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The Three Advents

The word Advent comes from the Latin "adventus" which means "coming"; in the Christian vocabulary, the noun "advent" is new, hence the advent of the Messiah, His coming.

According to Saint Bernard, there are three advents. The third occurs between the other two. The first two are visible, the third one is not. In His first coming, Jesus was born of the Virgin Mary, in Bethleem. He appeared on the earth and lived among men. They saw Him, loved and hated Him.

At His second coming, "all flesh shall see the salvation of our God" and "they shall look on Him whom they pierced."

The intermediate coming between these two is a hidden one. Only those who are chosen see him within themselves and are saved. In His first coming, He came in the weakness of the flesh; in His intermediate coming, He comes through the power of the Spirit. In His final coming, He comes in majestic splendor.

The middle coming is, as it were, a link joining the first to the last. At his first coming, Christ becomes our Redeemer; in the middle coming, He shall make it clear that he is our life; in the last coming, he will be our repose and consolation.

Does what we say of the Lord's middle coming seem incongruous? "If anyone loves me, he will keep my precepts and my Father will love him and we shall come to him." Elsewhere we read: "He who reveres God will do good...I keep your precepts in my heart and I will not sin against you." It belongs to me to open my heart to this love which will transform us into a new man, to assure our Redemption and Glorification.

"And we will see the Lord coming down to visit his peopple bringing his peace and endow them with life eternal."

May the Holy Spirit descend into us at Christmas and every day of the year 2002.

Young Inuit take culture to Rome



Their people and cultures are continents apart but six Inuit youth have shown tens of thousands of Italians that, in their fundamental beliefs, they are not that far apart at all.

On Palm Sunday on the threshold of Catholicism's best-known church, St. Peter's Basilica, these Inuit sang their songs and banged their drums in praise of Jesus Christ.

"It really shows us that God is with all of us, everybody here, no matter where we're from," said Larry Kablutsiak, a 23-year-old postmaster and youth minister from Arviat, Nunavut.

The small band was part of a contingent of about 40 youth from Canada who came to Rome to bring home the World Youth Day pilgrimage cross.

Though awed by the immensity of the ancient buildings and monuments, steeped in thousands of years of history, the group Look everything in stride, participating in four days of youth celebrations with Catholics from around the world, and finding a little time for sightseeing and enjoying Italian cuisine.

"It's a beautiful place," said St. John. "I didn't really expect to see so many beautiful places.

And the people are very welcoming and friendly."

Their welcome to Rome included a personal introduction to Pope John Paul, who greeted them individually after they performed at an April 5 youth celebration in St. Peter's Square.

The event combined modern song and dance with classical music and the Inuit's own song and "throat singing," a kind of guttural duet that formed a traditional entertainment during long winter nights. The Inuit, with their distinctive multicoloured traditional dress and unique music, have also become overnight media darlings. In gentle, soft voices, they've patiently answered repeatedly the same questions from numerous TV and newspaper journalists who have cornered them for interviews.

Kablutsiak explained that the Inuit began planning to bring a group of performers to Rome last year when Larry met an official from the World Youth Day secretariat at a religious education conference in Banff. But their enthusiasm for World Youth Day has even deeper roots. He went to World Youth Day in Paris in 1997 as a representative of his diocese of Churchill-Hudson Bay, and took a side trip to Rome and Assisi.

As soon as he and his fellow young Catholics began to hear rumours that the pope was going to give World Youth Day 2002 to Canada, they began to think about what impact they could have on the event in Toronto.

"We're thinking about what kind of exhibits we can set up, such as tools, our camping, grounds, games, songs." Their presence, both in Rome and in Canada's World Youth Day, has great importance for the country's aboriginal people, say these youth. "It's very important for us," said Kablutsiak. "Because we're out there, too. We're all part of the same Church."

The four-metre wooden World Youth Day cross will cross Canada by helicopter, snowmobile, barge, dogsled and flatbed truck, said Father Tom Rosica. While it will stand in the midst of most local youth gatherings, in many of the native communities of the Northwest Territories and Nunavut it will have to be laid flat during some gatherings, "because the buildings are too low," he said.

A Man with overwhelming Power

QUALITIES OF 17th CENTURY INDIANS



COURAGE

Among the Indians, the training in courage was rather painful at times. For example, Lescarbot tells us, the Indians were not afraid of "putting red hot coals on their arm and letting their skin burn so as to leave permanent scars. . . and showing off these scars as proofs of their great courage."

It's mainly during torture that this courage shows: "It's hard to believe with what steadfastness prisoners bear their enemies' cruelties; they defy them in the middle of torture to the point of upbraiding them for not knowing how to make them suffer and claim they would treat them much more cruelly if they held them

in their own territory. Seeing them sing in the middle of blazing fire, one would think they are insensitive to fire. "So you'll kill me," they say to their torturers, "you'll burn me, but you must know that I killed and burned many of your people. If you eat me the thought that I ate a few of your own people will comfort me. So go ahead, do as you like."

Fr. Lafiteau bears out Fr. Le Clercq's testimony: "This heroism is real and the effect of great and noble courage. It seems they ready themselves for such eventuality from early childhood. We have seen children holding their bare arms against each other and, inserting a red hot coal between them, challenging each other who would bear the pain more steadily and longer."

In time of famine courage is a very precious quality among the Indians. "My host," says Fr. Lejeune, "used to tell me during those times of great famine: "Chibiné, keep your soul firm, withstand hunger, you'll go two days, at times, three or four, without eating. Don't lose courage, when the snows come we will eat."

"That the courage of these people be animated by motives of revenge, honor or self-interest, I readily admit on the strength of (Nicolas) Perrot's word," says Fr. Tailhan, "but what civilized man is not savage on this score." Two young Eskimos, 18 to 20 years of age, attacked three large polar bears. Without rifles, they came within 8 to 10 feet of them and, seizing the chance when the raging animals turned upon their dogs, they aimed their harpoons at them. Had they not had this weapon with them they would have used their knives, a very dangerous move. They would not have escaped without a scratch.

To bring this topic to a close, let us say with Fr. LeClerq that they have strength and a great deal of perseverance in suffering steadfastly the usual trials and tribulations of the human condition. Their great courage shows above all in the weariness of war, hunting and fishing where they suffer the worst with admirable endurance.

HEROISM

We will cite only one fact related by Fr. Chaumonot: "It deals with amoral pagans. . . It concerns a young man traveling with his sister in very cold weather. Seeing her in danger of freezing to death, he took off his large fur blanket and covered her with it. He urged her to run for her life, while he would remain behind in her flimsy clothing. The poor girl hurried to her village while her unfortunate brother lay dying of cold, a heroic victim of brotherly care."

Reaching 80

The first 80 years are the hardest.

The second 80, as my experienre so far goes, are a succession of birthday parties.

Everybody wants to carry your luggage and help you up stairs. If you forget anybody's name, or forget to fulfill an appointment, or promise to be at two or three places at the same time, or spell words wrong . . . you can explain you are 80.

If you spill soup on your necktie, or if you take another man's hat by mistake, or fail to mail a letter and carry it in your pocket for a week . . . you are 80.

So, you can relax with no misgivings. for you have a perfect alibi for everything. When you are 80 nobody expects much of you. If you act silly, it is your second childhood. Everybody is looking for symptoms of softening of the brain.

EIGHTY is a great deal better than being 65 or 70. At that time you are expected to retire to a little house in British Columbia or Florida and become discontented, grumbling, limping, ... a "has been". But if you survive till 80, everybody is surprised that you are still alive, surprised that you can still walk, that you can still talk above a whisper, and surprised if you reveal signs of lucid intervals. At 70 people are mad at you for everything. At 80 they forgive you everything.

I f you ask me "LIFE BEGINS AT 80".
