



Pius XII and Kateri

OUT of the fulness of their hearts, Kateri's friends will continue to remember the late Pope Pius XII in their prayers. As early as 1936, when he was Cardinal Secretary of State for the Holy See, he became interested in the Lily of the Mohawks. That year, during his momentous trip to America, he visited the Auriesville Shrine to the Jesuit Martyrs. There in 1642, St. René Goupil, and in 1646, St. Isaac Jogues and St. John de Lalande spilt their blood for the conversion of the Iroquois. At this hallowed sport, ten years later, 1656, Tekakwitha was born. As Cardinal Pacelli trod upon this sacred ground, he recalled Tertullian's words: "The blood of martyrs is the seed of Christians."

Shortly after his election, in 1939, to the Chair of Peter, he wrote to Miss Gilberte Bouvier of Brookline, Massachusetts, informing her that the last book read by his illustrious predecessor, Pius XI, before his death, was hers, KATERI TEKAKWITHA, written in French. On May 20 of the same year, Pius XII consented to the Introduction of Kateri's Cause. With his approbation, on November 26, 1940, the initial discussion concerning her virtues opened at the Sacred Congregation of Rites.

At Rome, on January 3, 1943, the first great step in her Cause was taken when the Holy Father signed the "Decree declaring heroic the virtues of the Servant of God, Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha."

Later still, the Sovereign Pontiff graciously promised that he would beatify Kateri when the prayers of the faithful had obtained two first-class miracles through her intercession. (Customarily four are required.)

Who can doubt that His Holiness Pope Pius XII did everything in his power to hasten Venerable Kateri's glorification here on earth? In this, he should be imitated by each and all. At the same time, as Kateri's friends pray for the repose of his soul, let them earnestly ask Pius XII to obtain for his successor, John XXIII, gloriously reigning, the honor of completing the work so well begun—the speedy Beatification and Canonization of Kateri Tekakwitha, the "future Saint of the laity!"

To Kateri's Friends — A Strange Easter Wish!

MY Easter wish to Kateri's friends will seem strange to many: May they always enjoy the cross that God

lays upon their shoulders! Enjoy is the word.

Who could love suffering? A cancer-wasted patient, a husband with a run-away wife, a wife with a drunken husband, parents whose only son was killed in a stupid automobile accident, an aging person, alone in the world, feeling unwanted and unloved? Even they must learn the happiness of pain. If they but accept it, their own cruciation will make them more Christlike, and from it

will break forth a pure and radiant joy.

During 1733, to the Spanish mystic, young Father Bernard de Hoyos, was exposed the Sacred Heart crowned with thorns and a cross. "I saw," he wrote, "the aperture where the most pure blood which redeemed the world looked visible. Jesus my divine Love, beckoned my heart to enter within through the opening of this wound: it would be my palace, my castle, and my rampart always. As mine accepted, the Lord said: 'Do you not see that it is barbed by thorns, and that they will prick you?' All this was the more to prod my love and only after entering into the confines of the Divine Heart, did it discover the thorns were roses."

Venerable Kateri Tekakwitha also drew similar happiness from suffering. On April 25, 1680, eight days after her death, she appeared to an old friend, Anastasia, who had helped lead her in the way of holiness.

Father Peter Cholenec, S.J., Anastasia's spiritual

guide, gives us her first-hand account of it:

This fervent Christian woman remained alone in prayer that night after the others of her lodge had gone to bed. Feeling herself overcome by sleep, she finally lay down on her mat to rest, but no sooner had she closed her eyes than she was awakened by a voice which called her with these words: "Mother, arise." She recognized Kateri's voice. Far from having any



fear, she immediately raised herself into a sitting position, and turning to the place whence the voice came, she saw Kateri standing beside her, brilliant with light. Half her body was engulfed in this brightness, and the upper part was as bright as the sun. She carried a cross in her hand which was more brilliant than everything else, and from it there shone forth so much light that she thought there could be nothing more beautiful upon erath.

"I saw her," she insisted, "in this position clearly, awake as I was and I heard these words very distinctly: 'Mother, look at this cross and see how beautiful it is. It was the source of all my happiness during my life, and I counsel you to make it yours also.' After these words she disappeared, leaving her mother overjoyed and with a spirit so filled with this vision that after many years her memory of it is as

fresh as it was the first day.

THERE KATERI BELONGED!

A yearly account of the foundation of the Mission of the Sault up to 1685

A.D. 1679 (Cont'd.)

It is true that the Mission grew as a frond under the weight of afflictions and that the service of God was never so exact and splendid as it was then. The Indians had been separated [from the French] for only three years. They were accustomed to it before, or rather they only used to assist at Mass and Vespers which was sung by the French, but now they do everything by themselves in their own chapel. They had already begun to do so but the church was too incommodious being only a bark chapel. After the old chapel was completed, the appearance of the Mission was quite different. The Indians did all they could to adorn properly the chapel which they had just finished. They had already contributed abundantly the wherewith to build it. The Mohawks distinguished themselves in their generosity.

This affection which the Indians had for their chapel made it easier for them to learn the chant of the Church such as the hymns to the Blessed Sacrament, the hymns to the Virgin and a few others to the Confessors, the Martyrs, Inviolata, Veni Creator, the Psalms and more than thirty different kinds for Mass as well as for Vespers and for Benediction without forgetting the ceremonies of the blessing of candles on the Purification, of the ashes, of the palms, of Good Friday, of the Blessed Sacrament processions which people come to see as a rare occurrence, and those of the Assumption. Since their faith gave them much fondness for these things, they learned them at once. In this the women excel who sing quite beautifully and devoutly. It is a pleasure for all those who hear them. The children who have learned to serve Mass and who are most eager to do so, are dressed for all these ceremonies as young clerics and know their duties so well there is never any disorder.

Each day people are astonished, and with reason, that the Indians have learned this so soon, they who can be heard yelling in the woods when they sing in their own way, and who have an upbringing so different from that of other nations.

Indians had not vet been seen instructing one another so successfully as we have seen them here. The missionaries are already beginning to have to teach too many people who at first find these customs so new. It was necessary to show them how to make even the smallest inclinations which are made on entering or leaving the church, before or after having taken Holy Water, to rise for the Gospel, to kneel in church. God raised up this year a number of persons who themselves took care of this and who, also, taught catechism to the children and to the newcomers. Here they are well worth many missionaries, because, having thoroughly understood our mysteries, they express them in their own language with an admirable eloquence which results in the ignorant understanding them immediately and being touched by them. When it is known that the newcomers are put up in certain lodges, the missionaries are not worried about their instructions, for entire nights are taken up instructing them. (To be continued.)

BOSTON, MASS., Oct. 15: Perhaps you do not remember my visit to your Mission last summer, as doubtless few of my faith call on you, but if not, it does not matter. However what I have to say, I am sure. will be of interest to you.

My father had been critically ill for the past two months with a recurrence of a former ailment from which he had apparently recovered. This time at the age of eighty-three we had learned that the illness would be terminal as further surgery now would be impossible. His physical and mental suffering increased with each passing day. He made his peace with God each day according to our faith and waited with saintly patience for the good Lord to claim him. And each day at sundown, great was his disappointment in being rejected as un-worthy of release. This went on day in and day out for six weeks. His mounting pain and mental anguish were also more than I could bear. He was ill at home all this time because such was his wish to end his days in familiar surroundings and we complied with this wish.

At last, however, his doctor strongly recommended that we place him in the hospital. The doctor told me that my father's condition was not yet a dying condition and that it would be several weeks yet before he would enter the final stage. Friday October 10.
