Dear Friends of Kateri,

This will be the tenth Christmas that the Kateri bulletin goes out to you. In all, 300,000 copies. Its message, perhaps, at times, gauche, but always straight from the heart, concerns the lovely Lily of the Mohawks. Its aim: to make her better known, loved, and prayed to, thereby hastening her beatification. It also carries news about her Mission and her people. For making possible over the years the publication of Kateri, I must thank our readers for opening their hearts and checkbooks to Kateri's Cause.

Spiritually speaking, prayers for her glorification have increased; and I do know by the letters received that through her intercession countless requests have been granted. Financially, however, there remains a debt of about \$1500 -- mainly the residue of the expenses of the archeological excavations at the fourth site of Kateri's Mission. Not a large sum, but for me at Caughnawaga as big as a billion for the Rockfellers at Radio City!

Please: your written promise to say one Hail Mary a day during 1958 for Kateri's beatification!

"Who steals my purse steals trash". wrote the Bard. What is needed is a little of that trash to renew Kateri's nine-yearold office equipment. Too, this autumn, I underwent heart surgery. The doctors prescribed a less strenuous day. A complicated electronic machine, now a necessity and not a luxury, the Flexowriter, would allow me to do as much work with half the effort. In Canada, a Flexowriter is priced \$3200. Should I be able to relieve your purses of \$1600, from my Provincial Procurator, an understanding Jesuit, but in this domain strictly businesslike, I have the permission to seek a loan for an equal sum at a reasonable rate of interest. If all Kateri's friends sent Kateri a Birthday and Christmas donation wrapped into one, even a very modest one, all these money problems would melt as snow in the spring!

In return, Kateri, whose memory is excellent, will remember her friends at the Manger. Now, to the members of the Kateri Guild, from the bottom of my mending heart: A Merry, Merry Christ-mass! And may every mass of 1958 bring you the same joy it brought to Tekakwitha nearly three hundred years ago! I remain, up to my neck in snow,

Over the years . . .



▲ During 1949, was celebrated the tercentenary of the martyrdom of St. John de Brébeuf, St. Charles Garnier, St. Noel Chabanel, and St. Gabriel Lalemant. On July 8, the Caughnawaga Iroquois Mized Choir left for two days at Midland, Ont., Shrine of the Canadian Martyrs. Here are most of the choir members at the canal of Sainte-Marie-among-the-Hurons, discovered by Dr. Wilfrid Jury in 1948, undoubtedly the first artificial vaterway with locks to be built in the New World.

On Sept. 10, 1950, His Eminence Eugene Cardinal Tisserant blessed Catholic Federal Indian Tekakwitha School.

▶ His Eminence was afterwards inducted into the Iroquois nation and given an Indian name: Cherished-Light-of-the-Orient. Among those present were the Most Rev. C. Chaumont, Auxiliary Bishop of Moutreal, the Very Rev. L. Pouliot, then Jesuit Provincial, and Mother Leopoldine, General of the Sisters of St. Ann, who have been teaching at Caughnawaga since 1914.

Excavation at the fourth site

The autumn of 1955, with the aid of Archeologist Wilfrid Jury of the University of Western Ontario, the fourth site of the Mission, Kanatakwenke to the Iroquois, was definitely located at the junction of the Suzanne Creek and the St. Lawrence River. A year elapsed and in the 1956 September issue of Kaleri, an article entitled Urgent! called for financial help: "By next year this site will be inaccessible", the reader was told, "because of the Seaway... Soon it will be too late: the bulldozers will be doing their work, the area will be flooded." During September and October a tremendous job was done under the joint leadership of the Vice-Postulator and Dr. Wilfrid Jury, who was officially in charge of the excavating. Approximately two-thirds of the village was uncovered and a map was prepared. Wrote Dr. Jury: "I am ready to say that we have a very fine display of relics. This year my wife accompanied me and catalogued over 3643 relics..."

In September 1957, Mr. J. H. Gest, President of the Gest Equipment Co., Ltd., enthusiastically consented to assist in the work by furnishing the necessary men and machinery. Dr. and Mrs. Jury arrived from Windsor on August 30. That very day, Fr. Béchard and Dr. Jury went out for a preliminary examination of the old town. Of the site which had been visited some time before, nothing remained. The bull-dozers had torn it to pieces. It was indeed too late.

Despite this disappointment, Kateri's friends must not forget the results achieved in 1955-1956. Kanatakwenke was rediscovered, and thousands of artifacts remain to tell us about hitherto unknown aspects of life in Kateri's times. A debt of \$1500 also remains. But that has already been mentioned



Hard work, fasting and vigil keeping she practiced; the lash and pointed metal cincture she applied to her body regularly, since, according to St. Paul, all the pain by them begotten helps to complete Our Redeemer's sufferings. One evening, her heart pierced with sorrow for what she called her sins, she burned herself from toe to knee with firebrands. After a meditation on the Passion of Christ, she lined the bark that served as her mat with sharp thorns. Her confessor, who had not been consulted, while approving of the spirit that animated these castigations, instantly corrected them.

Identification with Mary

Vow of Perpetual Virginity

In natural sequence to Kateri's intimacy with Mary, in natural sequence to her imitation of Mary, next took place what may be called her identification with Mary. This occurred on March 25, Feast of the Annunciation, 1679, when at eight o'clock in the morning, after having received Her Savior into her heart, she gave herself to Him in a vow of perpetual virginity. At the same time she consecrated herself to His Mother, asking Her to be her Mother and to accept her as Her child.

Dies natalis

Her heart and mind were continually occupied with Jesus and Mary. On her deathbed,
Wednesday of Holy Weeks, April 17, 1680,
Kateri's last words were:
"Jesus, Mary, I love you"

Then face to face, she saw Them.
