Testimony of a Montagnais Lady

nne-Marie Siméon was born in Mashteuistsh, by Lac Saint-Jean, in 1904 and still lives there. Hunting, to which she was initiated at an early age, was her main passion and activity. The concern of her whole life in her testimony "A world around us", she delivers her love for the animal world, for the humans, for the trees and the earth.

The message transmitted by Anne-Marie to the youth of her people is clear: if they wish to survive, they must keep their traditions. They must go on developing their ancestral lands which are theirs even since 5500 years back. It will be necessary though to develop new methods because life in the forests puts extreme pressure on them. As far as the Montagnais are concerned, everything consists in recreating the equilibrium around the circle, this circle making an intimate of their culture. In the Ilnu culture in fact, the circle is everywhere to be found... It is seen in the Sun, in the Moon, in the Earth. For them, the land too is seen in a circular way. The circle is divided between the four cardinal directions: North, South, East and West which constitute the components of the territory and the life in the forest. The

world, the human worlds, the world of the trees, the World of the Earth, as if to say... These four components constitute a circle: the balance of all these elements are indispensable to maintain the circle itself. If the Montagnais make an intervention in one of these dimensions, they must be careful not to cause a disequilibrium of the whole. This circular conception of the world universe allows us to enter in a more spiritual dimension of their culture: following this path, they start to understand its "raison d'être". Finally every one of them becomes the guardian of the circle, the guardian of equilibrium. For the Ilnu hunters, the Crees, the Atimatek and Objibwa hunters, the circular conception of the universe are similar. Before the coming of the forest companies, the Natives were trapping and hunting the beaver. Hunting was performed in circle: in a year, a third or a fourth of the territory was used. Anne-Marie Siméon shows the importance of reconstructing, around traditional activities, this circle which brings together their people...

Devotion to the Blessed Virgin and the Saints

People who are not Catholics sometimes wonder about Catholics' devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary and the other saints. However being in touch with Mary and the saints is one of the distinguishing elements of Catholic culture. It's an important part of being a practicing Catholic. There are several fundamental insights behind Catholic devotion to the saints.

First of all, we are dealing with a kind of family matter here. Being Catholic means being in a family, and being in a family means having relatives. Our relatives as members of the Church include not only our



brother Jesus, but all his brothers and sisters as well. Most of these brothers and sisters are pretty much the same as we are, ordinary people without anything special to recommend them — except their membership in the family. Others



are quite special, the really successful members of the family to whom we others look with particular affection and regard. These are the ones we call the saints. Practicing Catholics are generally attentive to their relatives.

Implicit in this family attentiveness is the conviction that saints are not just figures from history which we look back on with admiration and gratitude. They are still alive with and in the risen Lord in heaven. Their life continues, although in a form that is different from their earthly existence. And because our life of faith is also a sharing in the life of the risen Christ, we are in contact with the Lord's saints in and through him.

But that's not all. Just as we are in touch with the saints through the life of Jesus that we share, so they are in touch with us. They



love us in him and care for us in him. They don't look down on us from heaven as detached spectators of what's going on here in our lives, but as our brothers and sisters who are looking out for those they love. Just as the life and love of Jesus is expressed and extended on earth by those who live in faith, so also the life and love of Jesus is expressed and extended from heaven by those who live in glory. Just as the family of the Lord is not limited by place, but extends throughout the earth, so also the family of the Lord is not limited by time and by the presence of its members in earthly life.

Catholic devotion to Mary and the other saints and Catholic confidence in the intercession and help of the saints for us are ways in which we express our family awareness and loyalty. Being Catholic is never a matter of just me and Jesus. It's alway we and Jesus, and the "we" includes Mary, the mother of

God, and all the other saints. We're all part of the same family. We somehow all belong together.

Catholics do not offer the same kind of reverence to the saints that they offer to God. The saints can never take the place of Jesus, precisely because it is the life of Jesus that constitutes the common



element that keeps the family together. Without him there would be no family. But there is a family, his family of faith and glory, and when Catholics pay their respects to Mary and the saints, they are offering their respect also to the one in whom the family has its origin.

Practicing Catholics are comfortable in the company of the saints. It's one of the ways they express their attachment to the family.

Learning to Listen

laska is a region North-West of North America, 1,520,000 km. in size, with a population of a half million inhabitants... At the very middle, from East to West, the Yukon River shoves fresh brown waters into the Bering Bassin. For 150 miles to the North and again to the South live the Yup'ik peoples who have embraced the Catholic faith in this twentieth century after Jesus told the apostles to go to the ends of the earth. Having received the Word through the foreign tongues of Jesuit missionaries, they are now faced with the choice of making Christ their own flesh and blood.

The current task of the Society of Jesus in Alaska as a corporate mission is to enable the Yup'ik ("People-real") Catholics to live from a heart that only one language can express. And this precious language in these few fifty years has become more and more mute. Only on this hinterland do the words make real a world's reality. "My relatives have fished this part of the river for thousands of years." And they made direction and movement and feeling and sense out of human sound. Yet the irreplaceable has been wounded. Naunrag (Salmonberry) was a great storyteller who delighted to delight with a mischievous and telling tongue. So the young learned the secrets of the elders. Some strange disease paralyzed his tongue first at the tip and gradually until it reached the root. This for a man who was wag and wisdom was the most cruel of deaths.

We as Jesuits sorrow, too, at our inadvertent part in this diminishment. We have sinned. When the Vatican Council made explicit the Church's desire to express Herself in the accents of the age in which we live, we gave them American words and symbols as their adaption and renewal. We must be humble. We must admit our own shortcoming and so be like Christ in our failings.

At Saint Mary's, Alaska, at the site of the mission whose roots almost span the history of our presence among these people, our companions labored into this day. Now the specific object of our work is the indigenous renewal of the Church.

We work with Yup'ik lay persons and deacons who direct us with growing confidence that we might be listening. We ourselves still hear and see with great difficulty, needing to cry out with thick tongues. "Son of David, have mercy on us." It is Christ Who forgives us through these people.


The Ministry Training Program is a composite of Yup'ik persons. Religious Sisters from "outside" and kassaq ("foreign") volunteers who work with the Jesuits. It seeks to bring people from the villages and give them the theological and sacramental skills and tools to adapt our strange presentation of Christ's revelation into their own familiar expression.

Recently three parish councils at the mouth of the Yukon met on their own to discuss in their own way the meaning of the Church for them in addressing the everyday concerns of their life as a people of faith. The issues were dramatic but ordinary. Of greatest significance is

that the visiting priest was clearly a guest. He was called to be with them. He spoke in the time they allowed him. Yes, he fumbled. But these folks are forgiving. And they were not at Saint Mary's Mission, but at Alakanuk ("Mistake"), joining from Emmonak ("Blackfish") and Nunam Iqua ("Earth's End").

We pray this is a small beginning among many others for the Yup'ik Catholic Church. We pray that we may be poured out into the sea leaving the fresh waters of the faith as a baptismal river enlivening this rare and ancient culture of real people.

He, the white man, destroyed too many birds. He plowed up too much land. It was not good and the Indian became sad. He had pain in his heart. He moved westward toward the setting sun.



Nunavut



The birth of the territory of Nunavut was on April 1, 1998. Changes have come dizzyingly fast to the people in this stern and lovely world. A century ago, they were living in a stone age, hunting seals and caribou with weapons of rock or bone. Four decades or so ago, they left hunting camps and semi-nomadic lives for settlements with federally funded and administered schools and nursing stations. Now, with the creation of Nunavut, they will govern one-fifth of the Canadian landmass.

"The Inuit have shown themselves to be very adaptable to change," says Ernerk, Nunavut deputy ministerdesignate for culture, language, elders and youth. "We've survived in a harsh land. We'll survive this, too. I am very much challenged by events, but very confident of the people's ability."

The challenges are considerable. Nunavut will be a huge territory: 60 percent of today's Northwest Territories including most of the Canadian Arctic islands. It is a land of tundra and mountains, of tiny shoreside hamlets and extensive mineral resources, of endlessly bright summers and unequivocally dark winters. The 27,219 people — 85 percent Inuit and, with 56 percent under 25 years of age, the

youngest population in Canada — are scattered in 28 communities, most vast distances apart.

A Little History

The earliest paleo-Eskimo cultures in the arctic regions of the western hemisphere date back 4,000 years, when the first of three or four increasingly sophisticated hunting societies moved across Bering Strait to present-day Alaska, northern Canada and Greenland. The Inuit in Canada are descended from the most recent of these societies, the Thule, whose presence dates back 1,000 to 1,200 years.

A strong, egalitarian Inuit society emerged from Thule culture, largely a result of eastward migration. Groups in Alaska and on the western Arctic coast hunted the abundant coastal whale herds, while the smaller social units that migrated east of the Mackenzie delta relied on more readily available and smaller animals — seal, walrus, caribou, muskox. Two general traits came to define the Inuit character: sharing in the hunt to ensure survival of the group and an attitude of patience, acceptance and enduring confidence, best captured as avurnamat, loosely translated to "oh well, it can't be helped, better luck next time."

The Business of Nunavut

The largest employer in Nunavut will be government, although the economic base is certainly more diversified than in the past. Other important sectors include mining, construction and tourism, as well as the traditional occupations of hunting, trapping, fishing and arts and crafts. There is potential for more mining — deposits of copper, gold, silver, lead, zinc, nickel, uranium, iron and diamonds have been

identified and claims have been staked. The Inuit also will receive a share of federal government royalties from oil, gas and mineral development on Crown lands and on sections of Inuit-owned lands. However, exploration and development have been limited by the remote and hostile environment and the cost of transportation. Tourism is a growing sector of the economy. Currently, some 17,000 visitors contribute about \$30 million annually to the Nunavut economy, a figure expected to increase with the birth of the new territory and the establishment of three new national parks. Most communities have outfitting and guiding services, and eco- and adventure-tourism - involving kayaking, mountain climbing, floe-edge tours and dog-team expeditions — are growing ventures.

The Future

With the creation of Nunavut almost all of the world's 150,000 Inuit now enjoy a degree of self-determination: some 50,000 in Alaska, 55,000 in Greenland, 27,000 in Nunavut and 8,000 in Nunavik, as northern Quebec's Inuit call their homeland. Nunavut is the latest beacon of hope for other aboriginal peoples, not only in Canada, whose land claims or other negotiations are proceeding at a glacial pace.

Nunavut illustrates that small populations and daunting physical distances are not insurmountable barriers to maintaining a distinct cultural community within Canada. "We are very much a distinct society," Amagoalik says. "And the Nunavut government will have the responsibility of protecting and preserving that distinct society. But we're not trying to break up Canada. We're trying to join Canada."


