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ARE MY PRAYERS BEING ANSWERED?

The Vice-Postulator

R. ALEXIS CARREL, the reputed scientist and muchread author of Man, the Unknown, once wrote an interesting article on "Prayer". "The triumphant hosannas of a great oratorio", he explained, "as well as the humble request of the Iroquois asking for a successful hunt, illustrate the same truth: The human being tries to increase his limited strength by turning to the infinite Source of all strength. When we pray, we are linking ourselves with this inexhaustible motive power that makes the universe go round." A consoling thought, don't you think?

That is why my prayers are always answered if:

1- I ask for a supernatural favor (good confession) or a natural favor (instant recovery from poliomelytis), provided in the latter case that it be useful to my salvation;

2- I pray with faith: "Ask and the gift will come : seek and you shall find; knock and the door shall be opened to you." (Matt., VII. 7):

3- I pray with perseverance (Our Lord often keeps me waiting while He teaches me how to better my praying !...).

"What about my prayers for myself?"

"They are always granted if I am faithful to the above conditions whether I am in the state of grace or not. In the latter case, however, I must be consistent and prepared to respond to the grace I am requesting."

Does this hold good when my prayers are offered for

others ?"

"Indeed it does, the only obstacle being the obdurate will

In the light of the above principles, the following conclusion is evident: My prayers for the Beatification of the Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha will some day be answered. Our Lord will grant the two miracles required for this blessed event when I pray enough and well enough.

THE LIFE OF KATERI TEKAKWITHA

CHAPTER VI

HER SPIRIT OF PRAYER

Kateri's one thought was to find out what was most agreeable to God. She considered the contrast between the life that one led in her old village and the one at the Sault and feared to fall into the sins of her people. This disposition gave her more courage to continue in the practices she so ardently desired to undertake. She turned more and more to prayer and sacrifice and could often be seen, rosary in hand, going about her daily tasks, carrying wood or doing menial tasks around the lodge.

Much of her time was spent with her instructress. Anastasia, who was a devout Christian. The subject of their conversation often centered on the life and habits of good Christians.

Kateri saw the will of God in all the events of her life. One day she cut down a tree in order to get wood for the fire. The tree, in falling, struck her so violently with one of its branches that it threw her to the ground and so stunned her that they thought she was dead. Regaining consciousness she said, "My Jesus, I thank Thee for having preserved me from this acci-

Her custom was to go to church at four o'clock in the morning, winter and summer. In winter, she frequently walked barefoot through the snow. Each day she heard two Masses and frequently visited the Blessed Sacrament. She went to Confession weekly. received Holy Communion as often as possible, and made Spiritual Communions frequently during the day. Her great devotion and fervor of spirit qualified her for admission to the Society of the Holy Family almost as soon as she had arrived at Mission Saint-François. She had been exempted from taking the tests which other arrivals and the newly baptized were required to pass before being allowed to receive Holy Communion or before

admission into the Society of the Holy Family.

Being a young Indian of twenty-two or twenty-three years of age, she naturally liked to be well dressed. This consisted in having the hair well greased, parted, and braided in a long plait which hung down the back: it meant heavy necklaces of glass beads. pretty cloaks, dresses, moccasins and pack saddles. Katerine felt that she could give up all these things without seeming peculiar, as the others would only think that she was not seeking a husband. She renounced all the red clothing and ornaments of her people and wore a new and simple blue dress on the days when she received Holv Communion.

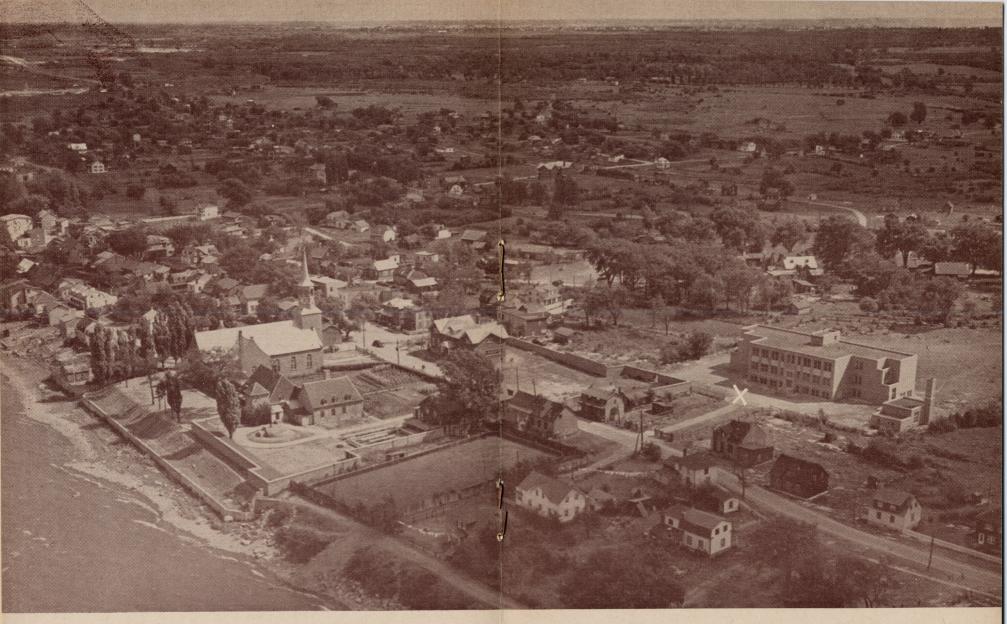
As Kateri did all things without vanity and in the spirit of God, she continued the same exercises of devotion in the forest which she had practiced in the village and substituted for those she could not do, some which were suggested to her by the Holv Ghost.

That winter she passed her life as if she were a Religious. In the morning she prayed to God with all the others. This was the custom of those who went to the hunt. After prayers the men ate and went hunting for deer or beaver and did not return to the cabin until evening. While the hunters were eating. Kateri hid herself in order to say a prayer, mental or vocal, or a combination of both. She had erected near a stream, where the people came nature. (To be continued.)

to get water, a little shrine consisting of a cross which she made of a tree. There she prayed her Guardian Angel (so she told her companion), to assist at Mass for her and to bring her the graces. When she thought the hunters had left, at about nine o'clock in the morning, she returned to the cabin where the women were. She did what she was told, whether it be to cut wood or make soup, or to perform the ordinary employment of Indian women, that is, the making of collars from deerskin. This she did very skilfully, for she performed all such tasks well. During the work she asked those who knew some hymn of the church to sing it or to tell some life of a saint which they had heard in the sermon on Sunday, and she herself would commence in order to give them a theme. Those around her regarded her as a saintly girl, when they saw her praying with angelic modesty.

While others in the woods thought only of beavers and martens. Kateri thought only of serving God and imitating Our Lord in that poverty which never made her feel that she lacked anything. She was so poor that she had no proper clothing to wear in which to receive the Viaticum, until her companion lent her some. This was the principal reason why some who wished to imitate Kateri did not persevere. They were not enough like her. whose constancy and uniform mode of life they admired - a life which surpassed the comprehension of simple

ATTENTION, PLEASE, GRAMMARIANS!

THE Marcoux collection, already mentioned, was duly thumbed through and admired. The Grammar, in particular, with its beautiful, legible longhand, they found a masterpiece

Iroquois is an extremely complex "agglutinative language." This signifies that from a few roots can be produced words that express an infinity of shades and meanings. Take, for instance, KANOOSA, house; combine it with the verb KATARIHATHA, to heat, and you have KANOOSATARIHATHA: house-heater, i.e., stove. The same root, KANOOSA, to which you add KAYSERAYS, to drag, gives a light covered cart. KANOOSADASSY literally signifies "I-walk-around-the (interior of the) house", i.e., I make the Way of the Cross.

Iroquois contains only eleven letters, four vowels: a, e, i, and o; and seven consonants: h, k, (g), n, r (l), s, t, (d) and w. It is essentially a visual language, abstract nouns being unknown. This deficiency gave many a headache to the early missionaries, who were obliged to invent a vocabulary to designate the immaterial and spiritual realities of this world and the one beyond.

There are two genders: the superior or masculine gender, which is applied to men and angels! the inferior or feminine gender which includes women, animals both male and female, devils and inanimate objects. However, in the inferior feminine gender, there exists a superior form reserved to ladies of distinction. This the blackrobe must not forget when he prays to Our Blessed Mother, otherwise he could easily disedify his congregation.

Number or quantity in Iroquois is threefold, the singular, the plural and the dual which is obligatory; there are five plurals, five singulars and five duals too, the whole fifteen to be reckoned with in most of the conjugations...

- 2. Was this person's condition serious? Was it considered hopeless?
- 3. How long did this serious condition last?
- 4. What day, what hour did the cure take place?
- 5. What did the sick person experience while the cure was taking place?
- 6. Was the cure instantaneous?
- 7. Did the cure take place without the help of remedies?

C) The condition of the person after being cured

- 1. What changes were felt by the person being cured while passing from sickness to health?
- 2. Was the cure complete? Did any trace remain?
- 3. Is the person cured still in good health?
- 4. Does the cure still last? Does the person cured suffer from some other sickness? What other (s)?
- 5. After the cure, was the erstwhile sick person examined by a physician? When? What was his opinion concerning the case?

II - Invocation of the Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha

- Is it proved beyond the shadow of a doubt that the sick person was cured after having invoked the intercession of the Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha?
- 2. Who invoked the intercession of the Venerable Katheri Tekakwitha?
- 3. How was Kateri invoked: by means of mental or oral prayer? by means of a novena or a triduum?
- 4. Did the sick person apply or have applied to himself a relie or a picture of the Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha ?
- 5. When was the Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha first invoked? When was she last invoked?
- 6. Did the cure take place immediately or not?
- 7. Was the help of other Servants of God or of other Saints invoked?

If so, why is the cure attributed to the Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha?

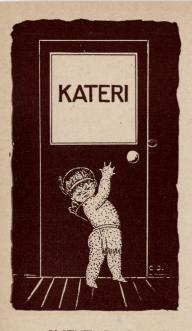

CALENDAR TIDBITS

Dec. 18, 1950. — At the fashionable hour of 8:30, the parents and friends of the boys of Tekakwitha School filled Kateri Hall.

Rev. Fr. C. Drolet, S.J., promptly mystified the audience with a whole bag of tricks: cards, Hindoo ropes, rabbits and hats!...

Under a colorful old-fashioned street-lamp, Mr. R. Desmarais, teacher of the 6th and 7th Grades, then presented a few Christmas carols with a group of boys. This Christmas Card came alive with Steven Cross as soloist.

Since last September, our Pastor, Very Rev. Fr. R. Lalonde, S.J., has been teaching music to the boys. Despite a bad attack of laryngitis, he directed his choristers who sang several Christmas hymns in Iroquois.

But the climax of the evening was *The Sausage Maker's Intertude*. Rev. Fr. A. Burns, S.J., our High School teacher, directed this play, written by the noted French playwright, Henri Ghéon, and translated by Marcus and Olive Goldman.

The story features Santa Claus or rather, St. Nicholas, Archbishop of Myra, who died about the year 342. Three little children go to glean in the fields. A sausage maker, lacking pigs, throws them into his sausage machine, but good St. Nicholas brings them back to life.
