But the solemnity came from the presence of the local Bishop, Mgr Jacques Berthelet who delivered a very inspiring homily. Since it was the Feast day of Sr Faustima who preached so well about the Divine Mercy, he reminded us that Kateri was a witness of this divine mercy.

"We all know that Kateri suffered a lot to keep her faith and that she answered too much contempt by her prayers. Only the Holy Spirit can inspire us Love for the other in such a way. Only love given us by the Holy Spirit can help us to destroy sin within us and around us.

I am sure that all of us are praying and would be very happy if Kateri would be declared saint. Her holiness would be therefore recognized everywhere in the Church, and she would be a stronger inspiration for all of us to follow her example and live more profoundly our Christian life." During my stay in Rome, very soon, I will surely have the opportunity to recommend Kateri's canonization, but your prayers are also very important in this process."

After Mass, an abundant lunch was served in the K.of C. Hall, thanks to the Knights who collected so much food and had volunteers to serve it. All participants went home satisfied and ever more desirous to see Kateri canonized.

What marriage means

Marriage. This union between a man and a woman is one of the most talked about, written about, discussed topics in human history. Books, television shows and movies analyze the phenomenon of what happens when a man and a woman become one.

Each year, approximately 2.3 million weddings occur in the United States; that's approximately 6,400 weddings a day. This coming together—with all its love and its difficulties—means sharing, caring, committing; being loyal, combining strengths, building up, and, above all, staying centered on God.

It matters, according to a team of 13 top scholars on family life, to men, women and children, and to society as a whole. It is also a social good. Marriage is a grand union. What marriage means is really why it matters: what couples do together and are together is what counts. "Our marriage has produced two sons, laughter, anger, joy and enough tears to fill a salt-water aquarium. It's been hard work, much harder than either of us expected."

Since today more than 40 percent of first-time marriages fail, married couples need to understand what it takes to make marriage last.

COMMUNICATE: Tell each other how you feel – honestly. **GET AWAY FROM** "you" and "me." Work on making "us".

SAY "Sorry." Deal with conflict, avoiding the things that are deadly to a marriage: criticism, contempt expressed in sarcasm and cynicism, defensiveness reflected in blaming the other person, and stonewalling with the silent treatment.

TAKE a team approach. Seek support from each other and from a community of couples.

DON'T FORGET the "Third Party." Recognize God's great love for you—no matter what—and mirror that concept in your marriage. Respect each other. Pray together.

The relics of Blessed... Kateri Tekakwitha

In the autumn 1684, the body of Kateri Tekakwitha was removed from the cemetery and brought into the church. The transfer was accomplished during the night and in the presence of the most devout. When the Mission of Saint Francis Xavier was displaced from the Sault to Montreal, Kahnawakon, Kanatawenke and Kahnawake, her relics were brought with them.

The relics were always kept in a sacred chest of carefully polished wood in the sacristy of the Mission of Saint Francis Xavier, in Kahnawake. Her bone relics were privately venerated next to the sacristy of the Mission. About late in the 1940's, or early in the 1950's her relics were sealed under a glass plate in this sacred chest.

In 1972, the Daughters of Isabella from Kahnawake had donated a Carrara marble tomb for her precious bone relics. On Wednesday November 1, 1972, Bishop Coderre presided at the placing of the sacred chest with her relics in a metal case and then within the marble tomb. The tomb is at the right transept of the Mission of Saint Francis Xavier. On Sunday December 17,1972, he solemnly blessed her tomb. Inscribed on her tomb is, KAIATANORON KATERI TEKAKWITHA, meaning "Blessed, Precious and Dear Kateri Tekakwitha."

The tomb is 6 feet in length, 2 feet wide and 2 feet in height. The bone relics of Kateri Tekakwitha in her tomb are her right and left lower half of the femurs, her right and left tibias, her right and left humerus, her left iliac bone, a lower rib and her right upper femur. These are the bones seen from a picture taken of the relics in 1972. These relics are truly the bones of Kateri Tekakwitha, because small bone relics were taken from these and miraculous cures have been performed. The bone relics that are left of Kateri Tekakwitha, would have us believe that she was small in stature and there is mention in Father Pierre Cholenec narration of her life that "Kateri was small and walked with a limp, because of her foot."

In 1755, the Mission of Sainr Regis was established in Akwesasne and a log Chapel was built in 1760. The Mission Pastor, Jesuit Marc Antoine Gordan brought a precious treasure of the remains of Kateri Tekakwitha to the Mission of Saint Regis, which was her skull. Before February 2,1763, this portion of her relic was lost in the fire when the Chapel was burnt, or disappeared at the time of the burning of the Chapel.

The relics of Blessed... Kateri Tekakwitha

The bone relics that have been lost were most probably taken for cures. They would apply the bone relics on the sick and perhaps some of her relics with permission of the Superior of the Mission. Before 1713, it was recounted that a Sister at the Congregation of Notre-Dame in Montreal was very sick and suffering pain on her side. A Father of the Mission of the Sault had sent a tooth of Kateri and a plate from which she ate. The Sister put the tooth in her mouth and drank from the plate, and was cured. Thus, body relics of Kateri were already being taken from her about at least thirty years after her death. Also, a person afflicted with smallpox was cured after taking some of the wood of the coffin. A relic of her front layer of the body sternum, measuring 6.4 cm in length and 3.8 cm in width, is presently in a section of the Archives reserved for relics at the residence of the Bishop of Chicoutimi, Ouebec.

Father Superior Oblate Nicolas Burtin of the Mission of Saint Francis Xavier from 1864 to 1892, gave this relic to Bishop Dominic Racine, the first Bishop of Chicoutimi. The Kateri Centre in Kahnawake has two bone relics of Kateri Tekakwitha. One of the two relics is a part of a left middle rib bone measuring about 8.5 cm in length and about 1.2 cm in width, and are seen two dry blood stains next to each other on her rib measuring in diameter about 0.2 cm and 0.3 cm.

The World from the angle of the Creator



The Blessed Kateri Tékakwitha - 1656-1680

The Praying Village

It is difficult to portray Kateri's joy on entering the village of the praying Indians. The deep fervor of these converts delighted the heart of the young woman. Her sister's welcome and that of Anastasia Tegonhatsiongo, mistress of her long house and former friend of her mother, made her feel that she was not a stranger, but that she was truly at home. For their part, the missionaries did not forget that they had a "treasure" to care for. She already knew two of the three Jesuits, Fathers Jacques Fremin and Pierre Cholenec, whom she had taken care of during their brief



stay at Gandaouague in 1666. Father Claude Chauchetiere, her first biographer, was the third priest sta-tioned at the mission. The superior charged Father Cholenec with the spiritual direc-tion of Kateri. After baptizing an adult, it was the custom of the missionaries to have wait several years before giving him Holy Communion. Her director, as soon as he became better acquainted with the newcomer, decided that she should receive her First Communion on Christmas Day, 1677.

An American writer, Daniel Sargent, gave us the profound signification of this communion:

"Yet even then it must be acknowledged that the Iroquois had been longing very particularly for Holy Communion. The very mirages they had followed showed them famished for it. They had always tried to raise themselves higher than they were by joining themselves somehow to sufferings. And here were the sufferings of Christ with which they could unite themselves. Also the Iroquois had been tormented with the desire of girding themselves into a single body, which was greater than the sum of them all as individuals. In all their wars they had, like most imperialists, fought for an ultimate peace to be enjoyed in the unity of a longhouse which was the Long-House."

"The union with God, with the splendor of the saints, and with the heroism and weaknesses of the Church Militant, made possible by the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist, was the very thing for which all their wars had been fought, and all their dreams had been dreamed."

Now Kateri, without clearly grasping all these implications, felt them sufficiently to prepare herself as well as possible for this encounter with Christ. According to Father Cauchetiere, her motto was, "Who will teach me what is most agreeable to God so that I may do it?" She lived up to this motto not only for a few months after her First Communion, but until the moment of her death.

The Blessed Kateri Tékakwitha - 1656-1680

Jansenist Arnauld spoke of the Real Absence of Christians before the real Presence of Christ in the Blessed Sacrament. Such was not the case at the Mission of St. Francis Xavier. The humble bark church nearly became her home. She came to pray at four o'clock in the morning, attended the first Mass at the break of dawn, and another at sunrise. Several times during the day she could be found in prayer before the Blessed Sacrament. She never missed evening prayer with the other faithful, and remained in church long after everyone had left. The weight of her love carried her to the tabernacle.

Her prayer was far more interior than vocal — an unceasing flow of love. Even so, the missionaries asserted that she did not use her praying as an excuse not to work. She was not one of those sanctimonious persons, more common in her day than in ours, who were at church when they should have been doing their housework.

At the end of the week, she examined her conscience with great care, did penance for her failings and went to confession.

When the moment came for her to receive our Lord for the first time, on Christmas Day 1677, Kateri was not simply a young Iroquois of exquisite purity; that day she realized the destiny of her race. Good though she was until then, from that morning on, she advanced with giant steps on the road to holiness, thinking herself all the while a very ordinary Christian.
