

Without realizing it, English-speaking non-Catholics render homage to the Faith of their pre-Reformation ancestors whenever they speak of the Feast of the Nativity. Just as I to you, they call out "Merry Christ-Mass!" to their friends at this time of the year.

For Kateri Tekakwitha, her first Christmas at Mission Saint-François-Xavier, 1677, turned out to be the greatest celebration in which she ever took part. At midnight she assisted at the Mass in honor of the Birthday of Christ; better still, with deep joy she received into her heart for the first time her Lord and Savior. The receiving of her first Holy Communion made that Christmas a truly merry one for her.

I'm sure she must recall it with emotion. Quite possibly on this day of days she desires to obtain special favors for her clients from the Child and from His tender Mother. You do feel, don't you, that she wants your Christmas to be merry?

Don't tell me you have no boon (queer how that word, Christ-Mass, projects me back to Catholic England of yore, when vassals requested fine favors of their lords!) to beg! No cures? No "rents" to find? No better paid jobs? Come now, you don't mean that you have no graces to implore! A good confession? Peace in your family? The smashing into smithereens of some gross temptation?...

As you ask humble Tekakwitha to intercede for you, you will find yourself in good company. A few weeks ago, the Most Reverend William Duke, Archbishop of Vancouver, while on a visit to Montreal, did not forget to come out and pay his respects to Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha and invoke her blessing upon two special intentions of his: the new community of Indian Sisters he had founded (one of Kateri's great desires after her arrival at the Mission) and all the Catholic Indian children of Canada—certain not-so-occult influences are fighting to throw them all into the maw of secularistic education.

YOUR EMINENCE:

For the first time in its history, Mission Saint-Francois-Xavier is the host to a cardinal of the Holy Roman Church. The Mission is grateful to you for the encouragement and the affection which your presence here denotes.

So that the gratitude of the Mission be less imperfect, all who have taken part in its history were anxious to be

Mr. Labarre, Director of the Normal Schools of the Province of Ouebec, and Mr. Wescott, Inspector of Schools for this section of the country. And, in the person of Mr.

The Reverend Father Réal Lalonde. spiritual guide of the Indians of Caughnawaga for the last twelve years, has requested that I introduce Mission


possible.

The French Jesuits of the XVII Century, upon arriving in Canada with the intention of spreading the light of the Gospel, soon found out that

most chivalrous and the most intelligent. The Fathers employed all the resources of their talents and of their zeal to teach them the truths of the Catholic Faith, albeit they carefully respected, in complete harmony with Catholic procedure, their customs,

their language, their form of government and their fine, natural qualities.

The results surpassed the most optimistic expectations, for, less than fifty years after the foundation of the Mission, it already had a protectress in heaven, the maiden, Kateri Tekakwitha. The cause for her beatification is now pending at Rome. Naturally, we hope to honor and venerate her before long as the first native-born North American Saint.

The history of Mission Saint-Francois-Xavier did not wholly unfold itself at its present location. More than once, it moved from one spot to another. But always, its unity has been maintained, its Faith has been safeguarded. To guarantee the better its perseverance and its progress in the Faith, its Missionaries have always kept pace with it.

It is rather curious to note that once the site of the Mission was definitely established, then, so to speak, began the migrations of its Pastors. After the suppression of the Society of Jesus, the clergy of the one and only diocese of Quebec to begin with, and after 1836, that of the diocese of Montreal, ministered to the spiritual needs of the Mission. In the middle of the XIXth Century, the Oblate Fathers and particularly the indefatigable Father Burtin, watched over the religious interests of the Indians. Following their departure, the secular clergy of Montreal returned to Saint-François. Well remembered even today are the charity, the goodness, the untiring zeal of the Most Reverend Guillaume Forbes, missionary at Caughnawaga before being named

Bishop of Joliette and Archbishop of Ottawa

In 1903 the Most Reverend Bruchesi, Archbishop of Montreal, invited the Fathers of the Society of Jesus to resume, to continue the work of their great predecessors of the XVIIth Century. They are still at work.

Similar in this to their predecessors, they have taken to heart the religious education of youth. Hence, the invitation they proffered one fine day to the Sisters of St. Ann. of whom you are, Your Eminence, the Cardinal Protector. The invitation was accepted and it is impossible today to exaggerate the role played by the Sisters of St. Ann in the maintenance and the progress of the Faith at Mission Saint-Francois-Xavier.

During recent years it was deemed preferable to have the Sisters take charge of the girls and the little tots only. And we have thought, Your Eminence, that, to come up to the goal set by our illustrious predecessors. to give ear to the solicitude of the Holy Father for the smaller nations, we must entrust the religious education of the boys to two of Ours, holders of academic degrees and well-versed in the art of teaching as well as deeply attached to the Indians of Caughnawaga. Whatmore, the youth of the Mission, has to lead it in the paths of virtue and to stimulate their religious ideals, the example and the eloquent word of one of theirs, the Reverend Father Michael Jacobs, S.J., missionary at St. Regis, where he also is assisted in his work among the Indians by the admirable Sisters of St. Ann.

THE LIFE OF KATERI TEKAKWITHA

CHAPTER V.

HER FIRST COMMUNION
CHRISTMAS 1677.

The long anticipated privilege of living at the Mission of the Sault became a reality for Kateri in the autumn of 1677. On arriving there, she went to live with an adopted sister and brother-in-law, who took care of her until she died and furnished her with the necessities of life.

Providing for herself is no problem to the modern girl because positions in business and the professions are open to her. Such was not the case in Kateri's time, particularly for an Indian girl; to remain unmarried was practically unheard of. Kateri was not a burden to her sister and brother-inlaw as she was a good worker and provided her share of the maintenance. Nevertheless clothing was difficult to obtain and many Iroquois girls who wished to imitate the French Religious were forced to marry in order to obtain clothes. To practice the evangelical counsels in this manner was more heroic virtue for the Indians than for the French.

Kateri was continually being urged to marry, first by her uncle and other relatives and later at the Sault by her instructress who erroneously believed marriage to be the state in which she would best obtain salvation. Kateri knew otherwise and was firm in her resolve to keep the vow of virginity.

Her instructress was a venerable Christian woman named Anastasia Tagonhatsihongo. She had known Kateri's mother at Ossernenon, and was genuinely interested in the young girl.

Such was Kateri's interest that she learned more in one week than most girls learned in several years. She was never idle for a minute and loved to work side by side with Anastasia as this offered her unlimited opportunities of learning about the lives and habits of good Christians. Kateri's one thought was to find out what was most pleasing to God. She desired to give all to God without any respect for creatures or any desire of return for herself. Her devotion was not an idle one of self-love, nor was she one of those obstinate devotees, who are in church when they should be at home. In attaching herself to God, she attached herself to work as a proper means of being united with Him as well as in order to preserve during the whole day the good inspirations she had received in the morning at the foot of the altar.

Thus Kateri lived from the autumn she arrived at the Sault until Christmas, and, because she led such a fervent and exemplary life, she merited at this time a grace not granted to those who came from the Iroquois until several years later. She was promised some time before the feast that she might receive Our Lord in Holy Communion for the first time on Christmas Day.

She received the good news with all imaginable joy, and prepared herself for the great event with an increase of devotion. When the great day came she surrendered herself to Our Lord in Holy Communion and all her fervor was renewed. Only Jesus knew what passed between Himself and his dear little Indian spouse during her First Communion. All we know is that from that day she appeared different to those who worked with her, because she remained so full of God and of love of Him.

Not only was her First Communion an event of great joy and of deep spiritual significance to her and to those about her, but from that day until her death, she received Holy Communion frequently and with the same fervor, and undoubtedly she received the same love and manifold graces from Our Lord, who seeks only to visit us in this Sacrament of Love.

Her sanctity was so remarkable that at the time of general Communion the most devout women wished to be near her in church, claiming that the mere sight of her deep devotion at these times inspired them and served as an excellent preparation for approaching the Holy Table in a fitting manner.

BLESSED MARGUERITE BOURGEOYS AND TEKAKWITHA

ON November 12, Ven. Marguerite Bourgeoys, foundress of the Congregation of Notre-Dame of Montréal, was elevated to the ranks of the "Blessed" by His Holiness, Pius XII. When Kateri arrived at Mission Saint-François-Xavier in 1677, Blessed Marguerite had already consecrated over twenty years of her life to the children of Montreal; after Ven. Kateri's death in 1680, only ten miles away, Blessed Marguerite Bourgeoys was to devote the twenty remaining years of her life to those little ones so loved by Christ. Truly the words of the Book of Wisdom apply to both of them: "O how beautiful is the chaste generation with glory: for the memory thereof is immortal: because it is known both with God and with men."

IT'S AS SIMPLE AS THAT!

WHEN Our Savior founded His Church, He said: "Thou art Peter: and upon this rock I will build my church and the gates of hell will not prevail against it" (Matt., xvi, 16). He also added: "Behold I am with you all days even to the consummation of the world (Matt., xviii, 20). The gates of hell have never prevailed against it.

That is why the Catholic Church, the only Christian Church capable of tracing its origin, year by year, back to Christ, has never taught falsehood. If it had, He would be a liar. It's as simple as that.

The Watchtower, organ of the Jehovah Witnesses frequently utters statements contrary to the teachings of the one Church founded by Christ. "A deceitful witness uttereth a lie" (Prov. xiv. 5).

In 1854, as successor of Peter, Pope Pius IX defined the truth of the Immaculate Conception. Now, *The Watchtower*, which apparently doesn't believe in the Bible and which prefers to ignore the miracles of Lourdes, disagrees. Why be surprised: "A deceifful witness uttereth a lie!"

Pope Martin I in the Lateran Council of 649 (quite a while before Russell and Rutherford), condemned all who did not confess the perpetual virginity of Mary. St. Epiphanius, who lived in the VIIIth Century, asks; "Did anyone ever exist who dared pronounce the holy name of Mary without instantly joining to it: Virgin?" Yes, indeed St. Epiphanius, The Watchtower and the Jehovahs! A deceitful witness uttereth a lie!

Last month on All Saints' Day, Pope Pius XII, officially proclaimed the Assumption of Mary into heaven, a truth as cld as Christendom. A dyed in the wool Jehovah will not admit this truth any more than The Watchtower circulating, last September, among a small group of ignorant and gullible women and their compliant husbands, here in Caughnawaga. A deceitful witness uttereth a lie!

That is, Your Eminence, briefly outlined, the factual history of Mission Saint-François-Xavier. Its interior history, I mean that of the souls of the Mission, is for the most part, beyond our ken. However, from the earliest days of the Mission up to the present, it would be easy to find among the notes of our missionaries, numerous examples of virtue, of piety and of attachment to the Faith, similar to those recorded in the most inspiring pages of the history of the Church.

The proving of this point, as a matter of fact, is unnecessary. The most tangible proof of the fidelity of the ancestors and of that of the descendants, we have under our eyes in this church. Their living Faith attracts them to the Tabernacle and holds them near; their living Faith, Your

Eminence, enables them to draw from your presence consolation and joy unparalleled. And the spirit of the nation, a nation proud of its Catholic Faith, is manifested in the perfect harmony of the singing of this mass, so rich and appealing in expression.

Your Eminence, both the clergy and the faithful of Mission Saint-François-Xavier thank you for coming. They also thank you beforehand, for all that you will do to hasten the glorification of Kateri Tekakwitha.

The visit of Your Eminence amongst us, is, for us all, a matter of legitimate pride. And we beg Your Eminence to offer to the Holy Father the expression of the indefectible fidelity of Mission Saint-François-Xavier of Caughnawaga.

CALENDAR TIDBITS



Sept. 10, 1950. — For the first time in History, a Roman Cardinal was made an honorary Chief of the Mohawks, To the proud Caughnawagans, befell the privilege of conferring that exclusive distinction upon their distinguished guest, His Eminence Eugene Cardinal Tisserant. Truly a red-letter day for the Iroquois Nation.

The occasion coincided with the closing celebrations of the Centenary of the Rev. Sisters of St. Ann. They have been teaching in this Mission for the past thirty-five years and were honored to welcome here their Cardinal Protector.

The Indians, led by the Holy Name Society, did their utmost to prepare a reception worthy of the occasion: the three-point program had been carefully planned and was carried out to perfection.

The ceremony opened with a Solemn Mass at which the Pontiff presided from his throne. As Secretary of the Congregation of Oriental Rites, he was particularly interested in the celebrated Iroquois mixed choir, singing in the vernacular the choicest pieces of its rich repertoire under the direction of the Rev. Dr. Alfred Bernier, S.J.

The three-century-old St. Francis Xavier Mission was introduced to His Eminence by the Very Rev. Léon Pouliot, Jesuit Provincial. His words were then interpreted in Indian by Fr. Michael Jacobs, S.J., first Iroquois priest, who, in turn, was happy to introduce the Prelate to his people. Holy Mass was concluded with the Jubilee Blessing imparted by His Eminence in the name of the Holy Father.

After Mass, the Cardinal in magna cappa, was led processionally to Tekakwitha School for the banquet. The long awaited event, the blessing of the new building, then took place. His Eminence spoke touching words of encouragement to the teachers and their Indian pupils.

The last number on the program, was the civic reception, held within the ancient walls of Fort St. Louis. The whole population nodded approval when the mayor, Frank Goodleaf, accompanied by his councillors and fellow tribesmen, in full regalia, vowed "unfailing loyalty to the Sovereign Pontiff, honored today in his representative."

At the rhythmic beat of the tom-tom, the "braves" and "princesses" were introduced, each in his or her favorite tribal dance, climaxed with the symbolical ritual inducting into the Mohawk Tribe, a Prince of the Church. The new honorary chief, Kaswatetseranoron (Cherished-light-of-the-Orient), expressed his happiness at such a display of filial affection and promised to proudly exhibit in Rome before the Holy Father, the symbols of his new distinction, his Indian headdress and the Pipe of Peace.
