri's Cause and the Center. May it live to see Kateri's canonization soon.

The CHRISTMAS TREE, a religious tradition to rediscover

When the tradition took root in Alsace - during the Middle Ages - it symbolized the earthly paradise and original sin. The pine tree was to illustrate the Eden, since it is the only tree which remains green all year round.

The pine tree of long ago was decorated with delicious red apples, commemorating the time when supposedly our first parents bit with gusto the forbidden fruit. Later on, hosts were added to symbolized Christ, the new Adam. Jesus is the one who brings a new morning to the world.

As time went on, paper roses of all colours and lit candles were added. The first symbol called to mind the tree of Jesse and the other. Jesus light of the world.

The red fruits of the orchard were replaced with bells of blown glass. This original idea came from a glass-maker of Maisenthol who lived in the last century. It was to replace the real apple which had become rare due to a drought.

Far away origins

It is difficult to retrace the history of the Christmas tree. During the Middle Ages, the books were rare and costly. A popular means of transmitting the heritage of the faith was through theratrical performances. These were known as "miraculous plays," because it served as a school for biblical formation and stories of the saints. The performances were held in the church.

One of the most popular plays narrated the temptation of Adam and Eve in paradise. The simple setting was made of a pine tree with red apples hanging from the branches. It was in no time called "the tree of paradise"

As the little drama was presented during the time of advent, the conclusion of the sketch announced the coming of lesus

Unfortunately, because of certain abuses, the Church had to put an end to these scenic plays during the 15th C. However, during these years, the feast of Adam and Eve was celebrated on Dec. 24, nearly all through Europe and the pine tree was associated to the feast, even though Rome never approved of this liturgical practice and it never considered canonizing these two personages.

This celebration finally disappeared but the pine tree remained an important symbol of the Advent period. During the 16th C., the Germans gave a new meaning to the green tree that we must recover. Wish that the pine tree became for the believers of the world who are preparing to celebrate the Jubliee of the Year 2000, a pressing reminder of our interior conversion, so as to become authentic witnesses of the Will of God. The "tree of paradise" would thus invite the society of today to enter deeply into this "new Advent" for the whole world.






Christmas '97 at Kahnawake: bread, mass and sharing

The occasion to pray in the church of the Christian Community of Kahnawake was offered to me. A friend of Kateri Tekakwitha invited me to go and attend the Midnight Mass and I accepted. This filled me with joy. This is why I must witness and

share my joy with those who still hesitate to answer to such an invitation.

It was the first time that I came in contact with this Christian Community of Kahnawake and visited their church. It was night. I came from Montreal. I would have prayed as well



In fact it didn't take long to make me feel a Christian amongst other Christians in this church were everything was ready for the midnight Mass. All the signs and symbols which can interpellate a person accustomed to the Christian liturgy, played their role perfectly. The church was clean and well decorated for the occasion. The two cribs gave their message and invited everyone to

meditate on this grand event of the history of humanity. Then the president of the assembly clad in festive vestments and his attendant in alb, the incense, the holy water, and the altar: all had their meaning. Besides the two cribs in the sanctuary, there were

small cribs all along the walls, made by the school children. This church of Saint Francis Xavier has this in particular: it is the place where the remains of Bl. Kateri Tekakwitha are kept in a marble mausoleum, this young lay virgin called the "Lily of the Mohawks."

On this special night, a special message: God thought it was a good idea to come and visit His people. Thus He was sealing a new alliance with His people. Having come and seeing the abundance of work to be done in their favor, He decided to sojourn here. His stay was rather brief even shortened to a human life in its prime. But the history of love between God and His people was so eventful, so passionating and so wonderful that God decided to stay with His people for good.

He is called Emmanuel: God among us He kept this name and He wishes that this history of love and friendship that He initiated at a given time spreads all over in such a way that all create or leave a place in their heart and in their midst to a visitor, a stranger or any person. The symbolic

presence, three centuries old of the remains of Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha in the church of "her people", cannot but make us think of the presence, eloquent and discreet, of God among "His people", that is amongst "all".

For those who have received the Son of God, God made man, there are no good or bad people; there is no distinction between foreigner and child of the country. There are but children of God, the one and only people. Thus the greeting, the hospitality, the communion of heart and spirit are no more hollow words. They take a coloration, a meaning.

The choir which sang at the midnight mass 1997 in Mohawk language, was made up of 15 adults men and women of a certain age already very respectable: a group of persons faithful to the customs acquired in their youth. Younger persons were not numerous in the church, as is the case in many churches of today. They seem to be busy elsewhere.

On account of their concern more present than ever, two questions came to me quite often. The first question is: what is there thrilling enough, precious and passionating enough to occupy the mind and the time of many a vouth to make them forget their Creator? Unfortunately I have no precise answer to this question. It seems to me only "that what I want without having it, it's you my Lord" as the song goes. It seems to me also that most of the persons especially the youth and all who have no time or the

occasion of thinking of God, thirst for an inner peace, this peace that only God can give. The second question is: What customs are the youth of today acquiring that they can evoke in a near future when their turn will come to look at their past instead of their future? The answer to this question I don't have either. Nothing else but a hope and confidence when I consider that Blessed Kateri decided very young to follow a way of life and to acquire habits which are the object of a certain admiration today. Nowadays yet, and all over the world, young people are able to choose by themselves.

During the Eucharistic celebration, a great quantity of bread - not eucharistic - was blessed. Big loaves with raisins and made of barley. It was not consecrated though, as eucharistic bread. It was distributed to all in the church. A few naive questions went through my mind as I saw no one eating the bread in the church. May we bring the blessed bread not consecrated outside the church? Can we eat it in the church itself? May we share it with those left behind? Would it be a profanation? How does this bread differ from the eucharistic bread?

The answer given to me could be thus formulated. Yes, it would be much desired that this blessed bread be brought outside the church where it is given out. Besides extra bread was given to me for those who live with me and who could not attend this celebration. For me it was an

invitation more interior like and more pressing so different from the first invitation I tried to answer out of friendship or mere courtesy.

This time, on account of this gesture and gift, it was about an invitation to share with all those who live with me the joy of Christmas. Lieft the Church with

myself risking it to go mouldy in my home, without satisfying those who were hungry around me? Maybe it is worthwhile to try to give freely what we have received freely?

Life, with its daily troubles and anguishes risk to trouble us and plunge us in anxiety. The peace of God and interior tranguillity are

> nevertheless proposed to me and offered freely. Young and less young, dare you go and taste what goes on in a place of prayer like a church and dare think to make a real encounter.

The church is a privileged place for a rendez-vous

with the inner host among a community of persons who are here and who are ready to share something of value or at least meaningful with you. And the eucharistic celebration - and such was the one I celebrated on Christmas '97 in the church of Saint Francis Xavier of Kahnawake is a table all set to give you the taste of the possibility of meeting this interior friend. Why not try to say yes to such an invitation? Only God knows if...

But this bread weighed in my hands questioning me and full of meaning because of the circumstances in which it was given to me, of the intention of the donor and of the religious significance. It is not simply to consume but to share. If eucharistic bread itself contains its richness, it should have something in this kind of gift. God offers Himself to you with such gratuity, do I have the right to keep to

Dozens of new saints probable for A.D. 2000 Jubilee

The new saints whose holiness will be proclaimed 16 months

from now will probably be numerous, probably at last 80 in all, quite possibly hundreds and hundreds if there are large group of martyrs.

Though no names have been yet released, talks with persons in Rome, suggest that among these canonized or beatified will probably be most of the following:

The first on the list is Queen Isabella of Spain, the patroness of Columbus. Then we have Blessed Catherine Dexel who established an order of devout nuns committed to the adoration of the Eucharist and to charitable works on behalf of American Blacks and Indians.

The names of Venerable Matt Talbot, Frank Duff and Ethel Quinn are also often mentioned, the Venerable Pierre Toussaint.

Blessed André Bessette (Brother André), the celebrated miracle-wonder in Canada, an apostle of Saint Joseph.

The Blessed Juan Diego, the visionary of Guadalupe.

The Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha, so popular amongst everybody in North America, one of the founders of the Church of Canada. Names often heard are that of three Jesuits: the Blessed Miguel Pro, the Blessed Rupert Mayer, the Blessed Alberto Heritaz, a chilean Jesuit.
